I thought the Warren The Spirit was fantastic both issues I've seen and even at a dollar probably the best buy in comic art on the market today bar only two items, The Menomonee Falls Gazette because of the Modesty Blaise strip and the Overseas Weekly (which is now printed bi-weekly) because of the two full tab pages of Wood-work. * I didn't think LORD TYGER would fit in the curriculum of a Southern Lit course.* Cary - do you realize what you said in your mc on SPACEWARP 105. You have relinquished all legal rights to your body in writing to Art. Now all he has to do is find a "mad scientist" for a transplant. Or maybe a "mad engineer" - OE? * The hardback of "The Impossible Virgin" was available for only one buck from Publishers Clearing House but I no longer have any of their catalogs to give you the address.

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AFTER THE GOLD RUSH # 13 - Jim: I can give you two completely different silent films that when remade in sound never even came

close to their silent counterparts: THE HUNCHBACK OF NOTRE DAME and NOSFERATU. Hunchback was remade twice in high quality versions but not quite enough. One remake starred Charles Laughton and the second starred Anthony Quinn. The original starred Lon Chaney and was the most elaborate film made set-wise up to that time, including a complete minature version of the cathedral and two-thirds of the cathedral was done full-size. Actually what made this version tops was not the sets but Chaney's performance. Hampered as he was with 50-100 lbs. of make-up and junk for his performance he can still bring a tear to the eyes wheras the Laughton and Quinn versions are just grotesques. NOSFERATU is the original filming of Stoker's Dracula. It is the silence in this film that actually makes the horror and errieness so compelling. The remakes can hardly compare. Browning's DRACULA with Lugosi had some beautiful scenes in the castle but the acting all has becomed dated and very stilted with time. HORROR OF DRACULA is a very good adventure film but horror? No, I don't think so. I should point one thing out - both Hunchback and Nosferatu have to be viewed when there is someone who has the original scores to play or is very good at improvisation and is familiar with film. The total lack of sound when seeing these films can easily destroy their enjoyment. Here at FSU we have an excellent piano player who usually improvises the music and he has just about always increased the audience enjoyment ten-fold. Just a few weeks ago he played for a triple bill of THIEF OF BAGDAD, Sherlock, JR., and ONE A.M. which were all shown for a class in Film History and he got a standing ovation. We were very lucky to have him. * If you have anymore fanzines to sell, let me know, please.

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THE DOM # 7 - Burnett: I agree with you about all those films being more enjoyable than 2001. I like them all better too but I don't think anyone can deny that 2001 is the technical masterpiece in the sf genre. How can you say that FORBIDDEN PLANET is the best sf movie? Haven't you ever seen THE DAY THE EARTH STOOD STILL, METROPOLIS, THE ANDROMEDA STRAIN, SLEEPER, or MESA OF LOST WOMEN? If you liked WESTWORLD you might like to know there is going to be a sequel. The title is currently FUTURE WORLD. ** I pity you trying to get through all that Melville. Are you, perhaps, a disciple of Masoch?
