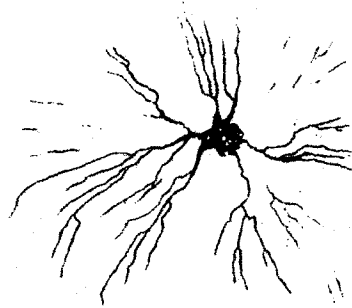


2020 *By Taral*

**TRONNA FANS AT IGGYCON.** Besides Bob Webber, already on the IGUANACON committee (as official Pun Consultant); Taral has been thus promoted, receiving full committee privileges (banquet and masquerade tickets, sitting with the concom, and a t-shirt, with a room refund up-in-the-air) in consideration of the work he had been doing for the con. **ELECTROSTENCILLED PHOTOGRAPHS.** Using an older style Gestefax with choice of all settings, Jennifer Bankier has been able to obtain reasonably faithful reproduction of photographs on mimeo, as seen in ORCA 2. Two cuts are made on the same stencil without moving either stencil or original. For the first cut, a white-dot screen is overlaid on the original and high resolution, high density (or voltage on some machines) and low sensitivity settings used to pick up those elements of the picture that should appear very black. (The screen keeps the excess of ink low.) For the second cut, a lower resolution, high sensitivity and low density is used, in order to pick up grey details and reproduce them in grey. This method can be used with any electro-stencilling machine with variable resolution (lines per inch) and variable density and sensitivity controls.

**LEGALIZATION!** That ambrosia of the bheer world, Brador, formerly only available in Quebec, has now been imported and can be had in ~~Canada~~ Ontario. Among Dere-licts, an expedition was soon mounted (and two bheer stores had to be tried as the first one was sold out) and a quantity of the wondrous elixir obtained. Bheer-loving fans visiting Toronto will be able to enjoy this higher-in-alcohol content malt bheer next time they come here.

**AS CLOSE AS WE'RE LIKELY TO GET.** The boyfriend of one of the daughters of local fantasy fan Dorothy Tate recently won a million dollars in one of the Ontario big prize lotteries. Which, we have to admit, is a more immediate thing than hearing

of five mill workers sharing the loot way off in Moose Factory, as more usually happens. Vayne hopes of winning lotteries continue in modest ways, but it looks as though work continues to be a more certain way to what passes for riches around here. Dorothy and Elliot Grasset were married on May 6 in a quiet ceremony that is a secret from her daughters, who live with them, although openly told to everyone else.

**ECONOMICS AND SIMULACRUM.** Owing to the edgy financial state of the editor, SIMULACRUM is going to have to start making back a reasonable amount of its costs to continue, and availability now goes to "selected" trades, and "published/publishable" LoCs. (Money orders preferred, US checks add 25c for the bank.)

**LEAD IN HEADLINE GIMMICK TO GET YOUR ATTENTION.** There will be a Delta Psi 2, but I must raise most of the costs before I can buy paper or ink and have the necessary offset work done. Δψ 2 will be about 80 pages long, be much like the first in content, have a Dalzell folio, real extraterrestrial material as an enclosure (how is my secret), and will make Delta Psi 1 look plain in comparison. I need to sell about 80 copies at \$3 each to make this possible. Price after completion will be nearer \$4, maybe even \$5, so you can save money at the same time as helping me create something for you to spend it on. (And I warn people not to count on locs on the last issue to guarantee them the next...)

**TRONNA FANZINE UPDATE.** Bill Brümmer is now getting some definite ideas about what is going to be in ELEUTHERIA, but has not yet begun actual work. And it begins to look as though a new PANTEKHNICON will see the light of day, since Bob Webber sees free time on the horizon. The second printing of FANTHOLOGY 76 is about 1/3 completed; four copies of the first printing remain. Taral is all set to publish the Glicksohn papers.

This appears to be a quality version of THE LOOKING GLASS, but I still haven't any interest in comics and media fandom. (Incidentally, I recently read some older zines by Murray Moore and Ralph Alfonso which indicate that comics fandom must have been a more intelligent and creative entity in the days of Xero.)
