## MAILING 24

A L'ABANDON

I agree that it is bad to have to use tricks to make people give to charities. Unfortunately, most of us are not in the habit of looking out for charities to support and it is necessary, one must suppose, for such incentives to be used. In previous times the masses had no money to spare for charities and the rich were brought up to make a habit of giving to them, so campaigns weren't needed to such an extent. Nowadays the majority have money for luxuries but haven't been brought up to the tradition of giving (with one or two exceptions such as poppy day) so...thus the campaigns. // Talking about youngest members, what is your age anyway? // Your remarks about education and its relation to experience - under WALDO - are very well put indeed. Hear, to your remark that communication is the most interesting part of fandom. To me it's the primary purpose. // What are TV dinners?

Now to Donaho's bit: The difference, to me, between Lehrer's two records is that one has the intimate atmosphere of songs sung at a private party, while the other has all the trappings of commercialism. I find it impossible to judge the merits of the second lot of songs because I am prejudiced against them by the audience interruptions, gaps for appreciation, etc. Makes it sound less sincere than the first. I always wondered what was funny about "Mozart. Or one of that crowd" but have come to the conclusion that it must be the implication that

Mozart, a genius, could be one of a crowd. Is it really true that college audiences have didain for classical music? It is not so in this country. // Agree with you about the family who use the same bath water - I suspect all Anglofandom is wondering who it could be! Ron says: But what about a crowded swimming bath? Do you object to entering those? And what's this about the American diplomat who "naturally" could not find a house in England with central heating? It's available if you've got the money. And I know several quite ordinary people whomhave what might be called semi-central-heating; i.e., a couple of radiators, towel rails, etc., supplied from the normal hot water system or by electricity. Would this count with you? There is a big campaign going on at the moment ( a competetive one between the coal and oil suppliers) to get people to have central heating installed on an easy payment system lasting about five years. And this campaign is aimed at the lower-middle or upperworking class. So we're not all that barbaric! //Re one person keeping a feud going, I am reminded of a quote I once saw, "It takes only one to make a quarrel but two to make it up. " True. Why is it so many of the old proverbs turn out to be true also when reversed? You will have noticed that this is usually the principle on which 'witty' epigrams are based. Which reminds me of another one, this time attributed to Shaw: "I can't think why he hates me. I haven't done anything for him. " //Yes, I think English schools are centrally administered though not sure quite I think curriculums must work out pretty similar to what extent. because all the country is preparing for the same exams in any one sphere i.e. University, technical, commercial, professional etc. It can be said that if you know the type of school a person has been to then you know, roughly, what level his education is up to. // Agree with your remarks about drinking - fans do tend to write up parties as though everyone were in a terrible state. I have been to a great number of these parties (and held a few myself!) and very rarely have I seen anyone in any way objectionable. These writings up exaggerating the wildness of parties, although amusing to those who have been there, are liable to mislead those who haven't. I deplore this kind of writing up as it gives all fandom a bad name to those who haven't been to any of the parties. Parties should be enjoyed for their own sake and anyone who writes one up as an orgy can only be doing so for exhibitionist reasons. He is saying, in effect, "Look what a bad boy I've been!"//L'ABANDON is one of my favourite OMPAzines.

AMBLE Loved that phrase, "agreed to be illegal, immoral and possibly slimming". I don't think you can ask what the difference between a vice and a drug is. You might as well ask the difference between walking and a piece of chalk. One is an act and the other a substance. Don't you agree? //The rest was enjoyed but I don't seem to have any comments to make on it.

ATOZ No, your typing straight on to stencil does not read

'ragged' as you put it. It reads fine. Ethel's article on Don reminded me of something but I couldn't think what for a long time. Then it dawned on me. It reminds me of a childrens' story describing the visit of a favourite uncle. Every phrase fits. Very apt.// I enjoyed the Recommended Reading. More please.// The Illo I liked as a drawing but thought it had too many textures incorporated. Same applies to front cover. Nothing stands out as being further in the foreground than the rest - it's all in one plane. I think you are at your best with caricature and cartoon work, Arthur, and tending to forget that, unlike those, pictorial work needs dimensions. //I like the general look of ATOZ - it always makes me want to read it.

ERG Packs some quite interesting things into only two pages.
Wish you would write more about your experiences in school or are you one of those people who like to keep your job out of fan writing as much as possible? I had thought that vinegary inspectors belonged to pre-war days and that the kids (and teachers) had it all hunkydory these welfare days. No?

PARAFANALIA The reason the ditchdigger and their ilk get more money than professional men is that they have powerful unions. Q.E.D. Though I'm surprised you included journalists in your list of underpaid people.

Your experience in the supermarket was unusual. I have gone into them dozens of times for just one thing and no one took any notice. It is not fair to make judgements on just one incident like this. You should have mentioned it to the manager who would, no doubt, have corrected the assistant. It makes a good humourous article but by writing it in a serious vein I think you may be misleading others who have not, perhaps, been into a supermarket yet. I think they are a good institution, myself.// The rest of your article were interesting but Imdo not feel like taking up your arguments because you never join in OMDA arguments yourself, nor do you ever comment on anything, so there seems no point.

SPACE DIVERSIONS One of those LARGE offerings which one cannot do justice to. I think I enjoyed Bennett's and Donaho's piece best, though all of it was very readable, except for Eric's bit on buses which bored me. I like the typeface used in the Frogman piece. //The cover made me think of a monster's arm leaving a trail of slime (which isn't meant to be an insult). I don't seem to be spurred on to any other comments. On the whole I don't really approve of subzines in OMPA - apazines should be personal zines.

THE ASCENT OF NTN Sheila's was the most entertaining report of the three; Vernon's was a little long-winded and rambling; yours (Mal) was informative but I still don't want to go near a mountain. The other day we went out and climbed a grassy hill near here that is all of 1100 feet high and

I was exhausted by the time we got to the top. That was enough mountaineering for me.

THE REJECTED CANCN Makes me wish I'd bought a copy of the FANCYCLOPAEDIA. //Turnover Time was fascinating - history usually bores me but you make it entirely readable. Why don't text books read so easily as this? Maybe I've only tried the wrong ones? I do like the way you're always quoting from Mencken - keep on with it, won't you?

VERT I nearly didn't read :THE HEH, being a play, but I'm glad I did. It was hilarious.//Yes, I've read that definition of jazz too, but I can't remember where.// I found your remarks about politics interesting but I don't think you can speak of "acting against the concept of politics" any more than you can speak of acting against geography or music or any other department of human knowledge. Even anarchy is 'politics' in that it is one way of organising a community which is all 'politics' means. What you are getting at, I take it, is whether it is worth fighting against an undesirable form of government with equally undesirable means? An old question and one, I think, which has never been solved!

ZOUNDS!!!!!!!! The cover was clever//I'm not too sure that it can be said that we learn World History in this country either. British people will tell you that they do when what they mean is that they learn British Empire history - which does cover the globe, if only in blobs. There was Clive in India, Wolfe in Canada, Cook in Australia and so on and there were the many European wars that England got mixed up with. Whether you can call all this world history is a moot point. //Watchtower is sold here too. I had a woman knock at the door and tell me about it (and about themselves of course) and that it cost such and such. After waiting for it to sink in for a few moments, when I didn't make a move, she told me that if a person really couldn't afford it they gave it away. I think she was surprised that the accusation of not being able to avoid 4d didn't make me rush for my money but, when it didn't, she told me a few more things, pushed a copy into my hand and went off.
