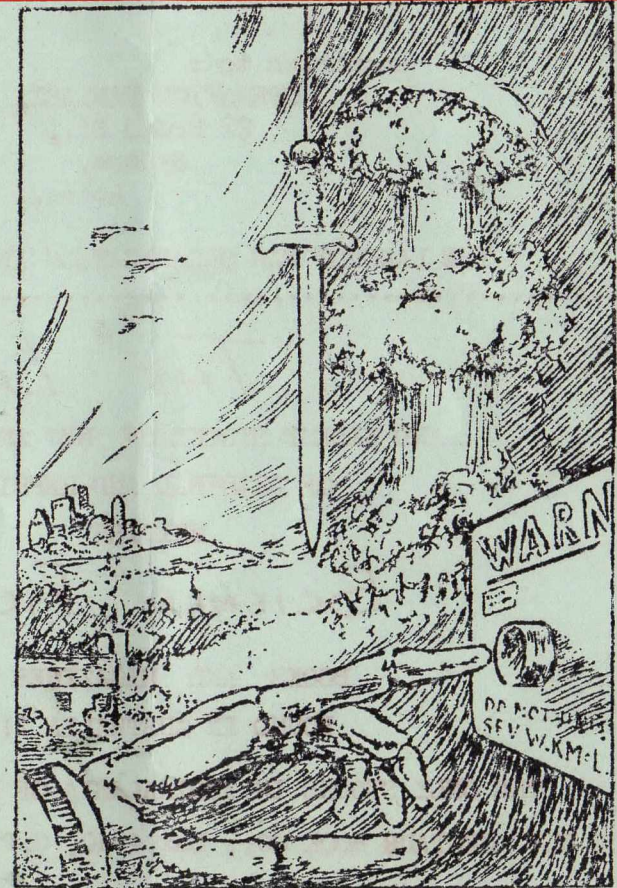

This author originally came to prominence for his writings under the pseudonym 'John Beynon' in the '30's, which included appearances in WONDER STORIES and the publishing of two books.

Post war he adopted the pseudonym 'John Wyndham' and this is now used on all works and by which he is conceded to be one of the best British science fiction writers. Part of his success has been shown in that the BBC broadcast his THE KRACKEN WAKES in 1954.

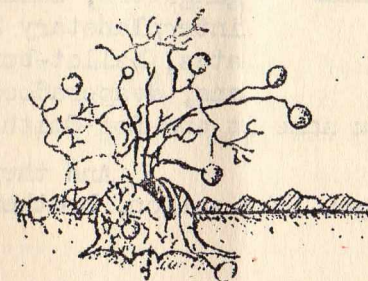

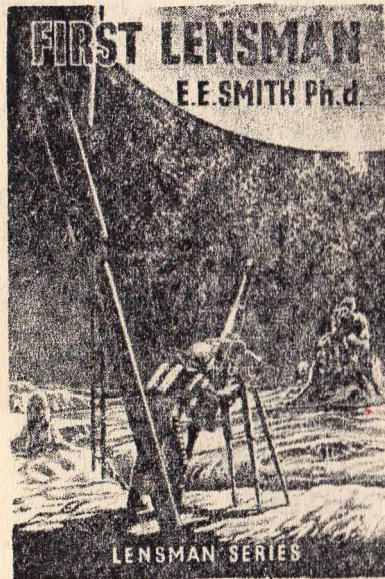

Book Reviews



FIRST LENS MAN by E. E. Smith, Ph.D.
published by T.V. Boardman Ltd., soon
available from McGills at 11/6.

This is the second in the saga of the war between Boskonian & Arisia. In this one, Virgil Samms goes to Arisia to get the first Lens a polychromatic piece of pseudo life which is fatal to any other than its owner, and is a telepathic instrument. Other Lensmen are made after rigorous searching. Like all of Dr Smith's books, this has so many plots that it is impossible to make a successful precis of it. This one contains everything from tennis to thionite, from girls to gantoting gangsters, sadistic lounge lizards, interplanetary and interstellar pirates, ballot-box stuffing politicians, desperadoes, disguises, a 99.9%

pure election and - you name it and Doc Smith will supply it !

And there are 4 more volumes in the series !! If you like action, brother this is it !

BURN, WITCH, BURN ! by Abe Merrit, published by Neville Spearman at 14/6, available from Robertson & Mullins.

This fantasy was written in 1933, and has been published several times since in the States. It concerns Madame Mandilip, a maker of dolls. She makes a doll in the image of a person, causes the person to die, and the doll then comes to life, and commits murders as required. A prohibition 'baron' and a doctor fight the witch, and, due to post-hypnotic suggestions, go through many strange experiences before Nemesis overtakes her, and she and her dolls burn together.

This is not a book to be read just before retiring, if you are susceptible to suggestion ! A 'must' for the fantasy and weird fan.

A SHORT HISTORY OF THE FUTURE by R. C. Churchill, published by T. Werner Laurie Ltd., and available from McGills at 15/6.

This is the other side of the medallion ! In John Atkin's LOOKING FORWARD, we had a historian of the future building a world history from all the SF of the current era, but Churchill builds a history of the period 1967-6601 by taking the novels of Orwell, Frankau, Huxley, Vonnegut, Graves, Shute, Waugh, Karp, Bradbury and other authors who have envisaged future societies. He has labouriously produced a time line, and analysed and co-related the various novels, making what purports to be a historical monographs.

Although some of the comments are pungently satirical, they lack the humor of Atkin's comments. The reader who is well versed in sociological science fiction and fantasy will enjoy this, but others, I'm afraid, will be out of their depth.

THE MAN WITH ONLY ONE HEAD by Densil Neve Barr, published by Rich & Cowan, London, and available from McGills. Proof copy from the publishers

From the Pacific appears a swiftly moving black cloud, which blots out all light in the world for many days. There are good descriptions of the resulting panics, survival measures etc. The cloud is due to America proving a cobalt bomb. First, it is found that insect life is missing but it reappears as eggs hatch and chrysalids and pupae mature.

Then it is found that all male animals, including humans, are sterile, except one. The exception is Vince Adams who, as an atomophobiac, had been in a lead lined shelter during the time of the Fog. When he is besieged by women, the Government assists him to go into hiding. The new conditions cause the formation of the World Federation of Nations which body issues an edict against promiscuity. Mrs. Marie Levints, a neighbour of Adams, has a baby, and Adams is arraigned as the culprit, and presumably hanged. This leads to the discovery that a doctor can cure the sterility - and may have done so in the case of Josh Levints - and the WFN disintegrates.

The final chapter tends to spoil the effect of a successful book, that treats an old idea in a fresh way.

THE ACCIDENT by Dexter Masters, published by Cassel & Co., available from McGills at 19/9.

This novel of 406 pages is overlong for one sitting, but, in spite of the excess verbiage maintains its interest. Briefly, it deals with the lingering death of Louis Saxl, suffering with radiation sickness after an accident at Los Alamos. The description of the progress of the sickness, and the futility of the remedies used, are described in

poignant detail. The major part of the novel is filled with flashbacks, both personal and historical, from the 'trial war' in Spain, to Hiroshima and Nagasaki, and much discontent with the military control of all fission experiments in USA. The writer seems to consider that full international exchange of atomic information would ensure immediate world peace, a rather doubtful concept to my mind.

The basic plot is simple, but it is impossible to condense the overlying words in a review. To get the full flavor, the book must be read, and re-read. Even if you disagree with the author's philosophy, you will learn much of the arguments for and against atomic secrecy. If you can afford it, buy it and read it. If you can't buy it, borrow it! If you can't borrow it ----!

SPLIT IMAGE by Reed R. de Rouen, published by Wingate, review copy from publishers, and available from McGills at 15/6

This novel, by an author unknown to me, falls between two stools. It is obviously intended to convey the message that Christianity has failed, and that Science is the new religion. The first half of the book, dealing with the building of the moon rockets and a space station, is very readable, even though McDonald's approval of his wife, Isabel's, liaison with Aldo Chandler is rather hard to credit. But, when the second half starts with a pregnant Isabel going on an unauthorised moon flight, reality departs, and confusion begins. The rocket is wrecked by a cloud of hydrogen in space and its occupants hopelessly mangled. They find themselves on Dexter, Earth's Split image, healed bodily by robots, and mentally by the 'lawyers'. They are sent back to Earth, to find that Isabel DID NOT make the trip, and there are now two identical Isabels, but that Chloe (another mystical character) has disappeared, leaving only a stone in a box.

Then confusion is worse confounded when the two Isabels fuse into one - and the

world decides to cease the Cold war - and prepares to attack Dexter - if they can find it !!

Well, you might like it - if your taste runs to metaphysical mysticism.

AD 2500 published by Wm. Heinemann Ltd., available from McGills at 18/9.

This book is a collection of 21 prizewinning stories in the competition run by the OBSERVER. As the title indicates, each story is concerned with the people of AD 2500, and although classed as science fiction, the aficionado will not recognise many of the authors. This does not detract from the value of the stories however, but places the emphasis on humanity, not on gimmicks.

FitzPatrick) E.T. finds that rabbits have inoculated humans with myxomatosis; THE PLACE OF THE TIGER (Isobel Mayne) The formula inside the tigress, which goes back to the Niger; ANOTHER ANTIGONE (D.A.C. Morrison) Boxed brains put to sleep; SPUD FAILURE DEFINITE (Noel Peart) Ireland starves during 'paper' war; THE THREE BROTHERS (William Moy Russell) Old fable brought up to date - and beyond !; THE ATAVISTS (G.A. 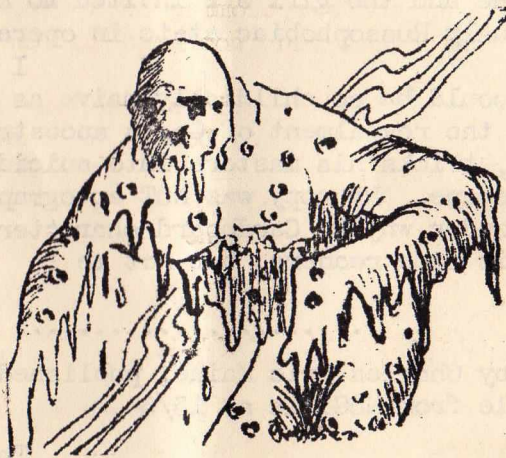
CRISIS 2000 by Charles Eric Maine, published by Hodder & Stough-
ton, available from McGills at 13/3

This is a better novel
than TIMELINER - the characters are more believable. America is
staging a big Festival to welcome 2000 AD Senator Drazin wel --
comes all planetary - and interplanetary - visitors. A flying

saucer lands in the Stadium, and sets up a force screen. The visitors all looklike Senator Drazin ! The military try to crack the force screen, but fail. Colonel Kyle and Senator Drazin are at daggers drawn. The hero and heroine remain inside the force -- screen when it is expanded, and find that the aliens are robots , each containing a cell of Saturnian culture - a purely defensive entity. An A Bomb is exploded, destroying the Festival site, but not affecting the Saturnians or our hero and heroine, who have been rotated into another dimension. The denouement is well worked out, the only thing I cannot follow is how the Saturnians decontaminate the area before they re-built the Festival.

I enjoyed this novel, particularly the clash of personalities. Recommended.

Theodore Sturgeon can always find something new and in TWINK he has a new idea for a telepath.

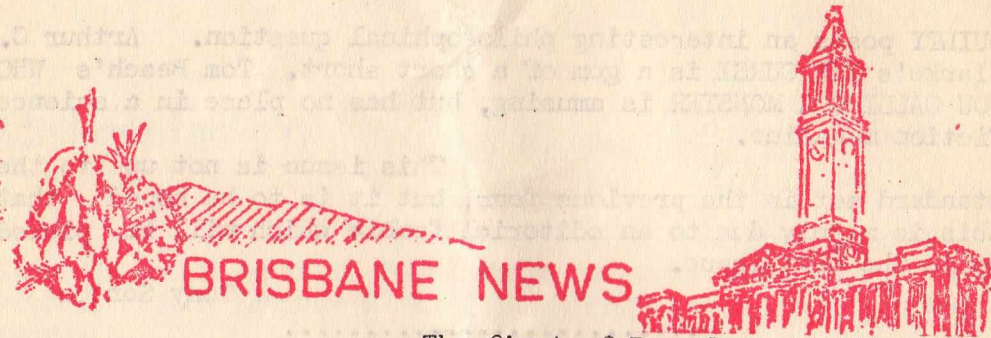

MELBOURNE S.F. GROUP REPORT

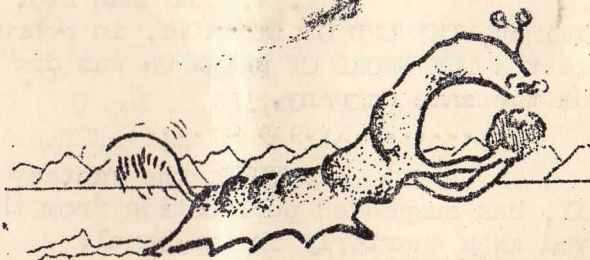

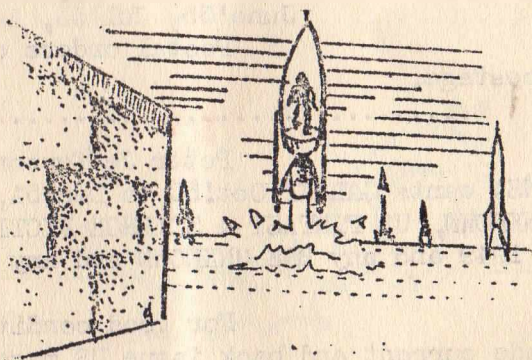

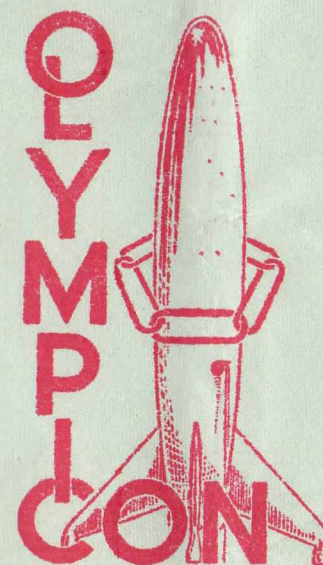
