No, we didn't forget you were all out there. The reason this progress report took so long to put out is that there wasn't really any progress to report for a long time; the bid just went running smoothly along with nothing particularly new or interesting happening. This is a Progress Report, not a fanzine, so we just didn't send anything out.

Those long-standing members who received Progress Report #2 will notice some of the material repeated in this one. The repeated material is brief enough that we decided to include it for the benefit of all the new members.

1988 BIDDERS

As reported in PR #2, Tulsa dropped out of the race, and Cincinnati jumped in. Since then, New Orleans has also entered the race, and the people putting on the joke Bermunda Triangle bid decided it was a good idea, and became "for real" (Bermunda Triangle is a cruise ship bid that would be held beyond the 3-mile territorial limit, and so might be considered an "out of North America" bid).

Since the now-serious Bermuda Triangle bid is still being considered a joke by many people, the other bidders are asking that people who vote for St. Louis, Cincinnati, or New Orleans as their first choice please DO NOT vote for Bermuda Triangle as second or third choice (at least if they are doing so as a joke; if it really is your secondary choice, by all means vote for it). The reason for this unusual request is that if none of the cities gets a clear majority on the first round of balloting, the "Australian ballot" runoff would give the bid to a site that had many second or third-place votes; the "boat bid" could then win by accident due to votes cast as a joke.



Trans World Airlines (TWA) will be the official airline of St. Louiscon II, and will offer substantial air fare discounts for Worldcon travelers to St. Louis.

In support of the bid, TWA has donated 2 pairs of round-trip tickets to St. Louis. One pair will be given away at a free drawing held at Aussiecon Two, and the other pair will be given away at the NASFiC in Austin. Our downtown Sheraton Hotel has donated 2 double rooms to go with the tickets, so the lucky drawing winners will have a place to stay for the weekend when they arrive in St. Louis. To enter these drawings, stop by our bid parties at Aussiecon and Lone Star Con and fill out an entry form. Pre-Supporting members (existing ones, or those joining at these two cons) may fill out TWO entry forms instead of one, but you must be present at one of these two cons to enter.

BID PARTIES



We threw our first "official" bid party at LA Con II last Labor Day, although we also did one at Archon here in St. Louis last July. Since then, we've been at Contact (Evansville), Windycon (Chicago), Czarkon (St. Louis), Minicon (Minneapolis), MidSouthCon (Memphis), Alti-Ego's (Denver), Conjuration (Tulsa), ConQuest (Kansas City), MidWestCon (Cincinnati), and Archon again.

Committee-run bid parties are currently planned for Okon (Tulsa), Aussiecon Two (the Worldcon in Melbourne), Lone Star Con (the Austin NASFiC), ConTact (Evansville), Windycon (Chicago), and Xarkon (St. Louis); a few others may appear without notice. A party was also thrown on

our behalf by Evansville fans at InConJunction (Indianapolis) and another one is planned for Rivercon (Louisville). More parties will be scheduled for 1986, of course.

We can always use extra help running bid parties, so if any of you who will be attending Aussiecon Two or Lone Star Con want to volunteer some time, we'd be happy to have you.

GUESTS

We have confirmations from our Guest of Honor, Fan Guest of Honor, and Masquerade MC; all three were our first choices. The Artist Guest of Honor and Toastmaster have finally been selected, and we are awaiting confirmations from them. We're excited about our choices, and are sure you'll love all of them; when we win the bid in Atlanta next year, you'll find out who they are.

HOTELS

Of the 5,000+ hotel rooms in the immediate downtown area, about 2,750 are now reserved for us. At least one additional hotel will block rooms for us, but hasn't yet committed itself to a specific number. It looks like the main party hotel will be the Sheraton, next to the Convention Center, instead of the new Adam's Mark at the other end of the downtown area. The Adam's Mark is still blocking most of their rooms for us, though. Two additional hotels are currently under construction within 2 blocks of the Convention Center, and will be available to us if we need them.

Even though all these hotels are within walking distance of the Cervantes Convention Center, we still plan to run 24-hour shuttles up and down the North-South pair of one-way streets that most of them front on (all but two). At least one of these buses is planned to be wheelchair-capable. A second shuttle route through the Laclede's Landing and riverfront areas during the day is also tentatively planned.

In the event attendance greatly exceeds that of a "normal" worldcon (more than 5000-7000), we have a "second tier" of downtown hotels available several blocks west of the immediate convention area. All but one of these hotels are beyond easy walking distance of the Convention Center, but an additional 24-hour shuttle route would be run to serve them.

The downtown and Laclede's Landing/riverfront areas have a special Sunday sales dispensation so several restaurants, including fast-food ones (like the world's only floating (Mississippi riverboat) McDonald's!), should be available to conmembers throughout the extended weekend. A new enclosed mall is opening this summer within a couple of blocks of the Convention Center, and several additional restaurants and snackeries will be available there. There are at least 2 24-hour restaurants within 2 blocks of the Convention Center and, for those wanting truly fine dining, there's also a genuine 5-star restaurant 2 blocks away. The Laclede's Landing complex, with it's many bars and restaurants, is a reasonable walk to the East; the Old Spaghetti Factory should be especially popular with fans.

TRANSPORTATION

St. Louis is the population center of the US, so we're equidistant from everyone in North America, and equally easy for everyone to get to.

TWA serves St. Louis directly from all over the US and several European cities, and will be the official airline of St. Louiscon II, offering substantial discounts to attendees. We're also served by most other major, and several smaller, airlines; if you've heard of it, it probably flies into St. Louis.

St. Louis is a major highway hub, on Interstates 44, 55, 64, and 70 plus US highways 40, 50, 61, 67, and what's left of the famous 66.

Both the Trailways and Greyhound bus depots are within a block of the Convention Center, and passenger train service to St. Louis is available via connections to 3 main Amtrak routes.

VISITOR ATTRACTIONS

As one of North America's major cities, St. Louis has many attractions for the visitor, and several of them are in or near the convention area (the Gateway Arch and Museum of Westward Expansion, the Mississippi riverfront with it's historic levee and several riverboat attractions, Laclede's Landing, the Old Cathedral, the Old Courthouse (where the Dred Scott case was tried), Busch Stadium and the Sports Hall of Fame, the Bowling Hall of Fame, and more).

St. Louis is also a center for both brewing and aerospace manufacturing, and some interesting tours might be possible (both Anheuser-Busch and Bardenheir Winery offer tours, and at least the Prologue Room is open to the public at McDonnell-Douglas).

Forest Park, one of the largest city parks in the country, is a cultural center boasting one of the nation's top zoos, the City Art Museum, Jefferson Memorial (a historical museum), the Jewel Box arboretum, McDonnell Planetarium with the new Science Center, the outdoor Municipal Opera (operettas and other professional evening performances all summer, with a large blcik of free seats), lagoon complex with electric boat and canoe rentals, public golf course, and more.

"TUCKER" AWARDS

A while back, some of us were talking about SF and fandom in general, and the subject of awards came up. We noticed there was one group of prominent people who have no award to honor their activities. This unsung group is SF convention partiers. Being somewhat fond of that activity ourselves, we naturally decided it would be a good idea to institute an annual award for Excellence in SF Convention Partying.

For now, the awards will be sponsored and administered by the St. Louis in '88 Worldcon Bid Committee, and a related group or organization in the future. The awards will be nominated and voted on by the members of Czarkon (St. Louis' "adult relaxicon"), and will be presented at Czarkon. At least this first year, nominations and voting will also be open to the rest of SF party fandom; nomination forms and ballots will be sent to prominent fanzines and clubs and St. Louis in '88 Pre-Supporting Members as well as Czarkon members.

Every award must, of course, have a nickname. The official nickname of this award is the "Tucker".

There will be 3 awards: I each for Pro (writer, editor, or dealer), Artist, and Fan. Couples are eligible as a single nominee. Any SF convention partier over the age of 21 is eligible but nominees MUST be willing to attend Czarkon if they win; any nominee who will not guarantee attendance on notification of award will not be placed on the ballot. Winners will not be eligible for re-nomination for a period of 5 years; losing nominees will be eligible again the following year(s).

The design of the physical award will be a full bottle of Beam's Choice bourbon mounted on a base; the base will have a plaque engraved with the year, award name (Pro, Fan, or Artist Award for Excellence in Science Fiction Convention Partying), and the winners name.

An instant tradition is proposed: that the winner receives the Tucker full, but takes it home from the convention empty (help in disposing of the contents would surely be forthcoming from many self-sacrificing volunteers, all no doubt trying to earn points toward the following year's award).


