




### BULLETIN E

It's been only a few weeks since the last issue so there isn't just a heck of a lot new to report. I might mention to all those who are seeing The Dallascon Bulletin for the first and who might be wondering "Why me?", that this is the publication of the "DALLAS IN '73" Science Fiction Worldcon bidding committee. That means we want to have the Worldcon in '73 and we're trying to convince you to vote for us.

The Worldcon this year will be in Heidelberg, Germany, as you undoubtedly know. But you may not know that a plane has been chartered to go to the con. Round trip from New York will be a few dollars either way of \$200. That is a whopping saving and if you plan to go and don't take advantage of the plane, you are either rich or crazy—or didn't buy your Heicon membership in time. A rule of the charter (the FAA's rule) is that you must be a Heicon member six months before the departure of the plane. That time has already passed! However, if you joined in time, write Don Lundry, RD 1, Old York Estates, Hightstown, New Jersey 08520 for further details. And you'd better hurry, the flight must be finalized by April 1!

The rates are quoted in Deutsche Marks because of currency fluctuation. The easiest method of payment will be an International Money Order obtained at the post office. They will do the conversions for you.

Even if you can't attend, you can join and get the progress reports and the Program Book and be able to vote in the Hugo Awards—and also (I think) be able to vote on the site of the '72 Worldcon.

The '71 Worldcon will be in Boston and has been dubbed Noreascon. The guest of honor is Clifford D. Simak. There is where the voting for the '73 convention will take place and you must be present to vote. Complete instructions on how to vote were in DCB 4. (If you are missing any of the previous issues they are all available, though some are getting low. If you would like to have any or all of them, send 12¢ in stamps and we'll be happy to send them to you—as long as they last.)
The Noreascon's address is Box 547, Cam-

bridge, Mass. 02139. It will be held at the Hotel Sheraton Boston, September 3-4-5-6, 1971. Nonattending memberships are \$4 and attending memberships are \$6. The rates will go up Sept 1, '70 so join now. Besides, they need the money.

I'd like to encourage everyone to attend Multicon\*70 in Oklahoma City June 18-19-20-21, 1970 at the Skirvin Hotel. Membership is \$3.50 from David Smith, 133 Mercer St., Ponca City, OK 74601. The first 250 members will receive a free print of an original Frazetta drawing, so I would suggest that you join immediately—there aren't many

The Oklahoma fans have really been working hard on this convention and I think they're going to have a good one. David Smith and Robert Brown were in Dallas for the January DaSFS meeting and they are very excited about it. They have four guests-of-honor (which is something of a tradition breaker): R.A. Lafferty, Jim Harmon, Reed Crandall and Buster Crabbe. They are very optimistic about Al Williamson and Roy Krenkel also appearing on the program.

The hotel rates are \$10 for a single and \$14 for a double. When you join you will be sent a room reservation card. Other features will be allnight movies, a banquet (I'm not sure who the speaker will be), and the largest huckster room of any convention except the Worldcon (and we're just

about to pass them up).

I say "we" because the Dallas, Oklahoma City, Houston conventions all fall under the general collective title of Southwesterncons. You wouldn't know it by looking because each city has its own ideas and the only similarities seem to be the large huckster rooms and the all-night movies. We're planning even further divergence when the con returns to Dallas in '71. We'll have the huckster room and the all-night movies but the rest will be totally new.

One new feature instituted by the Oklahoma fans (which the Dallas fans plan to continue) is an amateur film makers competition. An award will be given to the winner but I'm not sure as yet what. Any amateur film is eligible—it does not have to be sf or fantasy. You may bring your film or you may send it if you cannot attend. But, please! let the committee know at least a month before the con that you will be entering a film. Tell them if it is 8mm, 16mm or super-8; if it is optical or magnetic sound or silent; and most important, the running time. They need to know this to arrange the schedule. There will be facilities for showing 16mm silent or with optical sound; 8mm silent or with magnetic sound; and super-8 silent or with magnetic sound.

I'm very subtly leading up to a discussion of my own film that I'll be entering. I started work on it shortly after returning from St. Louis when, after listening to Doug Smith and seeing some of his films, I got the uncontrollable urge to make a film-and now I'm hooked. (Doug Smith, by the way, is the publisher of Asmodeus and also the first prize winner in the 1969 Kodak teen-age film makers competition (or whatever the exact title is). He won \$150 and a trip to New York City where the award was presented by Jack Valenti. Doug is on the verge of becoming a professional—and he's only sixteen. His award winning film is done in stop-motion and is entitled "The Wad and the Worm". It will also be entered in the Multicon competition.)

Doug, with Mike McWillie, is one of the two principal actors in my film. Also appearing are:
Joe Bob Williams, Richard Fowler, Oliver Rankin, and Clare Wilson. It's a heart-warming story in which Oliver is badly beaten by Mike, Joe Bob and Richard are killed by Mike, Doug is killed by Joe Bob, and Mike goes merrily insane. Clare is the only one who comes out whole and that's only because she decides not to get involved.

Everyone in the cast is a DaSFS member except Oliver. He's a non-fan friend of mine who got the part of the policeman because he is an ex-policeman who still had his uniform. But he was so good he has already been cast in my next production. In that one (if present plans don't go awry) he will, instead of getting beat up, be shot in the gut with a shotgun. I think you'll admit that's a tricky scene to do and he and I have been experimenting as to how it can be done convincingly without actually killing him. He's not that dedicated to the project.

Anyway, we had a lot of fun doing the film and I hope you will have fun watching it at Multicon. For those who are interested, following are some production shots and stills from the movie—which is called "Fugue".



AND each issue we give a free classified to fans from three states selected at random. If your address is in Illinois, Maine, or Hawaii you have five free lines in DCB 6. Next issue three more states will be selected at random (sort of).

SIZE OF ADS: Please read carefully and then do it. Your full-page ad will be reduced to 6-3/4" x 9-3/4". We would appreciate it very much if you would make your full-page ad one of the following sizes: final size—
6-3/4" x 9-3/4"; 50% up—10-1/8 x 14-5/8; or twice-up-13-1/2 x 19-1/2. To judge the size of a half-page ad, use the first number x 1/2 the second number. For quarter-page, halve both numbers. Thank you. It should make things simpler for both of us.

The last issue was so late that it forced this issue to be late as well. We had hoped to get back on schedule we had hoped to get back on schedule with #6 but I can see that we will not be able to do so. However, it will only be about two weeks off. So, instead of the deadline for #6 being April 1 as it should be, it will be April 15. That means the issue will go to the printers about May 1 and be in the mails about the middle of May.

get rid of the non-costumed clowns without a performance, but this could add a great deal of time for the costumed ones to remain in costume. Many costumes will just not last long, and are easily torn or damaged.

Oh, does the DB have a circulation or print run of 5000? The pro mags tell their advertisers their circulation is 3X their sold number of copies."

((This was received before DCB 4 was published so most of your questions concerning the masquerade were answered there. When I had the idea of pre-screening the costumes, I knew it was something that had to be done but I didn't have any specific plans for how. St. Louiscon solved the problem by having all costumers register their costumes a certain period of time before the masquerade began. Those who hadn't registered couldn't participate. This had the same effect as a prescreening as the non-costumes are usually impulse entries anyway. And if one tried to register they could be rejected.

This letter also arrived before we started claiming a circulation of 6000! After we added the St. Louiscon membership to the mailing list, the circulation is a little over 5,500. We have a print run of 6000 and have a few hundred copies left over for late arrivals. If we used the pro mags' calculations, we could claim a circulation of about 17,000!

You might be interested in how we built the mailing list—there has been some curiosity in certain quarters. We started with the MIT Directory of Fandom which had about 2000 names. We boiled it down considerably as they listed husbands and wives as two and we list them as one. Then we added the Trumpet mailing list, the N3F Roster, and the membership of the 1968 Southwesterncon.

After that we gleaned fanzine letter columns, fanzine review columns, and the daily mail. We have added the St. Louiscon membership and, with being reviewed all over the place, now add only those who request to be added. And that's it; we don't search 'em out any longer, we let them find us.))

Don Lundry, RD 1 - Old Yorke Estates, Hightstown, NJ 08520: "I could use all the publicity possible on this thing ((the charter flight to Heicon)) since I am (apparently) having trouble getting the word out that we are again accepting deposits for the plane. The deposit has been bumped to \$75 since we're getting closer to the deadline for the full payment. ((April 1)) What we're trying to do now is fill up the plane instead of splitting the charter with some other group. The plane holds 183 and we have about 70. Well over a third, but I'd rather not have to contend with some other group. It's bad enough getting all the wisecracks at cons, but in a plane it's annoying. So I'd rather get more people signed up. Any help is appreciated.

Oops, small side note. Nobody that I've heard worrying about Elliot Shorter up here is worried about what's going to happen inside the hotel. It's outside the hotel at whatever restaurant he and others may want to go to. And it's not the overt snub, it's the more subtle ones like waiting in line with reservations while others zoom by you to the table. I don't know myself whether such things might happen, and I'm not worrying about it. However, this is the general thought on it. I think you handled the question rather well in the Bulletin."

((I'm glad you're not worrying because I don't think there is anything to worry about.

I've mentioned the Heicon charter earlier in this thing. If you want to take advantage of the reduced


rates on the Heicon plane and weren't a member of the convention the required six months previous to departure, you might write Don and see if there is any way to circumvent to rule. It can't hurt.))

I have no idea what happened. I guess they just decided to close up shop. Anyway, everyone is getting their money returned so no harm is done.



### Amra

Amra began as a magazine for people specifically interested in reading about Robert E How ard's heroic character, Conan. Along the way, it has twice been awarded the Annual Science Fiction Achievement Award -- the HUGO -- for the best fanzine in those years. Not the least of its features is the uncommonly good artists Amra has managed to pick up, like Gray Morrow, Jim Cawthorn, Dan Adkins, Tim Kirk, George Barr, and Roy Krenkel (whose work appears to the right and below).

Over the years, Amra found it necessary to touch every field which had the least connection with Conan. Directly, Amra has had articles dealing with what we call sword-&-sorcery fiction: that kind of story in which the hero or the villian may cast a spell or wield a blade with equal propriety, according to the terrain and the tactical situation; in a general sense, stories with pre-gunpowder technology in which magic works. Thus, in addition to its first interest, Amra has covered other heroes invented by Howard, some other Conan-like heroic heroes written of by others, and people in swordplay-&-sorcery who are principal characters with-



out being exactly heroic about it. Thus, we have gradually brought to our pages all the collateral areas of interest from archaeology, bronzeworking, and cozenage through xenanthropology, yachting, and zymurgics. In the past, our topics have ranged from technology to Theosophy, from the wily East to the Wild West, and from before the sinking of Atlantis to after the cooling of the sun. And always, we've been thoroughly illustrated by our crew of artists.

Amra v2 #51, just out, has articles by Sprague de Camp and Lin Carter, and a map of Lankhmar by Fritz Leiber; send us 50c for a copy. Or better, send us 4\$ for the available back issues, ##44, 45, 46, 47, 48, 49, 50, and 51, and decide for yourself if Amra really deserved the awards given it by two World Science Fiction Conventions.
