A FEW MORE FANZINE REVIEWS

SHANGRI L'AFFAIRES, Volume "C", Number 3, Summer 1986. Published quarterly by LASFS, \$1 per copy in person, or \$1.25 by mail. Charles Lee Jackson II is the new editor of the LASFS Clubzine, and seems to be having a problem getting quality contributions. I find the items by Mike Glycer and Mike Farkash to be pale imitations of Woody Allen. More thoughtful is the regular by Allan Rothstein, on the subject of death. Worth getting an issue and seeing if you like it.

NEOLOGY Vol. 11, #4: Whereas LASFS published a monthly DE PROF and a quarterly SHAGGY, the Edmonton Science Fiction and Comic Arts Society (ESFACAS) prefers the more traditional idea of a bi-monthly clubzine with the combined functions of newsletter and genzine. The result is quite good, and the editor, Kathleen Moore, seems to have a firm hand on the project. This zine will give you a good view into Canadian Fandom. Single issues are \$1, payable to ESFACAS.

THE MENTOR #59: Probably the best fanzine I have received this month, and one of the best to come out of Australia. Cost is \$2, and it is a bargain. This is a packed 66 pages of reviews, articles, fiction (actually quite good), letter column, editorial, and so on. THE MENTOR has survived the death of its best columnist, A. Bertram Chandler, and looks to be better than ever.

GROGGY 29: Available for the asking, this little gem of a perzine is the last place in fandom to see a real, honest hecto art cover. And Eric Mayer is one of fandom's best writers. After getting the first issue free, you are required to write a letter of comment for further issues. There is enough thoughtful writing in this zine that you should want to.

MENACE OF THE LASFS: Meeting #2575, December 18, 1986 Mike Glycer, Secretary.

Vice President Rick Young rapped the live mike, and rang the bell -- if he had a book and candle, he'd have been properly equipped to reckon with the LASFS. No sooner had the meeting commenced than we saw the spectre of Doug Crepeau in the capacity of acting Registrar. He handed a green card to his guest, who did not faint, the explanation revealing that she is his mother.

Rick Young read the Treasurer's Report. Glycer read the minutes. Marjii Ellers rode to the rescue as substitute acting Registrar, to introduce Dr. Syd Garfield and the aforementioned Marie Crepeau. Rick Young declared that tonight was the last night to pay your annual dues with plastic, according to co-Treasurer Robbie Cantor. Co-Cantor Marty invented a new way to get his announcement in ahead not just of the committee reports, but even ahead of the announcements disguised as committee reports. To add more than a bit spice, Charlie pointed out that if anyone had seen the video of THE JADE DRAGON, her character is the daughter of the character Bela Lugosi plays in tonight's film. On other fronts, Charlie had to change January's planned film because the rental fee had been raised 130%. "Talk to Bjo -- get 30,000 letters telling the library to get its price back to normal." Charlie was told that if he wanted 30,000 letters, to get Vanna White.

Mark Poliner, the Committee to Up-Stage, put on his Smurf hat and four-fingered blue gloves, to forewarn us about his costume at tomorrow's Gift Exchange.

Hare Hobbs explained why he had written the address for the Wildlife Waystation on the chalkboard. He said he found a possum last Friday and turned it in to the Animal Shelter, who put it to sleep because it was unable to survive in the wild. Harold said this wouldn't have happened at Wildlife Waystation. "Think of it as evolution in action," said Glenn Glazer unsympathetically. "Has Glenn reproduced yet?" inquired Glycer. Charlie Jackson answered, "Not for lack of trying."

ANNOUNCEMENTS: Clarke Louch said Eddie Murphy is up to his usual standards in THE GOLDEN CHILD, but he didn't make it sound as if it was a compliment. Clarke said the film was very predictable -- worth a matinee showing.

Rick Foss asked, "Thinking of attending Universe 87?" He announced additional pros to attend -- Sucharit-

kul, Kingsbury, Spinrad -- and said this would be more than a games con, it would be a full scale con.

The Unknown LASFSian (Which means I didn't catch his name) reviewed STAR TOURS, the new attraction at Disneyland. He recommended it if you ever wanted to be in Star Wars. He added that if you're at all subject to airsickness, take a Dramamine when you get in line, because you'll need it by the end of the ride. The ride shows only a forward view, he said -- it shakes and moves, and feels "real".

Reporting on his special showing at the past Second Sunday, Charlie Jackson said fans found out that day why CLJ2 doesn't run Columbia's serials on Thursday night -- the Republic Studios ones are much better. This is an awesome concept for some.

Bruce Pelz closed the meeting with announcements of the availability of ROMA MATER and VOL. 1 THE JOHN W. CAMPBELL LETTERS, and an explanation of the LASFS Xmas Gift Exchange rules. (For posterity, they are: Bring an anonymously wrapped gift worth \$5.00 minimum, related to the field of SF, Fantasy or Fandom. Doors open at 7:00 PM. The exchange starts at 9 PM. When you drop off your gift, you get a card bearing a number. At 9 PM they'd take the random number list, and auction off the right to determine which direction one would proceed through it. The first number called would pick a gift, open and show it, and sit down. This is the best position. Second is the worst position. Second picks, opens, shows, and may force trade with the first gift opened. This proceeds down the line. The last person called may force trade for anything (or keep what one opens, of course). Then the first person to select has the option of a final forced trade for anything that has been opened. At the end, if a gift is considered unworthy, there is the possibility of a Crud Call. at that point, any person may accept the "crud called" gift in trade for what they are holding, which cancels the crud call. If no one is willing to trade, a majority vote will rule whether the item is "crud", and if it is judged to be crud it is forced back on its donor in exchange for what he or she is holding).

The meeting adjourned to a brief auction.

MENACE OF THE LASFS: Meeting #2578 -- January 8, 1987 Mike Glycer, Secretary

Prior to tonight's meeting, members discovered an eight-foot-long crate outside Freehafer Hall. Instructions written on the side said it could be opened by taking out all the red-painted screws around the top exterior edge. A dozen members set to work with screwdrivers, and took off the lid. Inside the plywood coffin was the shaft from some piece of equipment dismantled while NESFA was removing the dry cleaning works from their new clubhouse. Yes, NESFA had given LASFS the shaft.

President Patrice Cook called the meeting to order. Then she called Glycer to order, who had been staring at a male fan seated with his arms around two women, one of them Calendar Girl Therri Moore. "I ran for the wrong job. I want to be elected whatever he is," said Glycer. Then Patrice made him read the minutes.

Afterwards, Patrice led three cheers for Saint Bruce. Then Rick Young introduced his five guests; Faye Manning, Fred Z. Trust, Richard J. Trust, Glenda Dunning, and Pat Lambert. (Later in the meeting there was a sixth: Luetta L. Robinson). Calendar Girl Therri Moore was back despite her plans. The job and schooling she thought would conflict with LASFS had fallen through. On behalf of the treasurer, Patrice announced that it's a new year, pay your dues.

Program organizer Rick Foss stated tonight's program would be Dr. Thomas Clareson; 1-15 Charlie's Film Program; 1-22 Master Costumers; 1-29 Japanimation. Foss also said this would be his last month as the LASFS Program Committee, because Patrice had asked Craig to assume the post. Foss was given a round of applause as thanks, particularly by members who recalled that before Foss took on Programming during Deckert's presidency, it had been 10 or 12 years since there was a concerted effort to program the majority of the meetings.

Craig Miller was called on to explain the big box in front of the clubhouse. He told the tale, and read NESFA'S letter. There was also discovered, in the bottom of the crate, a copy of INSTANT MESSAGE addressed to FILE 770. (It's a good thing they sent it to LASFS -- it wouldn't have fit in my mailbox.) Marjii Ellers said we should publicize "that NESFA admits we have the drive." Marjii was applauded.

NEW BUSINESS: Adams Douglas, seconded by Joe Zeff, moved that "the following two proposals for the disposition of the shaft recently received from NESFA be considered: (1) that funds be allocated to ship said shaft to Nova Mob in Melbourne, Australia, as a sercon group; (2) that 50 LASFS members donate 10¢ each to make the shaft a club member. Afterwards Patrice appointed the suggested committee of Glycer, Donahue, Weinstein and Miller.

MONKEY BUSINESS: Ex-President Chuck Donahue approached the front table and opened his briefcase. He passed the gavel over to Patrice. Then he handed her a can of Popeye Spinach. A wit in the crowd said, "That way you can remain strong to the finish, inlike Chuck!" Ah, all glory is fleeting...

ANNOUNCEMENTS: Marty Cantor reported the DUFF winner is Bay Area fan Lucy Huntzinger. Marty also presented a thank-you letter to the club on DUFF stationery for LASFS' support of the fund -- \$632 raised at mini-auctions before the meetings. The Cantors have now retired as DUFF administrators, but their trip report is almost ready for distribution. It will cost \$5, so save up.

Mark Poliner stood up in his mismatched clothing as the Committee to Upstage. Rick Foss announced fares to Boston had decreased recently, for anyone thinking about Baokone. Round trips to London are under \$600 and will hold for a while, should you be planning to attend the Worldcon.

Jan Jennings announced a January 18 meeting of the writers' group. Doug Crepeau commented on the CHILDHOOD'S END miniseries -- the one that's not a hoax. Therri Moore had the latest DE PROFUNDIS available and jawboned members to get their copies tonight so she wouldn't have to mail them.

Chuck Donahue, mindful that he is not President anymore, must find new ways to make a fool of himself. In that line he is bidding to run LOSCON 15. ~~Styx xxx xxx xxx~~ Donahue had for sale \$1 presupporter buttons and \$3 preopposer buttons. Glycer promptly borrowed money from Cheryl Chapman to purchase a preopposer.

The meeting adjourned to Dr. Clareson's program.
