ACKERMAN EDITS ONE-SHOT

300,000 COPIES DUE MID FEBRUARY

Los Angeles, December 25, (CNS) -It was learned on Christmas day from the publisher that Forrest J Ackerman has single-handedly written an entire fantasy magazine. FAMOUS MONSTERS OF FILMLAND is the name; format, same as Playboy, 64 slick pages and full color cover. in fact printed on the same press as Playboy, LIFE and Time. Maga-zine contains 25,000 words of copy Magaplus 75 select stills from Acker-man's quarter - of-a-century collection of fotos from fantastic movies. Lead-off article is "Alice In Monsterland". There is a 4000 word history entitled "The Frankenstein Story", with fotos of the 8 different monsters to date. Also an article on science-fiction artist Paul Blaisdell (F&SF cover Jan. '57), captioned "Hollywood Jan. '57), captioned "Hollywood Monster Maker" and showing Blaisdell building beasts and "things" in his workshop. The first BRE issue will contain: "The Slave" by C. M. Kornbluth, "The Chalice Of Death" by Calvin M. Knox, and "Yesterday's Man" by Algis Budrys.

The second issue will include: "One Against Herculum" by Jerry Sohl, "Two Worlds In Peril" by James Blish and Phil Barnhart, and "Secret Of The Green Invaders" by Robert Randall.

Carnell continues: "On the first two issues we have had our artist Rubics paint rather similar covers from the US originals, but hereafter I hope we shall be able to use the US originals. As soon as possible we hope to get around to publishing the BRE exactly the same as the US edition.

"Finally, I am more than glad that we have got together on this and everyone here at the office are somewhat excited at the prospects of the new mogazine."

The line-up for the first issue has also undergone a slight change. A novelette by C. M. Kornbluth, "Reap The Dark Tide", will now be included in the first issue, replacing Alan E. Nourse's "Mirror, Mirror", now scheduled for the second issue.

"This is purely a matter of wordage", Blish explains. "The Kornbluth turned out to fit the space we had available better than the Nourse did. They're both good stories, showing each man in the top of his form. The Nourse simply turned out to be a little short for the space we had to fill."

SCIENCE-FICTION TIMES BOOK REVIES

PA'N OF TI'E, by Robin Carson, Henry Holt & Co., 1957. 442 pp., \$4.95.

In 1939,L. Sprague de Camp, in his well-remembered book,<u>lest Darkness</u> Fall, sent 32-year-old Martin Fadway back to the Italy of 535 L.D.

Way back to the Italy of 535 1.D.. In 1940, Manly Wade Wellman's novel, <u>Twice In Time</u>, projected 19 -year old Le o Thrasher back to Renaissance Florence of the year 1470.

Now, in 1957. Robin Carson takes his 31-year-old hero, Heitman Urban, on a ride through time to Venice in the year 1521.

Much as we enjoyed the other two volumes, we must admit that Mr. Carson's entry in the backwards-in-time theme to p s then both. N ot only does he better Page 2

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them in quality, but he buries them in quantity. Mr. de Gamp's Lest Darkness Fall (Unknown, 1939; Holt, 1941; Prime Press, 1949) ran some 64,000 words; Mr. Wellman's Twice In Time (Startling Stories, 1940; Avalon Bocks, 1957) was some 50,000. In contrast, Mr. Carson's self-styled extravaganza contains over 200,000 words.

For those who enjoyed the Unknown Worlds type of fiction, of which <u>lest Darkness Fall</u> was a prime example, this book is made to order. Mr. Carson employs his time

travel theme for much the same purpose as John Dickson Carr has in several of his recent mystery novels. That is, the story is primarily an historical novel with a modern-day man a s the leading character.

In a nutshell, Pawn Of Time is the story of Heitman Urban, a twentieth century New Yorker who works on Madison Avenue and resides on Bestamen Place. In six-teenth Century Italy h e becomes the swashbuckling Don Jaiman Urban de Biqueman.

Mr. Carson provides a little of everything: many fine examples of humor, an almost steady dist of adventure, liberal helpings of sex, and some very grisly passages des-cribing life and death in that period.

The author's description of the relgious hyproprisy of the times provides many a humorous situation.

Undorlying the entire story is Urban's efforts --- sometimes frantic, sometimes reluctant - to return to the twentieth century. His meeting with a second time traveler, this one from another era, and the final result of his continuing inward struggle as to which life he prefers all add up to a most entertaining and smoothly written yarn.

Pawn Of Time should rate a special niche on the bookshelf of any lover of fantasy-adventure. It stands head and shoulders over most of the material being published in the field.

On February 20, 1958, Doubleday will publish his historical novel, AN ELE-PHANT FOR ARISTOTLE laid in the time of Alexander the Great and ranging from India to Greece. He is working on a juvenile non-fiction picture-book for Simon & Schuster, whose working title is MEN AND HORSEPOTER, and researching for another historical novel, THE ISLE OF THE COLOSSUS, about the siege of Rhodes in 304 B.C.
