Fellow Neffers,

I made several nominations, and urge you to consider them. First, for Best Editor/Editrix, I nominated Lida Quillen and Chris Kennedy. Many of you will not know Quillen. Her publishing house, Twilight Times Books, discovers writers and supports their publishing efforts. Their most prominent cusses is Neffer Chris Nuttall, who — Twilight Times reports — has received from them over a million dollars in royalties in the last decade. The House publishes a wide range of books including both electronic and paper editions. Chris Kennedy delivers military science fiction, including ebooks, well-made paperbacks, and audio books, notably series that actually complete. Kennedy Publishing is one of the few that supports the genre.

For None of the Above, I nominated the 2023 Hugo Awards as the Best Example of how not to run a science fiction award. You can read many details on File770. Among other things, close to a thousand ballots were disqualified...the voters in question were more or less all Chinese. Several likely winners were disqualified for no apparent reason. The committee did a search for the political inclinations of nominees, and disqualified some of them as a result. The published vote counts are highly suspect.

Finally, for Best Novel I call your attention to The Demon's Design by Christopher Nuttall and Good to the Last Drop by Declan Finn.

Wilmar Shiras Bio-Bibliography by Jon D. Swartz, Ph.D. N3F Historian

Wilmar House Shiras (1908 - 1990), born Wilmar Alberta House, was a science fiction (SF) author, who also wrote under the pen name of Jane Howes. Her father was a machinist, and both of her parents




were Massachusetts natives.

Personal Life

Born in Boston, Massachusetts, Shiras attended Boston University, but dropped out in 1927, her freshman

year, to get married. Married at eighteen, she moved with her husband, a newly graduated chemical engineer, to the suburbs of Los Angeles.

She earned a bachelor's degree from the College of the Holy Names in Oakland in 1955; and she received a master's degree in history from the University of California, Berkeley, in 1956. She and her husband, Russell Shiras, raised five children, two boys and three girls, and she said that it was for her



family that she began creating stories.

Publications

Her first SF story, "A Day's Work," was published in Science Fiction Adventures in the November, 1952, issue of that prozine.

Her story, "In Hiding," was published in the November, 1948, issue of Astounding Science Fiction. This story, about extraordinarily gifted children who were trying to find their place in the world with the help of a sympathetic psychiatrist, became a classic in the SF field.

Shiras published two sequels to "In Hiding," both also appearing in Astounding: "Opening Doors" (March, 1949 issue), and "New Foundations" (March, 1950 issue).

These stories then became the first three chapters in her later popular novel, Children of the Atom. This book was hailed as another step in the coming of age of SF, mainly because it served as a precursor to the so-called "psi boom" of the 1950s – promoted in the pages of Astounding by John W. Campbell, Jr, the editor of Astounding.

Her other published SF included "Backward, Turn Backward" (1970); "Shadow-Led" (1971); "Reality" (1972); and "Bird-Song" (1973). The 1970 story was published in New Worlds of Fantasy #2; the last three appeared in the SF prozine Fantastic.

Her novel, Slow Dawning, published by the B. Herder Book Company in 1948, as by Jane Howes, was not SF. She also published several non-fiction books under this pseudonym.

Pseudonym

She used the pseudonym of Jane Howes, but not on any of her SF stories (see above).

Awards/Honors/Recognitions

Her most famous SF story undoubtedly was "In Hiding," a novella that was later reprinted in several anthologies, including The Best Science Fiction Stories: 1949, Great Stories of Science Fiction (1951), Stories for Tomorrow (1954), and The Science Fiction Hall of Fame, Volume II (1973).

Shiras' novel, Children of the Atom, was published by Gnome Press in 1953, with book cover art by Frank Kelly Freas. The Science Fiction Book Club declared it to be one of "The Most Significant Science Fiction & Fantasy Books of the Last 50 Years, 1953 – 2002."

Concluding Remarks

Children of the Atom has been credited, though never officially confirmed, with providing the inspiration for Stan Lee and Jack Kirby's popular comic book creation, The Uncanny X-Men.

Despite her name, there was never any doubt in the SF field about her gender. Sources report that editors with whom she came in contact all addressed her as Mrs. Shiras.

She was born in Boston, Massachusetts, on September 23, 1908; and she died in Alameda, California, on December 23, 1990.

The Writers Exchange Bureau is for anyone interested in writing. You don't have to be a published writer, or strive to be a published writer. You don't have to have written a book, a poem, a story, or the lyrics to a song. All you need is an interest in writing.

Writers Quote for the Month

Get it down. Take chances. It may be bad, but it's the only way you can do anything really good. - William Faulkner *

This month we are featuring Jefferson Swycaffer, one of our N3F writers.

Jefferson says:

I first discovered writing at an early age...grade school...but I was no good at it. Really rotten. I started out very badly, and only picked up anything like "real skill" (which is still dubious!) in college.

I like to write books most, stories next most, and, alas, no, I'm no good at all at poetry.

My favorite genre is "urban fantasy." Do you remember the old TV show "Beauty and the Beast" with Ron Perlman and Linda Hamilton? That's a super example of my favorite genre. I have also written and published seven books of "starships and empires" science fiction, which is also a fun genre.

Yes, I definitely love to read and to write in the same genres. I read a lot of Fantasy and Heroic Fantasy, and write in those genres as well.

Alas, I struggle with every page. It's so much easier just to skip writing for the day and read instead. I have to exercise a lot of harsh self-discipline. I'm also a "seat of the pants" writer; I don't tend to work from outlines, but just plunge rather blindly ahead without really knowing what's going to happen next. It's a process of discovery, and I'm often completely surprised by what I have written.

My advice is to find that discipline, and do the work. Turn out those pages. Sweat blood, chew your nails, stare at the blank computer screen, and, by golly, just make it happen. It's hard. It's mighty blamed hard, but there is only one way forward, and that's to grind out the words, one at a time.

The publishing market these days is very, very tight and restrictive. It is extremely difficult to get published. Don't give up hope, but don't hold high ex-

pectations. The market, frankly, stinks. I wish I could say something inspirational and hopeful, but the ugly fact is that getting published is harder, now, than it has ever been in all of publishing history. Keep writing, and start by submitting to small markets. Collect those rejection slips. Don't despair. Despair is easy. Success is hard.

I've published seven "spaceships and empires" genre SF novels, two "urban fantasy" novels, and a fair number of short stories here and there, mostly in the fantasy or "furry" genres. I'm very definitely a furry!

The best quote about writing is from Dorothy Parker, who said that writers don't like to write...but they like to have written. So very, very true! The greatest reward of all is putting down "The End" at the conclusion of a story or a book!

New series - Black Mirror Needs at least one other member to start. This series has a RM and 1 other member.

We have two NSRR waiting for RM and members -Stranger Things - 4 seasons - Netflix says the 5th and final season will be coming. Raising Dion - Raising Dion - 2 seasons -on-going

1 - A member chooses the series he/she wishes to watch.

2 - When they have decided which series they wish to watch they contact me and I will tell them whether there are enough members to begin the RR3- When there are 2 members, and the Robin Master,

the RR will begin.

4 - The Robin Master (RM) emails the Netflix Streaming Round Robin (NSRR) members with a schedule. Two episodes a week are recommended when starting the RR. 2024 N3F Amateur Short Story Contest

Story Contest Rules and Entry Blank

Now and then, it has been suggested to open the N3F Amateur Short Story Contest to professional writers, writers who have had one or two sales. I've never favored this. It is my opinion that we want new blood. We want to reward the new kids on the block. To be blunt, we want writing that is not that good. We want stories from people who don't know their object from their subject, who don't know where commas go, and who use apostrophes to denote plurals -- but who have a story to tell. I want stories from guys nobody's ever heard of...but in the years ahead, we will. Those who are already successful don't need the encouragement of our little contest. If they were to enter the contest, the danger is that they'd win, every time, and crowd out the promising newcomer.

1. This contest is open to all amateur writers in the field, regardless of whether they're members of the National Fantasy Fan Federation. For the purposes of this contest, we define an amateur as someone who has sold no more than two (2) stories to professional science fiction or fantasy publications.

2. Stories entered in the contest must be original, unpublished, not longer than 8,500 words in length—and must be related to the science fiction, fantasy, or similar genres in the opinion of the judge.

3. Email attachments of Word documents are acceptable for submission. Manuscripts on paper should be typed, single sided on 8 1/2"-by- 11" white paper, double spaced, with pages numbered. The name of the author should not appear anywhere on the manuscript to ensure impartial judging. Photocopies are acceptable, if they are of good quality. Computer printouts must be legible.

4. Contestants can enter up to three stories. Enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope (SASE) if you would like your story returned at the end of the contest. Stories will not be returned without an SASE. Do not send your only copy in case of accidental loss. We are not responsible for lost manuscripts.

5. Email entries will be accepted. Send to Jefferson P. Swycaffer at abontides@gmail.com. No guarantee can be made of email receipt. Privacy and property rights will be absolutely respected. No one other than the Short Story Judge will ever see the submission.

6. There are no entry fees.

7. Cash prizes totaling \$100 will be awarded as follows: First prize is \$50, second \$30, and third \$20. Honorable mentions and semi-finalists will receive a certificate of award.

8. Send all manuscripts to the contest manager: Jefferson Swycaffer, P. O. Box 15373, San Diego, CA 92175-5373; abontides@ gmail.com. Emails with the story attached in word format are preferred. Paper manuscripts are acceptable. All entries must be received or postmarked no later than Dec. 31, 2024.

9. The Short Story Judge is a published science fiction professional, and also a loving fan of the sf and fantasy genres. All comments and critiques are solely the Short Story Judge's opinion, but he promises to be constructive and polite.

10. Stories will also be reviewed by the Editor of the N3F Fiction zine Eldritch Science; authors of suitable tales will be invited to submit their tales for publication in our zine. This review and invitation will only occur after contest winners have been announced, so it can have no effect on the contest outcome.

11. The NSF may want to publish an electronic book including top entries from one or more years of publication. You will not be contacted about this until after the contest is over and prizes have been awarded. If we want to publish your story, you will have to sign over to us first world serial rights. Your willingness to sign over rights cannot affect whether or not you win the contest. Winners will be notified as soon as the judging is completed. Announcements and notifications of winning entries will be made by March 2025. Please take your time and submit your best work. You can resubmit stories previously entered if they did not win previously. All entries will be kept confidential and will be judged fairly and anonymously. The deadline for all entries is Dec. 31, 2024. Good luck!
