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# SCIENCE - FICTION ANTHOLOGIES

As a result of almost ten years of research and the overcoming of problems that, at times, seemed almost insurmountable, we are pleased to announce the forthcoming publication of the long delayed CHECKLIST OF SCIENCE FICTION ANTHOLOGIES in October.

The Checklist covers the period from 1927 through 1963. A total of over two hundred anthologies are listed together with the almost 2700 stories that have appeared in these collections. Over 500 authors are represented in our index including their pseudonyms. The CHECKLIST OF SCIENCE FICTION ANTHOLOGIES is not merely a listing of the anthologies published. We have attempted to trace every story to its original source of publication and this data is transmitted in the 390 pages of our Checklist.

Questions that have long plagued the collector and the science fiction connoisseur are answered. Who is the leading author with the most appearances? Which magazine has had its pages gleaned most frequently? Have there been any foreign-language collections? These questions are just a few that we answered in our listing.

Since the first science fiction magazine was published in 1926 there have been several outstanding indexes published. The CHECKLIST OF SCIENCE FICTION ANTHOLOGIES certainly deserves a place along side such works as Don Day's INDEX TO THE SCIENCE FICTION MAGAZINES; Bleiler and Dikty's THE CHECKLIST OF FANTASTIC LITERATURE as well as Don Tuck's A HANDBOOK OF SCIENCE FICTION AND FANTASY.

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
