The French, British, and Americans have demogracy of a more political, loss economic sort, but our elections did and do weld us together.

If the MFFF is weak and heks vicerous support, and wet the FAPAris strong, resilient, and long-lived, it is due precisely to that. The Fapa member has a direct interest in his club and an audible voice and ballet on its affairs and officers. The NFFF has a self-nominated distator, an appointed staff of officials, no voice for the members other that hat-in-hand begging from the Chief. Fandem seems to want a national club. But the NFFF is failing and will continue to fail until it amm ds it self to democracy and discovers a means for popular decisions and voices.
