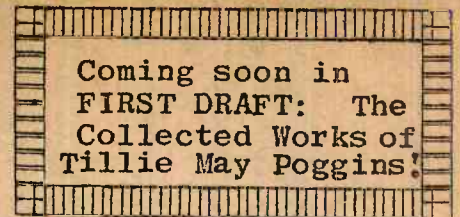

I have a feeling that Joe Pilati has been at several of the recent Fano-clasts Fridays and that somehow I've left him out. This would not be a Good Thing. Official apologies if I have. Like, I think he was at the last one....

In addition to my crime of being a dedicated Nixon supporter, I am also a reader of NATIONAL REVIEW. I started reading it back when I was in my last year of college, oh, early '57. It was about the funniest thing going at that time except for maybe MAD, which was going down hill. I have, however, since modified my reactions to NR, and too, perhaps, NR has modified some of its positions considerably. I used to laugh at and (or, and/or) scorn 90% of the magazine. I would suppose that figure has dropped to 40 or 50% now.

I tend to enjoy NR most when it is putting the needle to the Liberal Establishment and points out the many contradictions, inconsistencies, and fallacies (hey, sounds like I'm talking about the BOONDOGGLE) of the liberal, left, and radical left in this and other countries. I enjoy it least when they flop back and forth like gaffed fish on the civil rights issues (the current issue proclaims that the recent flood of violence in NYC is, to quote, "...let us face it -- race war."). They are honestly concerned about the Negro situation in this country (or at least Buckley is, as he showed in his recent confrontation with Norman Mailer on -ptui- David Susskind's Open End. (Hey, that's funny! "David Susskind's Open End.") But at least they support the Maccabees, with reservations. (I wonder what they'd think of the Subway Incident.)

NR is especially interesting when it discusses figures such as Dr. Oppenheimer and Nehru. This issue, for instance, has quite an impressive list of Nehru's less admirable positions. It also has a pleasant entry on a recent speech of Oppenheimer's. But most interesting in this issue is a lengthy analysis of the constitutionality of Ike's running for vice-president. It seems that there is a good case for holding that the 12th and 22nd Amendments do not bar an ex-President from running for Vice President. "...the 22nd Amendment does not bar a two-term ex-President from again holding the office, but only from being elected to it." Of course, NR is proposing a Goldwater-Eisenhower ticket, which does not interest me; but I certainly would like to see a Nixon-Eisenhower ticket.

Another interesting article is "On the Slanting of the News." It's too bad John Boardman is, as I understand, on his way to Texas this evening, because I'd like to discuss it with him. It has a very good put-down of John's criticism of Nixon's early campaigns which John was discussing with me a month or two ago.

Buckley also has an article on "...the single most irresponsible political proposal of the decade, namely, that Robert F. Kennedy should be nominated for the Vice Presidency of the United States." Sample: "...Robert, and Teddy, are a part of the mystical body, and objects, in American politics, not of discussion but of veneration."
