Bob Tucker was the M.C. and he was never in better form. He handlied his job like the past-master he is. His well timed jokes and sleek remarks had the hall in high spirts all evening.

to the regular "HUGO" awards.

Forrest J Ackerman issued "The Big Heart Award" (The E. E. Evans Memorial-Award) to Bob Tucker for his contribution to the field, and we can't think of anyone deserving it more.

The recent Westercon "Little Men" Award to Hal Clements had been brought to Chicon III and was awarded to him

here.

The Hoffman Electronic Corp. h a s been running two page a d s in Fortune magazine, each ad is a new science-fic-

tion story. The May 1962 issue for example ran "Mirror" by Fritz Leiber. The Convention gave a special award to this company for their use of science-fiction as advertisement.

Fritz Leiber was also issued a special award.

Two special awards by the Convention Committee went to two publications: One pro to Cele Goldsmith for her excellent work on Amazing and Fantastic, a much deserved award, and to Donald Tuck for his excellent fan mag "Handibook of Science Fiction", another much deserved award. This was accepted by Howard de Vore who is Tuck's U. S. Agent. Tuck lives in Australia.

The Guest of Honor Ted Sturgeon was awarded a special award just before he made his speech. Ted broke his speech into three parts: One speech for the fan, one for the pros, and one for the regular readers. Ted was both very humberous and deadly serious in his speech, and received a standing ovation when it was completed.

CHICAGO, Ill,, 31 August, (CNS) - It was learned today that a new professional magazine will soon be out, edited and published in Los Angeles; California.

The new s-f magazine, the first in a number of years, will be edited by Lou Kinzy. The magazine will probably be 82" x 11" in size; price and number of pages are unknown at this time. It is understood that the magazine will contain only 50% fiction, the other 50% will consist of science articles.

337 SIGN IN

Chicago, Ill., 31 August, (CNS) -At 6:00 P.M. tonight the 20th World Science Fic. tion Convention opened the first official session with general Registration: Immediately long lines of fans, editors, authors and readers formed to sign in and received the official program booklet and other objects including two paperbacks: "Some Will Not Die" by Algis Budrys, and "The Ghoul Keepers", edited by Leo Margulies, nine stories from Weird Tales.

At 12:00 midnight the report came in that 337 had registered, while some 700 had joined the Convention organization since it won the nomination at Seattle in 1961 and now.

Registration will g o on tomorrow morning with another huge crowd expected to add to the tremendous number already signed in.

TWO EASTERN REGIONAL CONS ANNOUNCED

Chicago, Ill., 31 August, (CNS) - Two coming Eastern regional conventions were announced today:

The first will be the annual Philly Conference put on by the PSFS (Philadelphia Science Fiction Society) which will be held at the Sheraton Hotel on Saturday November 10, 1962 in the "Halls of Flags West". It is scheduled to last between 1:00 and 6:00 P.M. Only a one day affair is scheduled this year, as last year's two day experiment proved unsuccessful. The Hotel is located at Penn Blvd. and 16th Street, Philadelphia Pa. Registration fee will be \$1.00.

The second will be the regular Open meeting of the ESFA (Eastern Science Fiction Association) to be held the second Sunday of March 1963. No program has yet been announced. Here too, the Registration fee will be \$1.00.

THE NFFF BREAKFAST MEETING

Chicago, Ill., 1 September, (CNS) - At 9:00 A.M. this morning about 40 members, former members and guests gathered at the YMCA for a Breakfast meeting.

After a pleasant breakfast, all present were introduced, and a moment of silence was held for Ralph Holland, - President of the NFFF who passed away early this year.

Two of Chicago's newspapers have given the convention publicity. The Chicago Sun-Times gave a small report, and the Chicago Daily News gave a large report complete with s-f magazine covers and a picture of Isaac Asimov. Both papers are dated September 1, 1962.

WASHINGTON, D. C. IN 1963

Chicago, Ill., 2 September, (CNS) - In what was probably the 'most hurried and quiet World Convention Business meeting on record, Washington, D.C. recieved the bid to hold the 1963 World Science Fiction Convention. No one opposed. It

was the only bid.

One other question that came up was. the Throphy for the Hugo Awards. Because of rising production costs, etc., Ben Jason will stop making the Awards for the World Conventions with the 1963 Awards. So 1964 will have to make arrangements for new designs (possibly) and a new manufacturer. So a motion was made to have the Chairman appoint a committee to investigate this and make a complete report on their findings to the 1964 World There was a motion to table this until 1963. This received 17 votes, and 16 No votes. The Chairman pointed out that a 2/3 votes is necessary to table a motion, so thus the motion had been defeated. The vote was then taken to appoint a committee to investigate the new awards for the 1964 Con, and this was passed by a vote of 31 FOR and 2 against.

About 40 persons attended this business session.

COSTUME BALL -- BEST IN CUSTOMES AND LOUSY IN PRESENTATION

Chicago, Ill., 1 September, (CNS) - What could have been the high spot of all World Conventions was sadly spoiled by some of the shoddiest planning we have ever witnessed.

While there were more persons in eestumes and some of the best costumes ever worn, nobody received any pleasure out of it. The judges were handicaped by being unable to really do their job, those who spent months making the costumes could not display them properly, no provision was made at all for those who climbed chairs and tables in order to get movies and still pictures of the ball, and the audience could but get only a rare sight now and then of the mob scene that passed for the Grand March. This was the worse managed portion of any s-f Convention.

PHILLY CONFERENCE DATE CHANGED

"e were informed that the date of the coming Philly Conference had been changed from November 10th to Saturday, November 3rd, 1962. This had to be done because the Hotel could not hold them on the previous announced date.

STOLEN CASH BOX OF FAN ART BHOW FOUND CHECKS RECOVERED - CASH GONE

Ghicago, Ill., 1 September, (CNS) - It was reported today that the money stolen from the Fan Art Show contained not only cash, but also checks. A checkup of the amount stolen was revealed as about \$40 in cash and approximately \$12.00 in checks.

Eater today the Cash Box, locked, and with no sign of being broken in, was found by fan Jack Brunette of Lensing, Nich. under a black sweater. He immediately returned the box to its owner. Upon opening it, it was revealed that the cash was gone, but that the checks had been left there.

The box was found in the Service area behind the Florentine Room. No clues yet as to who took it.

FAS Chairwoman, Bjo Trimble wanted to point out that even if the checks had not been returned their value would not have been lost thanks to the efficiency of Nancy Kenp who had kept a record of each check.

The box was in the Victorian Room when it was locked at 11:30 P.M. Friday, but was missing when it was reopened at 7:30 A.M. Saturday. Because no artwork was missing, and for other reasons, the FAS committee is fairly certain that no s-f fan is involved. Before leaving anything in the room, they had been assured by the Hotel that there was only one key to the room. After the theft they learned that every custodian had a master key which could open the room.

FIRST AUGITION SESSION BRINGS IN APPROX. \$400.00

Chicago, Ill., 1 September, (CNS) - The first auction session of the 20th World Science Fiction Convention (Chicon III) brought in the grand sum of approximately \$\frac{1}{400.00}\$. Many interesting and collector's items were auctioned off.

Top price was \$61.00 paid for the Powers cover of the Ballantine paper-back "Expedition To Earth" by Arthur C. Clarke. It was bought by A. Watson Miller of Herrin, Ill. As far as I can remember this is the first Convention auction that a Powers painting has been available.

Our own Frank R. Prieto, Jr., obtained a McCauly painting from Handing's s-f mag for \$26.00.

This portion of the wauction wasa great success. There will be other auctions thruout the programing and we understand that some great material is still available, so it would be wise to attend them.
