And as you have undoubtedly already noticed something new has been added - that this is the bulletin of the federation of Washington State Fantasy Fans. No, we have not changed our prized name but in order to clear up a most peculiar bit of confusion have tried to make our title more precise. It all started you see with the July, 1950 issue of STARTLING STORIES which has been generous enough to include us among its semi-annual science fiction fan club listing. But strange to say it lists also another organization - The Washington State Fantasy Federation c/o one William N. Austin of the Wolf Den Book Shop. Ray Bradbury probably stands now as the top money earner in the science fiction writing field. According to Forrest J. Ackerman in January he made 13 sales to the tune of four thousand dollars! In addition to some of his latest sales to the pulps we are informed that Coronet will publish his story "Mars is Heaven"; it was also recently learned that the same story will be published in Esquire as well -- thus making six times that that particular story has been sold: First, to PLANET, then it was included in two anthologies (one of them "The Best of Science Fiction of 1949"), then to the Columbia Broadcasting System -- it will be broadcast back east - and now to these two magazines.

Miles Eaton sends us news that a new fanzine is being published by one of the Portland fans-John Grossman, whose work has frequently appeared in the FANSCIENT. He is working on it together with Bill Kroll of 1037 - West 18th Street, Des Moines, Iowa. These boys have already put out four issues of a magazine entitled Scientifantasy, which you may have heard of already. This new job which is being published immediately is going to be according to advance report a super color job in a big issue and then fold in order that the boys can go to art school. This color job is costing plenty and Mr. Grossman would appreciate any subscriptions he can get from among the NAMELESS ONES. We are further informed that fandom has never seen anything like it. The price is 50¢ per copy and you can send your subscriptions in care of G. M. Carr, Sec'y, 3200 Harvard North, if you care to. Free issues are offered to those who wish to work as associate editors by typing a story with pica type to their specifications. Queries to the above address (Bill Kroll's) should produce results.

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The second issue of SINISTERRA is now being worked up for publication. If you wish to help or send in material (it would be appreciated) send it to G. M. Carr, 3200 Harvard North, Seattle, Washington.

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At the next meeting of the club, the 18th meeting on May 23rd, 1950 will be held the big auction - the proceeds of which are to go to the support of the NORWESCON in Portland. AMAZING GOING LARGE AND SLICK: Chicago-Bill Hamling, Managing Editor of Amazing Stories, announced the biggest news to hit the science-fiction world since Hugo Gernsback decided to publish Amazing back in 1926. It is the news that Amazing Stories is going slick and large size.

Mr. Hamling stated that "Effective with the November issue, on sale October 10th (the date is more or less tentative,) the magazine, Amazing Stories, will go large size (Blue Book format), 144 pages, two color illustrations throughout. The editorial contents will be divided between fact articles and fiction. By fact articles I mean pieces by leading writers. The articles will be given the same prominence as the other slicks (Satevepost), allow them. The fiction will be slanted in a more adult tone -- not with a lot of technical jargon -- but slick in theme and writing. We will present stories by the top names in the field -- the best fiction the stf writers are able to produce."

"The new Amazing Stories will sell for 35¢ and appear monthly. I cannot give you the lineup for the first big issue, as we are even now making arrangements."

Mr. Hamling went on to comment, "This is the first really great advance science fiction has experienced since 1926. Science fiction has always been presented to the American public as a pulp product. We are now going to give the world its first slick stf publication. The American people are stf conscious. The big slicks use it occasionally, as does Hollywood and the Radio. We intend to expand the field by hundreds of thousands of new readers -- people who wouldn't buy a pulp to read stf -- but people who would buy a quality slick magazine. I feel confident in saying that this is the beginning of a new era for fandom -- and the general stf field."

OTHER NEW MAGAZINES: Walt Gillings' English prozine, Fantasy, will be revived in July with the new title of SCIENCE FANTASY. It will be a quarterly, alternating with NEW WORLDS and in fact roughly approximating the Carnell quarterly in size and format.

In this country, Mr. Robert O. Erisman, editor of MARVEL SCIENCE STORIES, supplied us with the following information on the revival of his magazine: The volume and number of the first new issue will resume from where MARVEL left off when it was discontinued. The magazine will be 132 pages, regular pulp size and 25¢ a copy. It will be published quarterly at first. It will probably be out this fall. Cover artists and interior artists have not yet been decided on. Mr. Erisman had this to say about the contents of the first issue: "Can't let you know contents yet: still being worked on. (But there is a good chance we might have another classic from Burks to rival "Survival!")" As to whether they plan to revive DYNAMIC SCIENCE STORIES, Mr. Erisman said, "Maybe yes, maybe no."

STILL ANOTHER MAGAZINE COMING OUT: It was announced a short time ago that a companion magazine to Clark's (Ray Palmer's publishing Co.)

OTHER WORLDS would be issued in the near future. Title of the magazine is IMAGINATION -- suggested to the editor by the title of the old Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society's magazine of the same name. (which all leads the writer here to interject, we have loads of names left over from the battle for SINISTERRA. Anyone wishing to start a new magazine get in touch with us and you can have one for only outrageously unreasonable price.) Not much is known of the magazine at this date but it is suspected that it will be similar in format to OTHER WORLDS and FATE. Cover of the issue will feature a story by Kris Neville.

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We are informed a technicolor still from DESTINATION MOON will constitute the cover of a forthcoming ASTOUNDING SCIENCE FICTION -- & Heinlein will do a fictionized version of the film for the inside. In addition to this film another entitled NONE COME BACK -- a rocket to the moon film is now in the making.

In this section of the bulletin we are reprinting the information contained in the NORWESCON NEWS BULLETIN No. 1. and hope that those of you who will be attending will find it of value.

WHAT IS THE NORWESCON?

The NORWESCON, the 1950 World Science Fiction Convention, is the eighth of a series of such conventions, which except for the war years, have been held annually since 1939. Previous ones have been held in New York (1939), Chicago (1940), Denver (1941), Los Angeles (1946), Philadelphia (1947), Toronto (1948), and Cincinnati (1949). This is fantasy fandom's annual No. 1 event, where the authors, editors, publishers and readers from everywhere meet to get acquainted and exchange views. Friendships, often enduring, are made and renewed. Here you will meet and talk with scores of people, previously only names to you, whose interests you share. If you are interested in science fiction or fantasy, this will be the high point of the year for you.

THE CONVENTION HALL. The NORWESCON will be held in the Auditorium of the Portland Post No. 1, American Legion building. This three-story structure, home of Oregon's largest Legion Post, houses complete club facilities including, in addition to meeting halls, two bars and an excellent restaurant. The Auditorium is on the top floor, a balcony and a large theatre-type stage, approx. three feet above the floor level, in full view of the entire hall. The acoustics are excellent and it has a good PA system. Altho the whole building is normally closed on Sundays and Holidays, the bar and restaurant will be open for the entire four days of the convention. The hall is located just out of the main business district, where parking is not too much of a problem. The St. Francis and Campbell Court Hotels are just two blocks away and several others are within an easy walk.

PROGRAM. We want to present a number of short (under ten minutes), papers on subjects of interest to fantasites. If you have such a subject in mind, write, giving the subject and outlining the treatment. Also, any clubs or individuals who want to put on any skits or stunts, contact us, outlining them. We will have a theatre-type stage with full lighting effects, so we can handle anything within reason.

YOUR HOSTS. The Portland Members of the NORWESCON COMMITTEE come largely from the Portland Science-Fantasy Society, for the last three years one of the most active local clubs. It is the original publisher of the FANSCIENT as well as the PSFS News Bulletin. Serving both as a local group and as a nucleus for fanactivity for the entire Northwest, it brought together fans who later founded the Eugene SFS and THE NAMELESS ONES of Seattle("and surrounding territory").
