There are three international Guests of Honour - Robert Silverberg from America, E.C. Tubb from Britain, and Dr. Herbert W. Franke from Germany. John Brunner is to be Toastmaster at the banquet - which is to be held in Heidelberg Castle. Other appetisers include a "Bavarian Night" for the convivial-minded, and a riverboat-trip on the Neckar. There will also, of course, be plenty of "hard" programme - talks, discussions, films and so en - in both German and English, with numerous professional authors, editors and so on taking part. Americans will be attending by the planeload, besides sf fans from all over Europe.

Banquet registration is a further £2.16.3d. - which may sound expensive, but the World S.F. Convention Banquet is the central event in the international sf year.)

COMMENTS ON There have been a number of interesting comments on the suggestion that the Association should produce another magazine,

covering the same material-range as VECTOR but with the emphasis on member-participation rather than on quality-for-quality's sake. Bob Parkinson, who is now of course VECTOR's editor, makes the good point that he'd like more of the members' contributions in VECTOR anyway, and "If it isn't of a high enough standard, but shows any promise at all, I do try to say what could be done to make it up to our standard....there is a lot more kudos in being published among the stars at the highest standard than being squeezed into a special low quality magazine because that is the best you can do. What writer really believes that anyway?"

Graham Boak doesn't favour a lesser vector as such, but suggests an out-andout unapologetic fanzine - possibly even a vehicle for amateur sf. "Might even
get some of the worst out of otherwise reasonable fanzines," he adds somewhat
cynically. Hartley Patterson says: "Since Vic Hallett's suggestion for a miniVector arises out of a discussion on the BSFA in general that we had at Sci-Con,
perhaps I should put forward my own views." Which he does. His main point is
that, as he sees it, what the average member wants most of all is news and reviews
of new and, where possible, forthcoming books, so he suggests instead a regular,
red-hot sf-news-sheet. He is not very hopeful that most members will bother to
participate anyway.

Ian R. Williams tends to back Hartley Patterson up, pointing out that recent reviews in VECTOR have been not only out of date, but also too short for his taste. However, he speaks in favour of the "original" concept of lesser vector, and would be willing to contribute to it and even to edit it. (It should be pointed out here that the Association has its own duplicator which, freed of VECTOR, is from (OVER
