NEXT TAFE DEADLINE ANNOUNCED

A letter from Don Ford, senior administrator of the Trans-Atlantic Fan Fund, informs us that the TAFF winner, Eric Bentcliffe, stopped in Cincinnati after the World Convention, and they discussed TAFF, the likelihood of getting enough money, etc. and came up with the following:

1. Nominations for the U.S. delegate to the 1962 European convention will be closed midnight, 30 November 1960.

To qualify, candidates must:

Be nominated by 3 known fans from the U.S. and 2 more from the host country (England).

Post \$5 registration fee.

Sign a statement of willingness to make the trip if

elected, barring acts of God.
Submit a 100-word platform to be published TAFF ballot.

Submit all this to Ford or Bentcliffe prior to the deadline.

3. Voting procedure used on the 1959 election will be used again.

Ford's address is: Box 19-T, RR 2, Wards Corner Rd., Loveland, Ohio. Bentcliffe's address is: 47 Alldis St., Great Moor, Stockport, Cheshire, England.

The "Auction Bloch" at the Pittsburgh convention raised \$99 for TAFF. Other contributions (\$40) brought the Fund up to \$139, and Ford and Bentoliffe are confident of raising the requisite \$400 by Spring of 1962.

Candidates standing thus far are Dick Eney and Ron Ellik. Anyone else wishing to stand must comply with the above rules. Dick Ellington would like it known that SKYRACK is wrong, wrong; he (Ellington) is not standing for TAFF.


include the final Pittcon financial report.

I must apologise to the readers of FANAC for the fact that this instalment will lack the usual sober and profound reflections on science fiction which have distinguished this column in the past, but I've been worried about the apparent disappearance of a well-known G-type star, familiarly known as Sol. I've been out looking for it for the last couple of months, but it hasn't been seen since shortly before the arrival of Ken & Pamela Bulmer and ourselves at the seaside resort of Portballintrae at the beginning of July. I must say I've known holidays that got off to a better start. In the first week it rained all the time, the water supply was cut off (there had been a drought), the cooking apparatus didn't work, the baby cried, the electricity supply was interrupted, the sewers got blocked up, and I was shanking my short irons. In time most of these troubles were overcome but the weather was still bad two months later for the long-awaited visit of Andy Young.

It stopped raining long enough for the traditional lannish visit to the Tower of the Enchanted Duplicator, about six miles from Belfast, but the rest of his visit was spent in the shelter of Oblique House talking and playing ghoodminton. Andy showed immense natural genius for both pursuits. In ghoodminton, as he put it modestly, "once you understand the principles it's just a matter of physics". I wouldn't like you to get the impression however that this group of highpowered intellects -- astro-physicist Andy Young, atomic physicist Ian McAulay and the fine minds of Belfast fandom -frittered away its time in frivolous pursuits. Why there was a most stimulating discussion on whether some currant buns of Madeleine's could be called muffins by the most half-astrophysicist which only terminated when the last bun of contention was removed. At another meal, now I remember it, there was a most fascinating cosmological discussion as to whether the Earth might not be a spherical pie, slowly cooking round the sun and about to be devoured any moment by some vast galactic entity. Andy paled visibly at the thought that the recent photographs he took of the arms of the crab Nebula did look a bit like a fork and then, as we came into the sitting room. I staggered back in horror as I saw a book of Madeleine's lying there and realised the significance of its title. It read, "Encyclopedia of World Cookery".

Seriously, we approved of Andy Young and enjoyed his visit so much that if it hadn't been for the Pittcon the following weekend we'd have hidden his return ticket. He would have made a wonderful TAFF delegate and we were lucky to get him for free. I really must report his visit properly elsewhere. It was too much fun to be forgotten.

When I get some of this pile of fanzines read perhaps this column will get back to normality, whatever that was. Meanwhile things are still happening in Belfast, for on Sunday 5th September Ian Mc-Aulay of Dublin comes to live here, having taken a job at the university on research into dust particles. He'll be staying at Oblique House until he gets settled and has declared his intention of making HYPHEN go monthly. We'll see...

FIRST ISSUES GALORE: The quality of fanzines continues to rise, and the outlook for the future, judging by the first issues we've re-

ceived lately, is even better.

Dick & Pat Lupoff (215 E. 73rd St., New York 21, NY) have just published the first issue of XERO, an extremely neatly-produced zine featuring one of the most fascinating, amusing, goshwowish articles I've read in ages: Dick Lupoff's "The Big Red Cheese," eleven pages of reminiscences on the Captain Marvel comix. It's to be the first of a series of such things, and I for one am avidly looking forward to future installments.

George C. Willick (306 Broadway, Madison, Indiana) is the editor of PARSECTION, the first issue of which features nice stuff by such as Tucker, Dean McLaughlin, and Joe L. Hensley. Nothing stupendous, but it's neatly-produced by Lynn Hickman and would do many 5th-

issue editors proud. (8 issues for \$1.00.)

Eric Bentcliffe and Norman Shorrock have been very prompt with the publication of the first issue of BASTION, the Voice of the Liverpool Group. BASTION seems to combine most all the good features of both Eric's former zine TRIODE and Norman's SPACE DIVERSIONS, and is quite impressive withal. The Eddie Jones illos are Something To Behold indeed, and Doc Weir takes the honours for the written material with a relaxed and fascinating article on some of Haggard's novels. (20% per, 6 for \$1:00, from Eric Bentcliffe, 47 Alldis St., Stockport, Cheshire, England.)

THE ULTIMATE FIRST ISSUE: Joe & Robbie Gibson stunned Berkeley fandom coupla weeks ago by casually appearing at a GGFS meeting and handing out copies of the first fanzine they've ever published ... er, well, it's the first one Robbie's ever done. Joe says he ain't talkin'. ("Was it that bad?" said Ronel. "Yeah," muttered Joe.) Anyhow, SOMETHING ABOUT A FIFTH commemorates the Gibsons' fifth wedding anniversary with some fine reminiscences, some sharp writing, and an absolutely outrageous suggestion for a fan-movie by Joe. It's quite a good bit, but don't write asking for copies, because it was a Limited Edition and is Sold (or Given) out already. The main reason I mention it is because it was such big news in Berkeley that I felt maybe some other people would be croggled too -- why, on the night they distributed the zine, Jim Caughran broke down and bought a membership in the Baycon, Ron Ellik accepted a glass of an alcoholic beverage. and Danny Curran refused one!

SOME OF THE BEST FROM QUANDRY, the 20-page collection published recently by Bob Lichtman for OMPA, is available on a limited basis (15 copies or so) to all and sundry at 15¢ per. I recommend it; despite its small size it admirably brings together much of the best material from Lee Hoffman's 6th Fandom Focal Point, including selections from LeeH's editorials and Willis' "Harp," Tucker's "My Life and Hard Times as a Fanmag Collector," a coupla short Burbee pieces, and Bob Silverberg's "First and Last Fans," the article that started all the ruckus about 7th, 8th, 9th, and 200th Fandoms. (Bob Lichtman, 6137 So. Croft Ave., Los Angeles 56, Calif.)

THE APA CORNER got lost in the shuffle last issue, so we're a little late in reporting that the 92nd FAPA mailing appeared on schedule in August, totalling 607 pages—larger than the last SAPS mailing; by Ghu, even before the postmailings are in. Items of special interest were the Isabel Burbee appreciation oneshot, OLE CHAVELA! pubbed by the Fan Hill mob, and THE EXPURGATED BOOB STEWART, which I pubbed. Lots of other interesting stuff, of course, including Jean Linard's wacky STYLE SHEET and Jim Caughran's ILLEGIBLE, the first FAPAzine published on an IBM card. What kooks these FAPAns be!

NOTA BENE: There'll be some shakeup of the FANAC mailinglist with the change of editorship, so you'd best check your status on the mailing wrapper. An added attraction of the art supplement will be a calendar for 1961 done by George Barr, voted #1 Fan Artist last year. # The Fan Hill mob will also be publishing soon THE MAKING OF THE MUS-QUITE KID as a money-raising gambit for Unicorn Productions. have articles, gags, cartoons, photos, the words to the Wrai Ballad, and the working script used during the filming. It'll also have writings by the Stars of the movie. Cost will be 50% a copy.
