THREE S-F MAGS CHANGE NAMES

"INFINITY"

"GALAXY SCIENCE FICTION" BECOMES
"GALAXY MAGAZINE"

NEW YORK, 21 July, (CNS) - The latest issues of "Infinity" and "Galaxy" contain new names. Infinity and Galaxy have both dropped the "Science Fiction" portion of their logos. Infinity has become plain Infinity, while Galaxy has become Galaxy Magazine.

We called up Larry Shaw and Bob Guinn and asked their reasons for the name change. In both case es we obtained the same answer .-Both informed us that they thought that many persons who actually enjoyed science fiction were not buying because the wording science fiction on the cover scared them away. So, they are experimenting by not placing the name science fiction on their covers. Mr.Guinn informed us that for many years he has been sending out sample copies to persons who don't as a rule read science-fiction and that a good number of them have become steady readers of Galaxy. Both hope to obtain a good number of steady readers with the change, and both insist that no changes at all (outside of normal steady improvements) will take place with the contents of the magazines.

"Venture" Skips Again

NEW YORK, 13 August, (CNS)- Editor Bob Hills announced today that Venture Science Fiction will skip the November 1958 issue making the second issue in a row this bimonthly magazine has skipped.

Mr. Eills hopes that Venture can return to regular schedule with the January 1959 Issue. There still aren't any plans to fold the publication.

NEW YORK, 25 July, (CNS) Monster craze (see page 3) has invaded the science-fiction magazines. Mr. W. W. Scott, editor of Super-Science Fiction has informed his writers that the following change in policy of his magazine is to take immediate effect: "I am changing the policy of Super-Sci-ence Fiction somewhat. I now want ence Fiction somewhat. I now want stories featuring "monsters". These can be huge and horrible animals or monsters of the Boris Karloff type. The scene preferably should be another planet or a n o t h o r galaxy to provide scope for the story, but an occasional story may be laid on Earth at the present time. All stories should be science fiction in tone. Length, 2,000 to 7,000 words. Payment 24 a word on acceptance,"

Mr. Scott informed Science-Fiction Times: "All covers, too, by Emsh and Kelly Freas will feature the "monsters". First issue in which full effect of this new policy will be seen will be the April issue. Covers, however, will change at once. The idea for this change came from a conversation with the editor of Science-Fiction Times over the phone."

EDITORIAL NOTE: Our conversation with Mr. Scott was a discussion of the new Monster magazines now coming out and the sale of 300,000 copies of Ackerman's first edition of Famous Monsters of Filmland.

Publisher will ship entire set of ten volumes for 52 Pesos, which is only \$1.30 in our money. Starting with #11, they are raising the wrice per volume to \$6.00 Pesos, which is exactly 15½! The publisher also offer a subscription of 12 ssues (starting with #11) for 190.00 Pesos, including registered surface mail. This is \$2.40 in our money or 20¢ an issue. (The mag is 15½, and apparently they charge 5½ additional for the postage.) They unfouttedly plan to publish bi-

weekly, since they tell me that a subscription of 12 issues is for a period of six months!

THE MONSTERS COME

NEW YORK, 14 August, (CNS)- It all started when Forrest J Ackerman wrote and edited a complete issue of a "one-shot" Famous Monsters of Filmland. This excellent review and information magazine of the many horror movies of filmland, seasoned with the well-known Ackerman wit and hundreds of photos from his famous collection of movie stills swept the country with unexpected delight. 300,000 copies were sold at 35¢ each, and a second printing is still making the rounds of the stands. This was a Class-A job, a rare collector's item.

Forry has since announced that a second issue, also all-written by him, will be on the stands in September.

The 300,000 sold report hit the publishers like a ton-of-bricks, and so "now comes the Monster mag rush". The stands will look like the mad left-overs of a nightmare.

S in c e Pamous Konsters of Filmland, John B. Musacchia,s-fillustrator of pre-war days, now publisher, has brought out World Famous Creatures, and Magmum Publications, papa company of the publishers of Infinity, has Monsters On Marade on the stands with Larry Shaw as Managing editor. Both sell for 35% a cory and both are sorewhat of a feeble imitation of Ackerman's mag.

In England, comes Screen
Chills and Macarbe Stories,
gives in fiction form, the movie
horror films, plus "Them Ones"by
Robert Bloch, and departme ts.

Others are in the works (see page 1 for the first s-f monster mag). We feel that none will come near Ackerman's masterpiece and that as other fads and imitations, will not last long. But for a time the Monsters are with us.
