

"THINGS TO COME" went over with a bang - ever 93 bucks profit for the Univ. Br. NAMELESS! The boys certainly worked over there on the campus to put it over. Every bulletin board on the campus was plastered with posters, the University Daily carried a story on it, and Aldersen Fry even managed to get a plug in on his radio program. We heard tales of all sorts, for instance, one fervent NAMELESS walked into a classroom with a class going on, handed the professor a poster advertising the movie and turned around and walked out before anybody could question him. Another NAMELESS heard a professor reading the advertising material aloud, ending with a comment to the effect that the class had better go and see it - it would give them an idea of what might happen if somebody didn't do something soon about all this A-Bomb talk! All in all, to put it mildly, the first movie sponsored by the University Branch of the NAMELESS ONES went over as a most admirable success. Two showings, over 500 attended, even the Instructional Materials Center officials who co-sponsored the deal were astonished. In about three months the Club will be able to put on another, if so desired, and if you folks have any ideas about what you'd like to see, send in your suggestions so they can be worked over.

A little birdie brings the word that some of the stf enthusiasts at Roosevelt High are working at starting up a Roosevelt Branch of THE , NAMELESS ONES. A couple of scouts attended a meeting at the Hub, liked the looks of what they saw and heard, and figured they'd like a similar deal for themselves. All of which makes us very happy, because the more clubs we have, the more fun fans are having, and the more potential fun we will be able to have. Just think how nice it would be if there were three or four nice, healthy fan clubs in Seattle, meeting by themselves for their local amusement and edification, and having occasional joint meetings to exchange programs, ideas, and stf material We could have rotating meetings, rotating memberships, interchangeable memberships on an associate basis,... all sorts of interesting ideas are possible. We could have 'zines put out by each group to exchange among ourselves and/or throughout fandom in general, building up fanzine libraries that would be available in various convenient locations for use of these members who now) find it awkward to get out to the fanzine library on the Campus....

Of course, all THE NAMELESS regulars have heard this time and time again, but, for the benefit of these prospective NAMELESS, to whom the whole idea is as yet merely a suggestion, here's a brief review of status ; to date:

First of all, the name, 'THE NA ELESS ONES' refers to all the people in ! the State of Washington that read and enjoy Science Fiction and Fantasy, whether we know who they are or not. Whenever we find a fellow stf reader,) we invite him to share our mutual hobby. There are no dues. There are no strings attached. Any group of individuals is perfectly free to form a local club and be as exclusive as they like - though, of course, we'd like to be let in on their pleasures and pursuits as far as it is practicable. All for fun and fun for all, so to speak.

Aside from the serious business of discussing our likes and dislikes in stf, THE NAMELESS ONES enjoy a little fun, too. Those that could, for instance, went down to Portland and attended the World Science Fiction Convention, THE NORWESCON, that was held over Laborday weekend. Then, for the benefit of those that couldn't attend, we had a costume party at the China Pheasant last November... (for a full report of the NORWESCON, see SINISTERRA #3; for a full report of the China Pheasant Ball, just keep your eyes on future issues of SINISTERRA....) And, because fun is fun and everybody is all for it, now we come to another costume ball.... for details, keep your eyes on!

One of the most interesting developments in THE NAMELESS ONES, has been the number of fanzines produced. SINISTERRA is, of course, our most ambitious project, being the joint project of the entire NAMELESS ONES (and subody else that we can cajole choice items from). THE CRY OF THE NAMELESS, our Newsletter, is one year old already... The first issue came out January 1950.

As you may have guessed by now, the primary purpose of THE NAMELESS CNES is enjoyment. We like to discuss the material we read, and we enjoy meeting other people with similar tastes, therefore, the organization (slight as it is) of THE NAMELESS ONES, permits us to find other people with whom to exchange ideas and material. Those who aspire to write, find in these amateur journals an outlet for their aspirations... those who enjoy publishing their own 'zines find pleasure in having an ample supply of material to use in their publications. Budding artists are in demand... so much so that even those of us who are not budding artists, but merely know which end of a stylus goes on the stencil are eagerly seized upon to provide artwork. Another activity of THE NAMELESS ONES has been the donation of various magazines and source material to the University Library to provide reference material in this field.

All of which brings us back again to the pleasant possibility of a fan group being formed at Roosevelt High. Best of luck to you all -- we'll be looking forward to hearing from you.

In addition to working like mad on SINISTERRA, Toskey managed to turn out an excellent Issue #3 of IMPOSSIBLE ADVENTURES - more impossible than ever, if that be possible. Wally Weber burst forth with the long-awaited ZOBBLE; Austin has made another valuable contribution to statistics of fandom in his NAMLESSENTIALS - a fanzine about fanzines; and Carr sits smugly hatching a brightly colored individzire which, so far, is exclusively for SAPS, or for trading purposes only.

According to my record, it was 1941, guess I'll have to check on that. New Concept was changed, after three issues, to Concept, whin appeared twice only to have the title again changed, this time to Modern Concept, which only appeared one time. I den't know whether you have the information or not, but if you do I would appreciate the following: Date of Universe Stories #1 & 2. Date of Space Tales #3 & 5. Am inclosing \$1.15 for the first four SINISTERRAS, and for the Science Fantasy Report Card. Also, how can I obtain future issues of CRY? ... Hmmm. Want to trade CRY for my FAPA zine, CONTOUR?.... Issue #3 is in the mails, #4 will be along shortly. Comes out quarterly, though I make no promise

to either be on time, not not skip a quarter....

Thanks again for the information. I hadn't heard a word about your oneshots, Report Card, Zobble, and others, so the information will definitely come in handy. Half the job is finding out what to look for and where to look for it. Getting the data is usually quite easy—comparatively—since the editors are generally interested in having the listing of their zine complete, and so will cooperate....

Haven't seen a BABEL in quite a spell. What's the good word from the


Aberdeen clan? (Ed. Note: Yeah, what is the good word, Terrans..?)


