OF BULLETINS AND VECTORS As stated in the previous Bulletin, this issue was due to be distributed between Christmas 1969 and New Year 1970. Possibly it may still make it. However. This is being typed on December

25th. Yesterday, one parcel of VECTOR 54 was collected from the shop downstairs. One parcel, containing enough Vs for less than half the membership. So a somewhat agonising decision has had to be taken. Now that it is known that VECTOR is at least on the road, this Bulletin will be held up pending the arrival of further, supplies. These, depending on the vagaries (seasonal and otherwise) of British Road Services, may possibly not turn up for another week or two. You'll know, when you get this, whether they were in time or not.

The VECTORial frequency has not, of late, been one of the better aspects of the Association's service to its members. This boils down, in the main, to its editor not having as much free time at his disposal as he'd originally hoped. In fact, for some time he has been ready to hand over to another editor should a suitable candidate be found. Now, barring accidents, one has been found. Also, equally barring accidents, a better method of production. Although nothing is quite in the signed-sealed-and-delivered stage as yet, there is every reason to suppose that 1970 will see (and about time too !) not only regular VECTORs but better-looking VECTORs - with the quality of the contents at least as high as standard.

CONVENTIONS 1970 If you look at Page 26 of VECTOR 54, you will see mention thereon of both the Easter (in London) and the August (in Heidelberg) events. Saves the Bulletin a couple of paragraphs, anyway.

Regarding travel to and from the Heidelberg World Convention, the response to the coach-trip scheme has been disappointing. It has not yet been definitely abandoned, but unless more applicants come forward very soon it will very likely have to be, leaving intending voyagers to make their own arrangements. However, an alternative scheme has come to light. American Express, the firm which is handling all hotel-booking in Heidelberg for the Convention, has come up with an itinerary for a flying visit. This would only cover the long week-end 20th-24th August, but would include night-flights both ways, four nights' hotel expenses at Heidelberg, and sundry expenses en route, at a total cost per person of £48. Individuals participating in this scheme would only require spending-money for food, drink, souvenirs etc. Two points to note, however. One: there is no time left over to see the European countryside. And two: at least 30 participants are required by American Express before it's "on".
