No Fund: John Prenis said, "the No Fund has an amazing abundance of neat stuff tonight so I'm taking it all home with me." There was much laughter. T-Shirts: Tony had no report.

Movie Theater Rental: (re. *Everybody Else is Doing it, Why aren't We?* in the June 1998 Newsletter.) Tony said it would cost approximately \$100 an hour. This includes the projectionist and they get to take all the concession stand proceeds. We're responsible for the movie rental. Tony asked for suggestions of movies like *Bladerunner* and *Metropolis*. We want to have a theater of our own where we can show classic science fiction films. Contact Tony if you're interested.

Old Business:

Motion Tabled from the July meeting: The motion was to send SF books to a college professor in Russia (see *Lew for name, etc.* CK) who teaches courses on American science fiction and fantasy. Lew was to get back to us with information about the costs of shipping the books. Lew had copies of his proposal with him. It was 1 1/2 pages long and included a list of suggested books. It also included details of the costs involved with purchasing and shipping the books. If you're interested in the ~~gory~~ fine details contact Lew for a copy. Here is a brief synopsis: 26 to 30 books were suggested; paperbacks weigh average of 6 oz. and cost \$5.95 to buy. Post Office's M/Bag shipping service by ship (two month's time) @ \$.79 per pound. Air shipping is 7-10 days @ \$4.41 per pound. In the end Lew moved, Todd second, to budget \$209.67 for the purchasing and shipping of the books. Lew said he would take donations of as many of the books on the list as possible which would help keep the cost of book purchases at a minimum. He said if he goes over budget he will make up the difference. After the usual round of debate the motion passed 20 to 5. (Note: Darrell donated many of the books. Thanks Darrell. CK)

New Business:

Motion: Hank moved, Tim B. second, to move the January 8th meeting to the 15th if possible because of Arisia. Several motions were made, but not recognized. Tony moved, Tina second, that P.S.F.S. donate \$1999.99 to their wedding. This motion was out of order. Tina called for discussion on the original motion. Todd moved, Lew second, to amend the motion to include changing the February 12th meeting to the 19th because of Boskone and Costumecon. Tina called for discussion on the amendment. Several people thought it was a good idea. Oz objected to moving the February meeting on the grounds that our guest speaker, Robert Sawyer, might not be able to be here on the new date. He proposed that we talk with him before we make the change. Tim B. moved, no second, to split the question. Bob S. suggested that we defer the subject to the Board. Todd moved, several second, to extend business by 5 minutes. Passed. Todd and Lew withdrew their amendment. Todd moved, Lew second, to replace their amendment with Oz and Bob's suggestions which means that, along with moving January's meeting, February's meeting will be moved subsequent to finding out if the guest can be moved and letting the Board handle it. Vote to amend the original motion. Passed many to 2. Vote on the amended motion. Passed unanimously.

Movie Theater Rental: Tony asked if we want to proceed with it. Costs would be: \$100 per hour which will give us their staff and security, they get full concessions. We would probably do double features. We will show science fiction. It will probably cost us about \$700-800 including film rental. We can set our own price for admission which we get to keep. We will have to do our own advertising. Carol asked if we would get enough admissions to off-set the costs. Tony said the Harwan seats over 300. He said if we get 150 people at \$5 per person that's \$750. The first event will not be till after the first of December. Tony said he wants the Board's opinion before he takes the idea to the Membership. All the Board members were in favor of investigating it. Gary made it a formal motion, Tony second. Passed unanimously. Gary will check with our insurance about coverage and Tony will check with the theater to see if their insurance will cover us.

New Business: none.

These are the minutes of the Philcon '98 meeting held on September 13th, 1998, at the Kabakjian's home in East Lansdowne. The meeting was called to order at 1:37pm.

Officers' Reports:

Chairman: Tony said hi.

Secretary: Carol needs your committee lists by the end of October, but would prefer to have them by the October Philcon meeting. Publications needs them by October 7. The end of October is the deadline for your Program Participant/Guest lists. There will be an updated phone list at the next meeting. If you need a Registration form for your committee see Carol. **Remember: Staff has to pay for memberships unless they have rollovers from last year.**

Treasurer: there will be money at the con. You can't have it. If you want/need money at the con you will have to let Gary know in advance what you want, the form in which you want it, and when you want it. Of course, just because you want it doesn't mean you'll get it. We will continue to use the system we've used for the last couple of years; forms to transfer money and maybe forms for checks so we can keep track of them. *Please sign and date the forms as they move.* It's important for accounting purposes. We've got even more cash boxes this year. Joni will need cash boxes for Art Show sales at 1:30 on Sunday.

Fixed Functions Division Head: John said hi. He's here. His departments are reporting; he'll let them report.

Department Reports:

Programming: Rich reminded Oz that Crystal has volunteered to run a Regency Ball if we need to fill some program time and space. She can put one together on short notice. Oz said he will talk to her. Programming has left space for the Regency Ball to be held on Friday after the Meet the Pros party. Oz asked for an increase in Programming's budget to \$1000. Passed unanimously. Darrell said they've made the initial mailing. We're receiving replies. We have a tentative program grid. Most of the annual pieces of programming will be at the same places and times. We need to know what Tom Savini wants to do. The address given for the writers' workshop is wrong, but it won't cause too many problems (it's Darrell's mother's address).

Hotel Liaison: Laura said Bridget is her heir apparent. She will be the one taking everyone's information for their needs with the hotel. Bridget is very good and knows what she's doing. This will probably be Laura's last year as Liaison.

Film/Video/Anime: Tony said we will have it. It's official, film no longer exists. He thanked the Science Fiction Continuum; they have allowed us publicity showing rights to a lot of stuff we don't usually see.

Program Ops: No report. If you know anyone who might want to work for Programming Ops let Shelley know.

Logistics: Bob said there will be a truck. We will have to go to NJ for Masquerade's lighting.

Babysitting: will happen as long as you bring her children.

Registration: flyers were mailed. Reg's are being received. Tony asked because the mailing was late how long would we be taking the \$30 rate? Rich said if anyone writes that they didn't get their flyer until after the cutoff he won't argue about it. (*Unless they try it in mid October.* CK) Joni asked about the rollovers for the Art Show volunteers who worked Sunday. Carol told Joni to send her the usual list and she would make sure they were taken care of. Alex asked what the per unit cost of the registration process was. It would be based on the costs of the badges, badge holders, program book, pocket program, and all other handouts put with the reg packet. We have over 200 reg's. (*closer to 400 at press time* – RK) We'll be open until 11pm on Friday.

Publicity/Press Relations: Hank has been distributing flyers. They will be based in the main hallway, not the Green Room this year.

Science Programming: Hank hasn't fill all his program slot yet but plans to. He is planning panels on dinosaurs and robotics among others and is open to suggestions.

Masquerade: Alex (Masq. Tech.) said we will have one. There is a possibility of using the Masq. sound system for the party.

A.V. Coordinator: would like your list of needs two weeks before the con.

Program Book Ads: The deadline is October 1. Lew has sent out 45 letters to different groups. Avon Press contacted us by e-mail. They want two pages. Bantom is interested in space. We're trading ads with Balticon. Sam Conway, with Anthrocon, wants to trade. He will also try to provide us with Sunday breakdown helpers. Lew will tell him we will trade ads \$ for \$. Lew wants authorization before he talks with them or other groups formally. Tony gave him the go-ahead. Lew would like to contact Paramount or Lucasfilms if anyone has contact addresses. A couple of places have asked for trading ads for major gaming. In exchange for a 1 or 2 page ad Wizards of the Coast will run a certified tournament. Tony would rather have paid ads. Gary said we can't do it, because it's recreational. Steve Jackson only wants free memberships in exchange for running a game. Gary said we could put him on a program and give him a participant membership.

Green Room Registration: Carol has recruited Joe Neff to run Green Room Registration.

Personnel/Gofer Recruitment: Ed wants your requests for warm bodies as soon as possible.

Art Show: Joni said, "Hi. This is not necessarily good or bad, but I don't like being editorialized. In last month's minutes when I reported the problem in not getting the bulk mail paid up and the flyer on time for me to send before BucConeer so that I had to send after BucConeer. I now have repercussions. It is not that the Art Show is not full or it will be. It's that I have confusion from my artists based on the information that was not changed in the six page flyer or on the website which still lists the closing date as September 15th and the fact that... yeah, I know, and here's the answer to that one. It's not that I didn't try. The point is that what people have been getting between the September first and now is confusing. They've gotten the six page flyer which's implied that I sent out a mailing in July when it-mine was only sent basically a week before the six page flyer. And I gave them information to the six page flyer in expectation four months ago that it would not be as close as they were. I've had, like I said, people have checked the website and come up with this same information. It is not, however, stopping them from sending in forms and requests for space. So it's only a matter in calming ruffled feathers, but I don't appreciate having to do that before I get around to telling the last batch 'No, sorry, you applied too late', but we are getting names. We are getting space requests though I haven't opened it to find out who all's asking for what, but we will have our usually good looking Art Show. So, I would like a complete report for my department and this time, just so that there is hopefully some understanding in whoever is Treasurer next year and whoever is creating flyers and culling information next year, the reasons for asking for this information to be given or ready and available in June. Now, I understand that Dealers did its mailing without a [2] page flyer in it. (*Clarification: the Dealer's Mailing did go out with a Registration Form, but no Hotel Card (Hotel Room Rates were not available for inclusion when they were needed, despite 4 months of asking for them.)* — RK) They got the master sent... given to them at the last meeting, off record, so that they could send it at least with the confirmation letters so people will have the hotel booking information. I also distributed a copy of the master to Programming because they asked for it because when mine had been printed they chose to make a single master again to make it run faster so I had two masters available to give away, but it's really needs to be done right with the two page ready by June first or we have repercussions. I don't know what Registration's at right now, but I do know that everybody was figuring things would be a little late after BucConeer which is not as late as it was. The other news is that I will not at the October meetings so Todd will be giving my department report. In general it follows up with what Ed just said and Tony just said; we need bodies on Thursday night for move out and for Friday set-up and for Sunday teardown and Sunday move out at the rates of return that Tony stated. I will order the pizza for those who are at my house on Thursday and I will leave a

sheet with Todd to turn around for sign up and I will try contacting those other people who said they would send volunteers separately. We always seem to have more than enough for Thursday and Friday; it's always Sunday that we have trouble with. Other than that I turned my forms into Hotel and I expect to have no trouble this year." Show up Thursday about 6pm, loading will start at 7. (*Reminder to all: I don't have to print reports at all, just motions, who made and seconded them, and the results of the votes for them.* CK) Tony suggested we post a sign at Personnel then move to the con suite on Sunday to let everyone know about the double/triple time.

Art Program: will happen. Wendy Frane wants to know how many and when her time slots are.

Operations: is under the impression that it will happen. Todd is thinking of reducing the number of beepers from 25 to 20. If you think you need a beeper tell him. If you already have a beeper you can use that at con. Tony suggested having a couple extras in case we have some that don't work. Also we want to have all our Guests (the ones listed on our flyer) to have beepers.

Con Suite: we have one. Carol has decided not to use the soda machine. If con suite is buying the soda for your department and you haven't received the list or if you don't give me the corrections to your list by the October meeting you will get the same as you got last year. Art Show and Ops's soda will be delivered at the October meeting. Soda run will happen after the run to NJ for masquerade's lighting.

Information: Sara said, "Hi." There will be information. We will have a phone. Mike Fisher is her assistant. We can speak to her or him. They have a very good staff, be nice to them. Tony suggested we call T.G.I.Friday's and Denny's and warn them [the con members] are coming. John S. suggested we try to get them to give [the con members] a discount if they wear our con badges. Warn them they will need extra wait staff. Mike said we can't give information if we don't get information. Carol suggested having some SEPTA tokens available. It was suggested to have info. about how to find local hospitals, pharmacies, bookstores, pizza shops, maybe the Zoo, and other local points of interest.

Dance Party: will be Saturday night after the Masquerade so they won't have to strike the sound equipment and the dance can start quickly. It was suggested that the dance floor was set up before the Masquerade and used as a wheelchair seating area during Masquerade.

Web Page: if you have anything you want on it please let Becky Jollensten know.

Party Czar: if you know anybody who's having a party, be it open or closed, e-mail, call, or write Becky Jollensten. Open parties *must* be non-alcoholic. Closed parties should be by invitation and you are responsible for checking ages at your own party.

Meet the Pros Party: will be the same as last year. It will

start around 9pm.

Quartermaster: David said we'll be there. He needs volunteers. Anything you put in Logistics must be pre-packed and tagged. Please leave a list of names of all people who are allowed to have your items.

Filk Czar: We won't have a song writing contest this year as Crystal was tied up with Bucky.

Publications: The deadline for the Program Book cover is October 7.

Old Business:

Surveys: Lew said he would like to do the surveys this year since he didn't get to do one last year due to unforeseen circumstances. Tony asked him to refresh our memories. It's a four page survey to be included with the reg packet, to be filled out at or after the con. It would have general and department oriented questions about what was liked or disliked. Tony asked how much it would cost. Lew didn't know, but would have the information for the next meeting. Tony said we'll discuss it at the October meeting.

New Business:

Function Space: Tony said we have new programming space upstairs: Franklin 1 & 2 and Adams A & B. There will be some changes: Gaming Room will be moved upstairs which opens Gettysburg 3&4 for programming. Laura thought it might not be a good idea to have gaming upstairs since it's 24 hours. The hotel still has the 3am closing in the contract. We can get away with 24 hour gaming downstairs, but not on the main floor. Laura was worried about noise and fans using the lobby after 3am. Books for October

Disasters are part of life. Whether personal, like the hard disk crash I just lived through; public, like what President Clinton is living with; or economic, like what Russia is going through, we all live through disasters and somehow find the courage to survive them. Fictional disasters can teach us how to handle ourselves during them, and also provide relief our disaster could always be worse. Science fiction and fantasy provide some real doozies of disasters. This month was filled with them.

Stephen Baxter, who has been showing how NASA has destroyed itself in previous novels, now has a real disaster (the most unlikely I've ever heard of) to force NASA to launch a new and desperate Apollo mission to the Moon. The problem is dust from moon rocks, or *Moonseed* (hard from Harper Collins) that contains alien nanotechnology from a starship that aeons ago hit the Earth and separated it from the Moon. In contact with earth this stuff starts dissolving the Earth and unlocking volcanoes. Mr. Baxter provides very realistic views of this unlikely occurrence and interesting characters that keep you glued to the pages. His solution is not very likely, but also very interesting. In Wil McCarthy's *Bloom* (hard from Del Rey), the things that dissolve the Earth, Mars, and Venus are organic dust from the stars. Humanity, which now lives in colonies in the Asteroid Belt and around Jupiter send a desperate mission to the inner Solar System with new technology that can investigate this phenomena. Told by a reporter on the tiny ship, the crew faces not only physical dangers, but also opposition from humans who believe the bloom is really beneficial. I really like the way Mr. McCarthy developed his odd human civilizations living on the edge of this calamity.

Humanity has all but destroyed the Earth in World War III and is sending out starships looking for a new home. At the same time something is dissolving the universe and that something may be God. Michael Capobianco and William Barton take a crew of six raunchy humans on a trip to the heart of that *White Light* (trade, Avon Eos). I was reminded of a language test I took in the Army decades ago. The designers of the test made things weirder and weirder until I couldn't follow it anymore. If you can follow *White Light* to the end, you might find God. I got lost.

George Zebrowski believes that at some time we will send prisoners to the ultimate prison, in mined out asteroids sent on solar orbits that won't return until all the sentences are over. *Brute Orbits* (hard from Harper Prism) is told from the unsettling view of those prisoners. I wouldn't want to be them. Fred Saberhagen returns with a new Berserker novel in which an especially bright Berserker machine, *Shiva in Steel* (hard from TOR), attacks a secret military base. Mr. Saberhagen's heroes are odd-ball characters rather than dedicated military types. A smuggler, a charismatic would-be Napoleon, his dedicated followers, and a psychopath all provide the elements that can stop this unstoppable life destroyer.

I was awaiting eagerly for David Weber's *Echoes of Honor* (hard from Baen) because I really have enjoyed the series so far. The series, starting with *On Basilisk Station* (inexpensively reprinted for new readers) showed a courageous female Hornblower of the future, and the previous novel left Honor Harrington in *Enemy Hands* (paper). But in spite of Peep attacks on the rise and Honor trying to escape the hellish prison planet, the best I can call the book is routine. It is not up to the fun of the rest of the series. Article 23 (paper from Baen) is William R. Forstchen's law for treason which his space cadets face on a training flight with a mad captain like out of *The Caine Mutiny*. It was fun and exciting.

I really enjoy what Deborah Chester has done with the *Alien Chronicle* trilogy she is doing for Lucasfilms.. The middle

book, *The Crimson Claw* (paper from ACE), takes the golden Aaron, Ampris from gladiator to freedom from ruling reptile, the Viis. It is just as much fun as the first. Rick Shelly is one of the best tale teller of ground-pounders of the future. Lon Nolan, now *Lieutenant* (paper from Ace) in the Dirigent Mercenary Corps has an exciting time when one world in a system invades its richer neighbor. This was perfect for reading while waiting for my daughter to board her bus to Israel, exciting enough to keep interest, while not complicated enough to worry about details. Mike Resnick tells of *The Widowmaker Unleashed* (paper from Bantam Spectra) in which the real gunfighter now awoken healed has to find a safe place for himself in a galaxy filled with killers trying to cash in on his reputation.

Patricia A. McKillip is a lyrical writer so it makes sense that her latest is *Song for a Basilisk* (hard from ACE). It is about the only survivor of a ruling house, the evil head of the ruling house which supplanted it, and a mysterious musical magic. Margaret Weis and David Baldwin replace vampires with disciples of an immortal dragon in their tale of deadly killers in the night, *Dark Heart* (hard from Harper Prism). Justin, the disciple who lost his first wife to the black death, is fascinated by a police woman investigating a murder he committed. This is only the first of a trilogy and I look forward to the next. I also like the first of Dave Duncan's tales of the King's Blades, *The Gilded Chain* (hard from Avon Eos) about the life of a swordsman who serves faithfully, but eventually has to confront his king who has slipped into evil.

I found the concept of a fighter allergic to magic interesting in Doranna Durgin's *Wolf Justice* (paper, Baen). Reandn has to protect a diplomat entering his country from her enemies. I always like fast action. Mercedes Lackey and her husband Larry Dixon have another tale of the village of Errold's Grove and another barbarian invasion. In *Owlsight* (hard, DAW) the barbarians are sick and Kiesha, who is learning to be a magical healer, has to figure out how to heal them. Andre Norton tells of a place where there is a *Scent of Magic* (hard from Avon Eos). Willidane, a herbalists apprentice with a true scent talent has to find the evil corrupting her kingdom so her princess can marry a prince.

I'm not sure I liked Brian Stableford's *Inherit the Earth* (hard from TOR) about big corporations blocking true immortality, but he does make interesting arguments for creating artificial plagues to sterilize most of humanity. I also have mixed feelings about Peter Delacorte's *Time on My Hands* (trade from Washington Square Press) about a writer sent from our time (with a time machine discovered in a museum of industry in Paris) to Hollywood in 1938 with a mission to stop Ronald Reagan from ever becoming President. I really enjoyed his depiction of the golden years of the movie studios and of the younger Ronald Reagan (who keeps getting himself killed) but I wish the book didn't need a sequel to wrap things up.

Elizabeth Hand's *Last Summer at Mars Hill* (trade from Harper Prism); Patricia Anthony's *Eating Memories* (paper from Ace); and Paul Di Filippo's *Ribofunk* (paper from Avon Eos) are all collected short works of the authors.

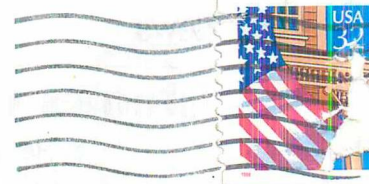
Other collections include *Black Swan, White Raven* (trade from Avon) fairy tales selected by Ellen Datlow and Terri Wilding; *Departures* (paper from Del Rey), alternate history stories reprinted by Harry Turtledove; *The Best of Crank* (hard from TOR) by its editor, Bryan Chofin; *Sisters of the Night* (paper from Aspect) original vampire tales selected by Barbara Hambly and Martin H. Greenberg; and the eighth in the Man-Kzin wars series, *Choosing Names* (paper from Baen).

Paperback reprints include Katharine Kerr's *The Red Wyvern* (paper from Bantam Spectra), the eighth in her reincarnation/Celtic series; William Shatner's *In Alien Hands*, the second about a boy with a secret in his DNA; Patricia Kennealy-Morrison's latest Celts in space novel, *Black Mantle* (paper from Harper Prism); Dave Duncan's conclusion to his Great Game trilogy, *Future Indefinite* (paper from Avon Eos); Janny Wurts long continuation of her tale of two princes, *Fugitive Prince* (Harper Prism); Sean Stewart's odd tale of the waxing of magic in the future, *The Night Watch* (Ace); and a new trade paperback printing of Christopher Stasheff's *The Warlock in Spite of Himself*, a classic far better than any of the endless sequels

About the Society

The Philadelphia Science Fiction Society (PSFS) is a non-profit organization that meets monthly to discuss and promote science fiction and fantasy in literature, the arts, and popular culture. Meetings are held the second Friday of each month at International House, 37th and Chestnut Streets, Philadelphia. Meetings consist of business proceedings from 8:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m., followed by a guest speaker involved in some area of Science Fiction or Fantasy, such as writers, editors, artists, publishers, etc.

In addition, PSFS sponsors an annual science fiction conference, Philcon, and has many special interest subgroups; such as the Book Discussion Group, which meets monthly to discuss a work of science fiction or fantasy; and the Special Events Group, which attends science fiction and fantasy movies and other events.

Membership in the society is open to everyone. Becoming a member is easy. Attend your first meeting; we'll say "Hello." At your second meeting, you can nominate yourself for membership or ask someone else to nominate you. At the next meeting you attend following your nomination, you're eligible to be voted in as a General Member. Our current dues are \$15 for a full year (\$24 for couples), and attendance at 4 meetings each year maintains the status of Active Member.
