

It's been the dream of New Orleans fandom for 20 years. When John Guidry, our chairman, and Justin Winston, our corporate president, joined other NOLa science fictioneers in 1964 to found the New Orleans Science Fiction Association, their avowed purpose was a worldcon in the Crescent City. Iwice before New Orleans fans have campaigned for worldcon rights. Our DeepSouthCons, our Halfacons, our fanzines and apas, our wide involvement in worldcons for the last two decades -- all have stemmed from that common dream: NOLACON II.

True, New Orleans had nosted a worldcon: 1951's NOLACON. But 1951 was a generation before us, and even if one or two of us had attended, it had been as



toddlers. The worldcons we went to on our own, from Tricon and St. Louiscon to Iguanacon and Noreascon II, were treasured and enjoyed, but we kept dreaming our dreams -- of the World Science Fiction Convention we wanted to see. A worldcon full with the qualities s.f. fans and professionals have come to expect, but one steeped in the unique joys and delights of our incredible city. You can't experience a Mardi Gras and a worldcon without dreaming of how well they'd go together.







The DeepSouthCon is Southern s.f. fandom's oldest regional convention. New Orleans has hosted 4 DSCs under the chairmanships of John Guidry, Justin Winston and others. Now Ann Layman Chancellor of our committee has been invited to serve as Fan Guest of Honor at the 1986 DeepSouthCon in Louisville, Kentucky, in late September. It's the second Fan GoH spot for Ann in '86; she's also being hailed at Conquest earlier in '86. Way to go, Chance! Every worldcon bid needs money

-- that should surprise no one. NOLACON II has come up with fundraising technique we think unique in worldcon history. Joe Grillot, slated to run the '88 worldcon's film program, has an extensive private collection of classic s.f. movies and a close buddy who owns a French Quarter dance club. Put these two qualities together, charge a buck a head admission -- voila. To advertise his Fantastic Films, Joe has enlisted the talented pen of New Orleans artist Richard Ory; this is the first of his posters here. You'll see a new one in every issue of The Con They Call the City of New Orleans to come!

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More traditional bidding techniques are the NOLACON II arsenal, too, of course. Under the supervision of Con Liaison Eric



Webb, we've put on convention bid parties all over America ... and will keep doing so right up till Confederation. We showcase New Orleans' Mardi Gras spirit and the incredible municipal drink, the Hurricane. (Ed Emshwiller described it as his "vitamin C fix"; fruit juice is among the ingredients!) We've enjoyed struttin' our stuff and hope all of you have enjoyed us, too, but ... we must emphasize something NOLACON thinks fundamental -- Bid Etiquette.

Our competition with the other bids for 1988 has been friendly, so far, and we aim to keep it that way. This is one fandom, not several. So here are a few simple and rather obvious rules NOLACON II will follow, and expect its supporters to adhere to, as well.

(1) Arrentuate the Positive. No badmouthing of other bids. New Orleans is a great enough city and ours is a fine enough bid to win on their own merits.

(2) Etiminate the Negative.
No sabotage. Too many bids have had posters trashed or party announcements defaced by partisans of rival cities. NOLACON II will have nothing to do with such behavior.

(3) Friendliness About All. We've met the bidsters from Cincinnati, St. Louis, and the Norway, and all are good folk. This is an intense and serious competition -- but it is and must remain competition among friends. We'll do nothing to change that. Visiting New Orleans? Opportunities abound! Between now and Labor Day, 1986, when the '88 worldcon site will be decided, the City that Care Forgot will host the Sugar Bowl, the Super Bowl, Mardi Gras (of course -- come Feb. 8-11 for the best parades), the Jazz Fest, and, late next May, the American Book Association. Coming our way for any or all? Let us know! It's our joy to show off this city and our confacilities person to person. Come on down!

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Once before, the World Science Fiction Convention "came on down" to New Orleans. The year was 1951, Harry B. Moore was chairman, Fritz Leiber was Guest of Honor, NOLACON was the Worldcon. A wild and woolly affair it was, too, to judge by the contemporary con report sent us by Lynn Hickman, First Fandomite and NOLACON II pre-supporter. In April, 1952, Lynn published TLMA #3, the official fanzine of Lynn's s.f. fan club, The Little Monsters of America. In that issue ran "When Fans Collide", Rich Ellsberry's minute-by-minute account of the '51 convention. NOLACON II will attract 60 or 70 times as many fans as the 150 attendees of the first NOLACON. And we will have just as splendid a time.

It'll be a different convention, though. 1951's fandom was a different breed than that which we now enjoy. Cons being so much more rare, fans mostly communicated by mail, which made for at least one classic moment at NOLACON: the appearance of the great Lee Hoffman. Nowadays, Ms. Hoffman's gender is of course universally known; she has, after all, been Fan Guest of Honor at the worldcon. But to meet a young lady, when a lad had been expected, shook Ellsberry and many of his fellow congoers severely. (Happily, but severely.)

Not

so severely, however, that they couldn't enjoy NOLACON, which featured showings of the new s.f. movies When Worlds Collide and The Day the Earth Stood Still, talks by Leiber, Sam Moscowitz, E.E. Evans, and the wildest and most famous convention party of all time, in the last room available at the St. Charles Hotel, rented by Hickman & Co., Room 770. Descriptions of New Orleans, toured on foot and in Lynn's convertible, are lovingly rendered. It's a great article -- expect to see a reprint in a future publication of NOLACON II.


