LONCON NEWS: Ethel Lindsay reports that the business meeting will be chaired by Ella Parker while the selection of the 1966 Consite is being conducted. Following that, George Scithers, as Parliamentarian to the Committee, will chair discussions of committee reports, Society by-laws, etc. Motions to be presented at the business meeting must be presented in writing, and in triplicate, by 10 August (if possible, by 1 August.)
