And so it goes on. The three candidates of the Nixon-Humphrey-Vallace ticket have been swamping the country with their attacks on our most fundamental liberties. Whichever one of these indistinguishable men is elected, we are in for a hard four years.

As an example of their mendacity, Richard Nixon's team has been circulating a TV commercial featuring one Rob Norsworthy, a "democrat for Nixon". Norsworthy was a volunteer worker for a Republican Senatorial candidate in Michigan in 1966, and was a key side in Governor Romney's abortive campaign for the presidency last year. He is currently campaign manager for a Republican congressional candidate in Michigan. Yet Nixon is trying to pass him off as a disgruntled Democrat among his supporters.
