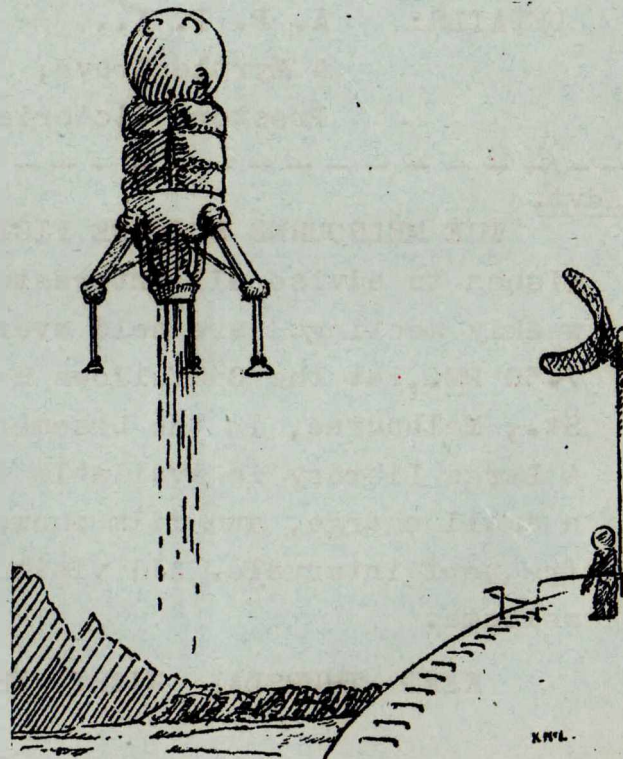

It appears that George Pal's next production is an adaptation of Will Jenkin's THE SOLDADO ANT, under the title of THE NAKED JUNGLE.

Another new flying Saucer book has been released in America. Titled FLYING SAUCERS FROM OUTER SPACE, it is by Frank Scully, author of Behind the Flying Saucers.

Mrs. Coral E. Lorenzen, National Director of AFRO, a US Flying Saucer Bureau, is adding another to the current deluge of such works, but precise details have not yet arrived. It is believed that in her book Mrs. Lorenzen will deal with the possibility of Interdimension saucer origin.

Another new Paul Capon, THE WORLD AT BAY is due from Heinemann's shortly. Details are not yet known.

Pan Books, Ltd., announce the publication on the pocket book editions of THE TIME MACHINE by H.G. Wells and GHOST STORIES OF AN ANTIQUARY by M.R. James. Both at 2/- stg each.

Two semi-factual books on ghosts were issued in London last week. GHOSTS AND POLTERGEISTS by Herbert Thurston, priced at 16/- stg, and APPARITIONS, by G. N. M. Tyrell, priced at 12/6 stg.

LIMBO '90 by Bernard Wolfe has been banned by the Customs Department, and will be withdrawn from sale.

The new mag, SPACEWAY has been seen in the States, 160 pages, 35¢, line-up as follows: lead story is 'The Osilans' by Arthur J. Burks; a serial, "Slaves of the System" by J. T. Oliver; 'Re-entrant' by Clyde Beck; 'Spaceways to Venus' by Charles Eric Maine; 'Frederick' by Atlantis Hallam; 'Dominant Species' by E. Everett Evans; 'The Revolt of The Scarlet Dunes' by Stanton A. Coblentz; 'Now You See Them' by Greg-

ory Francis; 'The Glad Season' by Gene Hunter; art-work by Mel Hunter, Morris Scott Dollens and Arnold Walters. Cover by Hunter. It apparently is good, presenting a variety of themes, artwork and presswork neat. Type style, across the page in one column. They ask for a vote as to whether a letter column should be included. Bi-monthly publication from Los Angeles.

Next U.S. Convention will be held in San Francisco on September 3, 4, 5 and 6, 1954. Publicity has already started, with pamphlets going out in hundreds.

George Orwell's 1984 was a sensation when it was broadcast on Television a few weeks ago. It was magnificently produced on the Studio One programme, which is an hour drama. Sponsor Westinghouse really had a bill to foot after the terrific scenery used.

Science Fiction is replacing detective and western stories as standard material for libraries.

Marion (Astra) Zimmer Bradley has just sold a novelette to Magazine of Fantasy and Science Fiction and two stories to Vortex, the new mag.

New films showing in the States at the present time include TWONKY; APRIL 1, 2000; THE ORACLE, and in 3-D, THE MAZE; ROBOT MONSTER; an Aussie film, THE GREAT GREEN OG; a British one, THE GREAT GREEN TRIANGLE. Another 3-D film is being produced at the moment, SPACE STATION, USA from a story written by Curt Siodmak. DONOVAN'S BRAIN is being released soon.

Ray Bradbury's FARENHEIT 451 adapted from his The Fireman in Galaxy, has been issued in U.S.A. by Ballantine Books in both hard cover and pocket book eds.

In future, Bob Madle's fan column, INSIDE SCIENCE FICTION will be run in both DYNAMIC and FUTURE, which appear every other month.

PLANET STORIES for January 1954, features a Ray Bradbury story, 'A Sound of Thunder', and 'Mars Minus Bosha' by Leigh Brackett. Other stories are by: - James McKinney, Philip Dick, Fox Holden, Chas Stern,

with the cover by Freas.

Books which have arrived in Melbourne over the past week or so include AGES IN CHAOS by Immanuel Velikovsky, priced at 25/9. A Fantasy, THE CARDS OF THE GAMBLER by Benedict Kelly, from Methuen & Co., at 17/6, is also available. The story is set in Heaven and Hell, among other places.

A new collection of ghost stories, BEST GHOST STORIES edited by Anne Ridler, pubbed by Faber & Faber, has arrived.

A new shipment of URANIA, the Italian edition of Galaxy, has arrived. Titles include CITY by Simak, PEBBLE IN THE SKY by Asimov, PRELUDE TO SPACE by A. Clarke, WEAPON MAKERS by Van Vogt. Priced at 3/9 ea.

Two new books announced by Hamiltons titled RED PLANET MARS by H. J. Campbell and THE IMMORTALS by Rolf Garner, both priced at 5/- stg. This means that the pocket books can't be far off.

A second issue of TOPS IN S-F has appeared, dated Fall, '53. No other details as yet. Another new mag, MYSTIC, dated Nov. '53, Vol. 1, No. 1, has appeared in USA. Again, no details as yet.

Ward Moore's BRING THE JUBILEE has been issued in pocket book form in the States, but it must be an enlarged version of the Magazine of Fantasy & Science Fiction story which appeared in Nov. '52.

Thrilling Wonder Stories has been taken up by Pembertons, who have started numbering from 101. It finished at 10 when Atlas gave it away.

Authentic Science Fiction 38 features OLD MAN OF THE STARS by J. F. Burke, with supporting shorts by E. C. Tubb, Arthur Sellings, Brindley Ford, John Falkner and Macleod Robertson.

U.S. mag. BALLYHOO devotes one issue to SPACE. This takes the mickey out of stf!

New books out in the States include FROM ARROW TO ATOM BOMB by Stanton A. Coblentz, published by Beechhurst Press, priced at \$ 6.00. It is a psychological history of war.

STAR OF WONDER by Robert P. Coles and Francis Frost, published by Wittlesey Press, priced at \$ 2.25, is an account of the annual Christmas show put on at the Hayden Planetarium.

Another instalment in the adventures of David Starr is LUCKY STARR AND THE PIRATES OF THE ASTEROIDS by Paul French, published by Doubleday at \$ 2.50. What a title!

C. L. Harness goes into hard covers with his FLIGHT INTO YESTERDAY, published by Bourgey and Curl, priced at \$ 2.75, while Andre Norton gives out with STAR RANGER from Harcourt Fell, priced at \$ 2.95.

ON THE MAGAZINE FRONT

An article titled MAN INTO SPACE and described as the greatest escape story of all time, the escape from gravity, appeared in the Sep. edition of ENGLISH WORLD DIGEST. It is quite a good article/story by R. Chapman, condensed from the London EVENING NEWS, and is written in such a way as to make the average reader realise that space travel, and what it entails for the men who make the first trip, is not just a lot of talk, but will actually happen in the future.

The fifth part of the LIFE series, THE WORLD WE LIVE IN, appeared in the Sept. 21 International edition. Featuring the beginning of life on the earth, it has some wonderful paintings of prehistoric scenery, including the monsters.

Sept. English ARGOSY has an interesting story by A. J. Deutsch, NON STOP. It was in Dec. Astounding under the title of A SUBWAY NAMED MOBIUS. About a train which gets lost in an intricate maze of tunnels under the city, and despite a thorough search, cannot be found. Then it reappears again, only for another train to vanish.

Colliers for Oct 16th had a humorous story by H. G. Felson titled WHY THE EARTH WAS NOT INVADED. A man from a planet named Adnaxas is sent by his government to find out what he can about Earth before it is done away with. He returns overdue, only to find that the other observers have already reported and given their totally different descriptions of the people of Earth, having landed in different places. The governing body dismisses the existence of the planet altogether, so this gives our hero the chance to return to the girl he left behind.
