## "SCIENCE FICTION STORIES" GOES "TEN -A-YFAR"!

THE TIME STREAM

The delay in the August issue of Infinity Science Fiction, on the stands by now, was due to a change in printers. Starting with the next, first monthly issue, October 1958, Infinity will be printed by a printer in Mass. August was the last issue printed by a Brooklyn printer (that does a good number of the s-f mags), and he just took his time with it.

The science-fiction field lost a magazine this month, but that mag atdn't fold, it converted itself into a pocket-book series. No. 32 of Galaxy Science Fiction Noval appeared at the book store today, 25 June 1958 in its new p-b size.

No. 32, the first in the new
pocket-book size, is "AddresseCentauri" by F. L. Wallace, a reprint
of the 1955 Gnome Press book, and
based on a 1952 Galaxy story, "Accidental Flight". The volume is
neat with cheap plup paper, regular
p-b size, 35¢ and 192 pages. It
boasts a black top and right side
border on the cover format, with an
excellent cover penting by "Wall—
ace A. Wood, Mr. Wood recently—
won a "silver plague" as "The
Best Conic Artist Of The Year" awarded by The National Cartoonists
Society for his work in MAD magazine.

Science Fiction Stories was the first Columbia s-f magazine ever to make the monthly schedule.

SCIENCE FICTION TOPS EAST GERMANY
READER POLL

Dusseldorf, 1 June, (CNS) - The East German publishing firm "Verlag Neues Leben" has been publishing adventure stories in a series "Das neue Abenteuer" for some time now; of a total of 190 issues, (each containing a complete story) only six or seven could be called science-fiction. In a recent poll readers were asked to name their favorite title; most votes were cast for "Alarm auf Station Einstein" (a space station thriller), and another science-fiction story, "Kobalt 60", was runner-up. This result has led the publishers to promise more science-fiction stories in the future.

### ANOTHER NEW GERMAN SERIES

DUSSELDORF, 28 May, (CNS) - Walter Ernsting, President of the SFCD (now SFCE - Science Fiction Club Europa), who left Erich Pabel at the end of 1957, has now brought out a new monthly science-fiction series for the Munich publisher Heyne Moewig. It is a large com-

Each issue contains a complete novel; No. 1 brought the editor's own "Attentat auf Sol" (by 'Clark Darlton'); No. 2 is a translation from the Russian: G. Martynov's "220 Days I n A Space Ship" - a diary of the first Mars expedition. This novel was first published in East Germany last year. Forth-coming issues will contain American (e.g. vVogt's "Slan") and British (e.g. James White's "The Extra-terrestrials")science-fiction.

### "UTOPIA ZUKUNFT" GOES WEEKLY

DUSSELDORF, 2 June, (CNS) - Erich Pabel's "Utopia Zukunfsromane", (formerly "Utopia Kleinband"), the first of the German SF pulp series, which started as a monthly in May 1953 and went fortnightly last autumn, is now published weekly in a larger format (64 pp instead of 48, costing 60 instead of 50 pfen-

## "UTOPIA MAGAZIN" - NOW MONTHLY!

DUSSELDORF, 2 June, (CNS) -Pabel's top-line series, the Utopia Maga-zin short story magazine, is now rublished monthly in smaller and cheaper format (96 pp for DM 1,-instead of 112 pp for DM 1,50). This is no doubt Pabel's answer to the appearance of a German edition of "Galaxy". Editor Walt Spiegl has started to bring novelettes, such as Heinlein's "Coventry", in the Magazin.

## YET ANOTHER GERMAN S-F SERIES

DUSSELDORF, 4 June, (CNS) - Another German publisher, Alfons Semrau of Hamburg, has entered the pulp field with a monthly series of full-plength novels called "Abenteuer im Weltenraum" (Adventures In Space), 6" x 9" format, 96 pp, DM 1, (U.S. 25¢). No. 1 is a translation of Gordon R. Dickson's "Mankind on the Run" and Poul Anderson's "A Star Rebels" is scheduled for No. 2.

SCIENCE-FICTION TIMES BOOK REVIEWS

STARHAVEN, by Ivar Jorgenson. Ava-lon Books, 1958, 220 pp., \$2.75.

This is one of the weakest offerings yet from Avalon, which has been doing quite well by the science-fiction reader in recent mon-

Both from the standpoint of quantity and quality, Mr. Jorgenson's story is lacking. Big type and plenty of space between the lines helps beef the volume up to 220 pages. Actually, it runs about 40,000 words.

The yarn deals with a n impregnable fortress in space called Starhaven, an artificial satellite built by Ben Thurdan as a haven for criminals from all over the galaxy.

John Mantell, a defense screen technician who believes himself guilty of mirder, steals a space-ship and rockets off to Starhaven. Here he meets Thurdan, a very un-convincing villian, and Myra, a typical heroine who is out to murder her former boy friend, Thurdan, and who hits it off immediately with young Mr. Mantell.

It's so poorly done that you get to hoping the willian will win, which he doesn't.

If it wasn't for the fact our hero, who is actually a Space Patrol Agent, double crosses the Pa-trol at the end, I'd swear this was a juvenile. Even the kids wouldn't swallow this one, however.

A STIR OF ECHOES, by Richard Matheson. Lippincott, 1958. 220 pp., \$3.00.

Tom Wallace, placed in a hypnotic trance as a party stunt by his brother-in-law, awakens to find he has developed strange new mental powers. What follows apparently is intended as proof that such "psi" powers can be more of a

curse than a blessing.
Wallace's life in a small suburban community becomes a nightmare. He sees a ghost, receives telepathic messages, accurately predicts coming events, and finds himself reading the minds of his neighbors and finding in them hatred and lust.

Mr. Matheson, who gave us two other entertaining novels, "The Shrinking Man" and "I Am Legend" has built this story as one of terror and suspense and has brought into play all phases of the supernormal.
