EDITORIAL

The committee which was appointed to the task of bidding for and (if successful) holding the 1975 World Science Fiction Convention in Melbourne has recently been reorganized. In its early stages the committee was a very loose-knit group in which there was virtually no control and thus not too much of a constructive nature accomplished.

Just recently several members of the committee got together and called a meeting at which they proposed various moves which eventuated in a reconstitution of the committee and, hopefully, a far greater output of tangible effort and also a greater return in the nature of a greater possibility of holding a Worldcon here.

So far the committee has been engaged on the task of setting out its various duties and making sure that the things which need to be done are done. There have been three committee meetings in the last month, and a fair amount of the time has been devoted simply to getting things sorted out and oiled up so they will function properly.

Despite the time which has gone into this rather introvert activity, an amazing amount of work has also been accomplished in other spheres.

At this moment our major efforts are directed towards the 1971 Worldcon in Boston in September. Peter Darling will be representing the committee in person, and there is a possibility that some other Australians will be present. Robin Johnson and Bill Wright have been involved in discussions with Qantas and the Australian Tourist Commission; both these organizations have given us valuable assistance and will be sending representatives to Boston.

John Bangsund has been appointed Publicity Director by the committee, and his first major task has been to design our advertisement in the Noreascon (Boston) Program Book. Elsewhere in this issue you will read of the fantastic effort involved in this advertisement and the tremendous support for Australia in 75 pverseas which this effort brought to light.

Ve are also arranging for Australia in 75 agents to be ppointed in various overseas countries, including everal in the USA. Some have already gone to ork for us, some have indicated their willingness to as agents, and a few we expect to hear from ortly. All are active fans, and a number of them to be at Noreascon.

DUFF

Since the announcement in the first issue we have appointed two agents who will in future handle all "Down Under Fan Fund" affairs: John Foyster in Australia, and Fred Patten in the USA. John is one of the best-known science fiction fans in Australia; he's been involved in fandom for a long time and there isn't much he doesn't know about it. He was one of the original members of the Australia in 75 committee, but was forced by pressure of other commitments to resign a few months ago. (We still have his very active assistance, however - living proof that you don't have to be on the committee to work towards Australia in 75. That's a sort of hint, dear teader.) Fred Patten is one of the best-known fans in America. He is one of the leaders in Los Angeles fandom, and has been interested for a long time in Australian fandom.

We'll be letting you know more about DUFF just as soon as John and Fred have all the details worked out.

A Convention in 1975

At its last meeting the committee decided that there will definitely be an Australian of convention in 75, if our bid is successful in 1973, it will be the 33rd World SF Convention. If it is unsuccessful, the committee will continue to plan for a really worthwhile 14th Australian Convention in Melbourne.

THE NOREASCON AD

"The Advertising Event Of The Year For Science Fiction Publishers", says Andy Porter's publicity sheet for the Noreascon Program Book, and so it is in many ways. Not only for sf publishers, but for anyone who has something to tell or sell fandom, the World Convention Program Book is the publication to buy space in. And we did, some months ago.

We had originally planned that our advertisement would mainly concentrate on publicizing DUFF - the Down Under Fan Fund. For various reasons it was subsequently decided that DUFF should not be part of the committee's work, and the Fund has now taken a separate full-page ad.

At short notice, therefore, a new advertisement had to be devised. We decided it should consist of the simple text, "AUSTRALIA IN 75? I'LL DRINK TO THAT!" - followed by lots of names of authors and fans who would be known to people attending Noreascon and to fandom in general.

To get these names necessitated writing letters - lots of letters. It was a tremendous effort. We must have written, between us, about 150 letters in a matter of about 10 to 15 days. The effort paid off. A lot of people said, "I'll drink to that!" - and most of those who felt they could not have their names publicly associated with our bid wished us well privately.

One of the first to respond was British fan and TAFF candidate, Terry Jeeves. His letter included a cartoon, with two of his well-known "Soggy" characters proposing and accepting our toast. We decided to use the cartoon in the ad.

There were some unexpected problems. Three people, Andre Norton, Harry Stubbs (Hal Clement) and Tom Digby, said yes, they supported us, but they didn't drink. How we got round this, you will see when we reproduce the ad later this year.

Apart from the committee and twenty selected Australians, the ad contains 104 names. If you have the feeling that "Australia in 75" is a sort of lone cry in the wilderness, just have a look at this list. We think you will find it, as we certainly do, most encouraging evidence that there is an immense amount of good will overseas for our bid. Perhaps if we had written 500 letters...?

AUSTRALIA IN '75

To Leigh and me it is wonderful news that Australia is bidding for the 1975 World Science Fiction Convention. I can't think of a better place for a Con, and we are all for it. Now, we hope to return to Australia long before 1975, but... Deus vult, as Avram Davidson likes to say... we'd surely like to go again in 1975.

When we made our long-planned round the world trip almost four years ago, we visited some glamorous places. England, a second visit to Persia, India, Nepal, Bangkok, Angkor and so on. Our travel agent said, "Of course, from Singapore you will want to go home via Japan". We said, "No, we want to see a little of Australia".

And that was the best decision about a trip we ever made. For our all-too-brief stay in Australia left us enchanted with the place. It is the only place we visited (England excepted) that we want to revisit. We have the warmest memories of it, and I imagine that any science-fictionist who goes there will have the same,

Scenery is wonderful, but people are the most. And we met with almost the warmest welcome we ever had, from the Australian science fiction community.

They gave us some memories we will always cherish. Like... touring Sydney Harbour, surely the most beautiful harbour in the world, with Bertram Chandler as our guide... drinking beer under the trees at the Bona Fide Travellers Inn with Ron Smith and his family and Dave Boutland... chinning with Pat Terry at a party at John Danza's place - and sorry we are to hear that both of these men are gone now... a long gab with John Baxter in the Chevron Hilton hotel... and none of these people, nor the many other sf enthusiasts we met, had ever seen us before.

I believe I can guarantee, from our experience, that visitors to an Australian Con will find nothing but friendliness.

Also, the land itself is enchanting. Hawkesbury River in the sheeting rain, and the solemn, silent gum forests, kangaroos and koalas and dingos... all so different.

You start out with a deceptive feeling that it's all just like home, the people and the country, and

then of a sudden you are reminded that this is a faraway and different place. Like the night we came out of Bert Chandler's house and I said, "Ah, there are not so many street lights here, and I can finally get a good look at the southern stars." He pointed and said, "That's Orion, up there." I stared, and then I exclaimed, "But the damn constellation is upside down."

Vaucluse gardens, the lonely beaches and rolling surf, the loom of distant hills, the peculiar tingle in the air... all these we remember. And I must not omit the most magnificent scenery in Australia... the tallest, handsomest girls in the world, wearing the shortest mini-skirts in the world. They are worth going half around the globe to see.

A perceptive Englishman who wrote a book about it said that Middle-West Americans and Far-West Americans go mad about Australia. I am a Middle-Westemer and Leigh is a Far-Westerner, and we went mad about the place, and can't wait to get back.

BEABOHEMA #15
Frank Lunney 212 Juniper St Quakertown
Pennsylvania 18951 USA (50c per copy)

The alternation of blue and yellow pages all the way through this zine is just a little eye-croggling, and also I'm not hot on the way Frank lays out his colophon (and contents page) by mixing it well in

The editorial digs in pretty fast by saying all sorts of nasty things about andy offutt, just possibly with some justification, but since I don't know andy this bit is about as interesting as most feuds in fanzines when you don't know the feuders - that is, not at all. (Though I must confess to having enjoyed the Ted White vs Everybody Else arguments in SFR - but, then, they were funny.) What I did find interesting in the editorial and letter column was the fascinating discussion of the Hugo Dramatic Presentation nominee, BLOWS AGAINST THE EMPIRE, a hard-rock record by the Jefferson Starship (nee Airplane).

A lot of pages are taken up by a reprint of an article by F. T. Laney on the subject of Dianetics, which is quite interesting from an historical point of view, but I would rather have had more editorial comments on it.

There's a downright weird short article by Amie Katz about the tunes his various duplicators play to him while duplicating. No, really. Some good record reviews, and then lots of letters.

BEABOHEMA isn't bad, but it's not the kind of zine that leaves you waiting for the next issue with impatience. The layout and artwork are better than the usual Australian standard, but mediocre when compared with other American fanzines. Worth sending fifty cents for a sample copy.

OUTWORLDS #7

"The Perfect Fanzine", it has been called, and I guess it's bordering on that if you look at a fanzine from the layout and illustration point of view. This one is offset, with beautiful artwork, justified margins, great layout - all normal for OUTWORLDS.

The printed stuff that no-one reads is not as good as how it looks, but it's still good. A fanzine that starts with a letter column must be hiding something. The best of the written material in this issue is Sandra Miesel on Delany's NOVA, and Steve Fabian's att column.

OUTWORLDS is a fanzine you can only get if you promise to wear clean white gloves while reading it.

Dennis Stocks (see address elsewhere) is local agent. Dennis is also Official Editor of ANZAPA. My spies tell me Bill Bowers might be joining that organization - and lucky we'll be to have him if that is true.

RIVERSIDE QUARTERLY Vol 4 No 4 Leland Sapiro Box 40 University Station Regina Saskatchewan Canada (60c/4 for \$2)

This is I guess a pretty serious fanzine in its approach to sf and fantasy - almost scholarly. If you don't mind the microscopic type (yes, smaller even than this) and the atrocious printing in green ink, then you might find it very much to your taste. A few things with titles like "The God Figure in Dystopian Fiction" I must admit I didn't read, but they might very well be just your cup of tea.

I enjoyed Bill Blackbeard's comics column - and rush on to explain that I am by no means a comics fan, oh no, not me, but this article was about reprints of Krazy Kat, well-written and most interesting. I liked Harry Warner's fanzine review column, too - this time on German fanzines. There's some awful poetry.

On the whole, recommended to people who like the serious-constructive approach to things, and for others certainly worth looking at.

GRANFALLOON #12 Linda Bushyager 121 MacDade Blvd #B211 Folsom Pennsylvania 19033 USA (60c/4 for \$2)

A beautiful Alicia Austin cover starts off one of the best fanzines I've yet read. There is truly something to please every taste in this issue, and the next issue of this fanzine I am looking forward to.

Linda has a very entertaining editorial in which she describes how it is to live without a car in modem USA, and how flustered a clerk became when Linda wanted something delivered. "No car? Impossible:"

andy offutt waxes sentimental about the launching of Apollo 14 (he was closer than Spito Agnew), but also puts forward a lot of good points in favour of the space programme which are not sentimental in the slightest. There are some excellent columns and the first part of a fanzine history by John Berry.

And lots more. This one is a must. There's so much reading in here that I can't begin to review it all, but all 50 pages are worth looking at.

TOMORROW AND... #5

In his editorial lerry has interesting (and perhaps a little ominous) things to say about "foreign" worldcon bids.

A kind of "work in progress" article is patched

together from andy offutt's letters to Jerry, and this is quite interesting even if (like me) you haven't read the book in question - EVIL IS LIVE SPELLED BACKWARDS. There's some rather mediocre fan fiction, and that's about it.

England (Aust agent: Me 8 for \$1.00)

The British newszine. Excellent for keeping up with British fandom, it consists of news, fanzine reviews and suchlike. Worth getting.

HAVERINGS (various issues)
Ethel Lindsay Courage House 6 Langley Ave
Surbiton Surrey England (6 for \$1.00 Aust
agent: John Bangsund - address elsewhere)

A most valuable and thorough fanzine review fanzine. But how can I review a fanzine which teviews fanzines? There's an infinity of mirrors here somewhere...

SCOTTISHE #58
Ethel Lindsay (as above - agent JB - 5 for \$1.50)

For a 58th issue there's not much in this, but what there was I liked. andy offutt (boy, that man gets around, and I keep on having to start sentences with his name, dammit) says some bitter things about fandom on one page and some nice things on the next. Ho hum. The best thing in the issue is Ethel's editorial, where she talks about what it was like during the postal strike, when she had nothing fannish to do. Strange feeling.

Not up to the usual standard, but a fanzine always worth looking at.

ALGOL #16

Andy Porter 55 Pineapple St Brooklyn New York 11201 USA (75c/5 for \$3 Aust agent: Bangsund)

Somewhat irregular, but excellent when it does appear. Beautifully laid-out, printed offset on quality paper (11 x 17, centre-stapled), this is real class. The lead article by John J. Pierce I find mainly incredible (any high school student of

clear thinking could have a field day with this); in general it's a staunch defence of the traditional st against the "New Thing". He irritates me mainly by defining the New Thing in his own terms and then shooting down the clay pigeon he has set up. Ch well.

There's a fairly good article by Gian Paolo Cossato about sf in Italy, but it's pretty dated (1968). And a Harlan-Ellisonish column by Ted White, somewhat reminiscent of The Glass Teat but more moderate in approach. And book reviews, and a column by Greg Benford, and a crazy cartoon strip.

I don't know whether I would pay 75c for this, even though it's so beautifully done, but if you can afford it it would be worth getting if only to haul out when some mundane friend asks. "What's a fanzine?"

Oh yes, the cover is by Steranko.

SPECULATION #28

Peter Weston 31 Pinewall Ave King's Norton Birmingham 30 England (40c Aust agent: Gillespie)

Some interesting Heicon photos lead off this fanzine, which I find very similar to Bruce's SF COMMENTARY in subject matter and style, but possibly a shade better if you like reviews and discussion of sf. It doesn't tum me on much, but if you are at all interested in talking about sf then this is one of the best fanzines to read.

The most interesting part of this issue for me was the virtual feud between John Brunner and Mike Moorcock in the letter column over a fairly scandalous incident at a recent con vention. On the whole I liked the letter column more than the rest of the issue, but... You should try it for yourself.

LETTERS

ANDY PORTER 55 Pineapple St Brooklyn New York 11201 Cor, mate, yer blew it: The account of how AUST-RALIA IN 75 came to be omitted one especially important name: mine.

John Bangsund did a map on a letter to me a Long Time Ago, showing "Fan Demon's Land" and a couple of arrows pointing to the site of the 1975 worldcon, which just happened to be Melboume. We bantered it back and forth a bit; I did a write-up in my newszine, SF WEEKLY, suggesting a groundswell of support for the bid was emerging from Melboume and the US (first time I ever described John and myself as a groundswell...) and still later mentioned new hotels in Melboume in early issues of CONVENTION in relation to the Australian bid. I also contacted the Australian consulate here in New York and got a bit of promotional material, some of which I used when I made up that first AUSTRALIA IN 75: ad. The ad consisted of a half page outline map of Australia with Melbourne and Sydney in type, picked up from a Government promotional flyer; it had AUSTRALIA IN 75: on it in Grotesque Condensed lettering (60pt, courtesy Letraset) with the message on the side: "For information on Australia in 75 write John Bangsund, PO Box 19, Femtree Gully, Victoria 3156; Leigh Edmonds, 175 Moray Street, South Melboume, Victoria 3205; or Andrew Porter, 24 East 82nd Street, New York 10028."

I ran the ad in the 1968 Lunacon program book. Then I ran it in the FUTURE UNBOUNDED Program 800k (F-UNCON, LA, July 1968). The next place a reference to the bid appeared was in the ad I did for John's ASFR that appeared on page 58 of the 8aycon program book. At the bottom of the ad, in Microgramma Med Ext (again Letraset) it said: "DON'T FORGET: VOTE FOR AUSTRALIA IN 1975." The ad that appeared in the F-Uncon program book omitted any addresses to write to: just showed the map and the two cities.

And from there it was up to you idiots down there to make something of the idea. Which you did. Andy Porter, Secret Master of Australian Fandom...

I don't think the idea would have amounted to anything if John and I hadn't kicked it around, and if I hadn't put it into print in several places.

Now the wheel has come full tum. I recently got a letter of comment on ALGOL from, I think, Paul Anderson, telling me to support Australia in 75. The mind croggles at my power to cloud men's minds, to sway vast multitudes to my every whim. If I'm so powerful how come my boss won't give me a raise?

More seriously, A75B is a pretty impressive publication, another fine design job by John; as a propaganda source for intra-Australian fandom, I hope it does its job well.

If you like I'll send you the original artwork for that first AUSTRALIA IN 75 ad, and you can frame it and hang it on a wall, or burn it as an offering to the gods, or something.

(We haven't had time to really get down to researching this fascinating business of when and

where precisely this idea of an Australian worldcon started, but someone has pointed out recently that Bangsund suggested "Melbourne in 69" in his COS-MIC DUSTBUG no.3, April 1967 - which I think, Andy, is a little before you two got together? -ED.)

that Bangsund can produce, and aimed quite specifically at the Australian enthusiast.

In connection with my ex-committee duties I have passed on to Peter Darling those jewel samples and the existing paperwork and complete run of the old AUSTRALIA IN 75 I forwarded to Bill Wright, giving him something substantial to start his files off with.

(Ed: 1 think we're going to have to explain that teference to jewel samples. Maybe John Ryan might fill us in next issue?)

I like the format etc of A75B but I wonder how practical it will be when you really get things moving and have lots of news and views coming in? But at present it is "different", a possible talking point, and of course quite thoroughly identifies with something - Australia in 75.

I have to go along with John Ryan's doubts (in correspondence)): in recent years Bangsund's track record hasn't given much hope of regularity.

One (possibly) slight point that could be damaging is that you constantly refer to the Australian "fans" and it's quite on the cards that many people interested in a Big Convention do not consider themselves "fans". The connotation might even be dista eful to them...

(Ed: Anyone out there doesn't like being called a "fan"? We don't want to start a big discussion on this in the Bulletin, but it would be of some assistance to know what you think about this.)

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
