

There will be a Teams Scrabble tournament held at Danse Macabre, and Murfett Regency, the makers of Scrabble, have kindly agreed to provide ten copies of the Scrabble Travel Version Game as prizes for the winning team.

All Attending Members of Danse Macabre are eligible to enter the tournament. To enter, please write to Danse Macabre Scrabble Game care of the PO Box address given elsewhere in this issue. There are a limited number of places available in the game. Entry will be granted on a first-come, first-served basis with the following amendment:

Because members in Victoria may be able to respond more quickly than those interstate, all interstate applications postmarked 10 November or earlier will be given preferential entry.

If there are more than forty applicants, the "extras" will be allocated a place in the emergency list, just in case something prevents one of the first forty from taking part.

Draft rules for the *Danse Macabre* Teams Scrabble Tournament are as follows: There will be a maximum of four teams in the Scrabble tournament, each team being composed of approximately ten players.

The Scrabble[®] tournament will adhere to the rules published in the commercially available version of the game, with the following exceptions:

The official Scrabble board will be a large-scale facsimile
of the standard board, mounted on a wall of the competition
hall. The official tiles will be of a size appropriate to this
board, and will be attached to it during the progress of the
game.

Each team will be provided with a "working" board and tiles.

- One, and only one, captain must be appointed for each team.
- Every team will have a set time limit of three minutes per move.

During the first two minutes, the previous team's move may be challenged. The present team's move must be given to the referee *before* the end of the three minute time limit.

(The "official suggestion" is that the first two minutes be used for calculation, and the last for the captain to decide the team's move.)

4. No-one may be a member of more than one team.

Hotel Bookings: Please make all bookings through Danse Macabre. Please enclose at least one night's room rental with each booking. Make all cheques, etc, payable to 'Danse Macabre' and mark 'not negotiable'. Room rates per night are:

Note that only the Spaceline has two-room Suites.

Banquet: There will be a Banquet, price \$20--\$25 per head. To help us gauge numbers, if you are interested in this event, please tick the box on the membership form.

Hucksters: There will be a separate Hucksters' Room.

Because of concerns expressed about the difference between Professional and Fan hucksters, we have re-defined the status of Huckster Membership.

The *Professional Huckster Membership* will apply to hucksters who do not intend going to any program items. Pro Huckster Memberships cost \$100 for the full convention, or \$25 per day. The professional membership entitles you and two assistants to obtain entry to the Hucksters' room only for the duration of the convention.

If you're an Attending or Day Member of Danse Macabre, you are a Fan by definition -- you do intend to see one or more program items. For the additional sum of \$15 per day (or \$60 for the full convention), you can take out a Fan Huckster Membership. There is no provision for assistants in the Fan Huckster Membership; they'll have to pay their own way.

Confused? Let's take the most expensive example: say you want to set up your huckster's table for all four days of the convention.

As a Fan Huckster you'd pay \$120 in total (60 for your Attending Membership plus 60 for the huckster's table). You can attend program items, too.

As a *Professional Huckster* you'd pay \$100 in total. You can bring along two assistants, but none of you is entitled to attend program items.

Area allocation is approximately 2 x 3 metres per huckster table. If you have questions, please write.

Fan Lounge and Party Suite: There will be a Fan Lounge in the Diplomat and a Party Suite in the Spaceline, where members can go to sit and talk, rest, or think.

News and Reviews

Danse Macabre recently approached Penguin Books to ask if Graeme Base, illustrator/author of the books Animalia and The Eleventh Hour, would like to speak at the convention. Unfortunately, Graeme was unable to attend, but agreed to be interviewed instead. Short excerpts from the interview will appear in later issues of Bizarre, and the complete interview in the Danse Macabre Program Book.

Penguin has also sent Bizarre copies of several of its recent releases. They are:

The Red King, Victor Kelleher (Viking Kestrel \$17.99) Song of Gondwana, Craig Robertson (Penguin \$12.99) Chantry Guild, Gordon R. Dickson (Sphere \$9.99) The Man Who Never Missed, Steve Perry (Sphere \$8.99)

The first two of these are new books by authors resident in Australia.

The Red King, a children's fantasy, is set in a forest kingdom governed by a tyrant who rules by force of arms and by the terror of the deadly red fever that he controls. He is opposed by a small band of travelling entertainers, and the story tells of their challenge to his dominion. Although entertaining, The Red King will be disappointing to those expecting the high standards set by this prize-winning author. Characters are unmemorable, and the plot is poorly developed and episodic. Bizarre highly recommends Kelleher's earlier books Master of the Grove and Taronga to its readers.

Song of Gondwana arrived too late to be reviewed in this issue of Bizarre; it will appear in our Australian Page next issue. Good cover art by Brendon Hill.

The last two are local editions of novels published previously in the US; both employ the theme of individual responsibility in the face of titanic forces. I can only describe *Chantry Guild*, the latest in Dickson's Childe Cycle books, as a philosophical adventure novel. Dickson has a unique, if sometimes inarticulate, voice.

The Man Who Never Missed is a more prosaic novel than Dickson's, but more tightly written. A standard adventure novel, the first in a series.

DUFF - The Down Under Fan Fund

Duff 1990 - Australasia to North America

DUFF

The Down Under Fan Fund was created in 1972 to encourage closer ties between fans in Australasia and North America. With host countries alternating each year, there have been 17 exchanges of fan representatives since, supported entirely by voluntary contributions from fans all over the world. DUFF delegates visit a major SF convention in the host country and visit with fans they might otherwise never meet in person. DUFFers are treated as special guests and are always well looked after.

DONATIONS

DUFF exists solely on the donations and contributions of fans and always welcomes material for auction and donation of money. There will be auctions of DUFF material at future cons. Contributions can be brought to the con or sent to the local administrator. Anyone may contribute, even if ineligible to vote, and any donations in excess of the voting donation are gratefully accepted. Cheques should be made out to John D. Berry (in North America) or DUFF Australia (in Australasia). Money should always be sent in the administrators' home currency.

NOMINATIONS

Nominations are now being called for the 1990 DUFF Race, Australasia to North America. All candidates must post a \$10 bond, supply a brief written platform statement, provide the names addresses and signatures of three Australasian nominators and two North American nominators, and promise (barring acts of God) to travel to the 1990 NASFiC in San Diego, 1-3 September 1990. In cases of multiple candidacies, DUFF pays for one set of fares, accommodation and expenses.

ALL NOMINATIONS MUST REACH AN ADMINISTRATOR NO LATER THAN 15 JANUARY 1990

VOTING

Voting for eligible candidates will be opened late January 1990 and closed at *Danse Macabre* (the 1990 Australian Natcon) 13-16 April 1990. Any fan active in fandom before January 1989 may vote. Ballots must be signed and accompanied by a donation of at least \$2. Each person is allowed only one vote. If, at the time of voting, you think your name may not be known by an administrator, you will be asked to include the name of a fan (not to include

Introducing

George R R Martin

As well as giving you relevant information about Danse Macabre, BIZARRE wants to introduce those of you unfamiliar with George R R Martin's writing to some examples of his work.

Corgi/Bantam Books will re-issue his first novel Dying of the Light early next year; but George R R Martin made his first impact in SF with his short stories, novellas and novelettes.

Alan Stewart introduces us to one of George's more elusive recent works.

Portraits of His Children by George R R Martin

Through a variety of circumstances, George R R Martin's latest Nebula-winning fiction — his novelette Portraits of His Children — is virtually unobtainable in Australia.

The last issue of *Isaac Asimov's SF Magazine (IASFM)* distributed to Australian newsagents, along with its sister publication, *Analog*, was September 1985, just in time for the Melbourne Worldcon. Distribution of *IASFM* in Australia then ceased until January 1989, although *Analog* continued to be available. Portraits of His Children was published in the *IASFM* November 1985 issue. Most fen in Australia found out about this when the Nebula nominations were announced, including original publication information, in March 1986 or on the Hugo final ballot later in the year. However the original issue just never reached these shores.

Hopes for an easily available reprint were dashed. Both Wollheim's Best SF 1985 (sort of available here) and Dozois' Third Annual Collection (very limited import availability only) didn't carry the story. Neither did the 1986 collections from these sources -- perhaps the November publication enabled it to 'slip through the cracks'.

Only the well-heeled, or well-connected, fen managed to see the story, either by obtaining a copy of *IASFM* or by buying Dark Harvest's 1987 Portraits of His Children h/c collection or Nebula Awards 21, edited by George Zebrowski, 1987, h/c or trade pb, from Harcourt Brace

Jovanovich. At the time of writing I am not aware of an Australian-distributed or cheap paperback issue of the story. And this for a Nebula winner! What hope do we have of seeing obscure stories by favourite authors?

Anyway, the story itself earned a cover by Hisaki Yasuda and top billing on the November 1985 *IASFM*. It ran from pages 144 to 178, the last fiction in the issue, with pages lost to illustrations only (p. 151, pp 144-5 double) by Stephen Gervais.

The story is not really SF, more realistic fantasy, concerning as it does a present day author. One who lives alone in a large house, and whose divorced, now dead, wife and estranged daughter departed years ago. The portraits of the title are an original by and of his daughter, and a series of four based on characters in some of his novels. The latter arrive one by one in the post and Richard Cantling, the author, engages in conversation with imaginary embodiments of them, interspersed with flash-backs dealing with his real wife and daughter. Only at the end does his extreme isolation become apparent.

Portraits of His Children has very much a 'there, but for the grace of God, go I' feel about it, similar to such works as Herovit's World by Barry Malzberg. It is not really surprising that it appeared on the Nebula final ballot, given its prominent exposure in *IASFM* towards the end of the year and the fact that the Nebula is voted for by authors. The popular fan vote, the Hugo, went to Harlan Ellison's Paladin of the Lost Hour for the same year, although Portraits.... made the final ballot.

The story is effective, with Cantling's problems revealed with each conversation and incident narrated. Traits such as dating past events by which novel he was working on at the time; claiming 'Edward' was already used as a character's name in his novel and so was unavailable for their first child, if male; exaggerated perhaps, but familiar to all authors. Portraits.... is a more understated story than, say, his Sandkings, and is a good example of Martin's writing. Strong central character, events his readers can identify with, and very striking images, such as that of a slashed portrait, contribute to the entertainment value of Portraits...., with its comment on the human condition. Martin seems to write well about solitary estranged individuals, such as Lya, Simon Kress from Sandkings and Portraits....' Cantling to name a few.

Hopefully we will see a more accessible printing of Portraits of His Children before Danse Macabre.
