52- LETTERS FROM YOU: "Wasn't that a nice write-up in SCIENCE ILLUSTRATED? Surprised the hell out of me. The copy of Amz in the foto was the only disappointment. Who is this Groff Conklin? I seem to remember the name 'G. Conklin' from somewhere. I first thought that it had appeared with 'Calvin Perego' in collaboration for stories in the old Astoundings, but failed to find it upon researching. Could it be another penname of TCMcClary's?"-- Don Bratton of Hollywood. Joe Kennedy sends compliments "Received EMBER #2, and for a single sheet found it a very readable and thought-provoking publication. Format good, numbering of items reminiscent of BLOOMINGTON NEWS-LETTER." Another locality exhibits the peculiarities mentioned in item 13, for Albert Lopez writes "There is a place in New England reported by Ripley, I believe exhibiting characteristics similar to those you mention."

53- Milton Rothman writes, "Here's an item that might be amusing for Ember: You will recall a fuss made a couple of years ago about a 'magnetic current' supposedly discovered by Felix Ehrenhaft, a New York physicist. Astounding carried an article and it was in the papers. Then Astounding dropped it like a hot potato, although they'd promised further reports. Well, it seems that Ehrenhaft is still around writing copious letters to THE PHYSICAL REVIEW, which print abstracts of them with a straight face. Apparently nobody pays any attention to them because in every letter he has a new and momentous 'discovery', all of which causes not the slightest excitement among scientific circles."

54- CLIPPINGS from the mundane newspapers: Carlson sends two- PREDICTS TRAVEL BETWEEN PLANETS and MOVE OVER GARGANTUA, BROTHER MAN MAY BE MOVING INTO THE ZOO. The first clipping stems from AAF remarks on the subject--to the moon in 18 months and to the planets within 30 years. Major Calhoun, basis of the story, seems to be ahead of his time for the general run of the military. He expects the AAF to have a man carrying space ship within five years. The second is an editorial from the Minneapolis Tribune under H V O Eiren's by-line. The substance of the piece echoes some of Campbell's mutant worries--the globe will be taken over by the super-mutants who will stick Homo sapiens in cages. Dunkelberger sends a long clipping with the following explanation: "The article was written from my notes as Clarence had left for Mazila the previous Tuesday. Clarence is an old pal of mine. He was a member of the former Minn Dak Fantasy Society." The article tells of transmitter used in Moon Radar. Contact being built by former Fargo 'Ham' Operator, Clarence A. Helritz. There is a small cut of him along with the story written by Richard Olson. (By the way, though space won't let me print clippings intact, I retain them and will mail same to anyone so requesting. After a reasonable time lag I will expect them back of course.)
