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

NEWS TIDBITS

R.I.P. Jean-Claude Forest (1930-1998), the French artist who created the original *Barbarella* comic strip, died on 30 Dec. Joe Orlando (1927-1998), long-time comics artist and editor, died on 23 Dec aged 71. Titles he was involved with include EC's *Tales from the Crypt, Little Orphan Annie, House of Mystery, Swamp Thing*, and – right up to his death – *Mad* magazine. Don Taylor (1920-1998), who directed *Escape from the Planet of the Apes, The Island of Dr Moreau* (1977) and *Damien: Omen 2*, died 28 Dec aged 78. George Wilson (1921-1998), artist and cartoonist, died on 7 Dec. He drew comic strips for Fiction House, Centaur, and Ace in the early 1940s; in the 50s and 60s he was a prolific cover artist, especially for Western Publishing: *Turok Son Of Stone, Space Family Robinson, The Phantom*, and others.

Star Wars —

The Not-So-Phantom Menace

While some fans of the Star Wars universe made all sorts of asinine remarks about what "they" perceived as a particularly wimpy title, rival studios are giving "The Phantom Menace" a universally WIDE berth. The general consensus is that The Phantom Menace will blow away all records set by James Cameron's "Titanie", an idea that George Lucas politely disagrees with. Industry analysts say that even if it is an artistic disappointment it should gross \$500 million US worldwide but if it is as up to normal Lucas standards, it should surpass the record \$1.8 billion US grossed by "Titanie" worldwide.

When interviewed at the Golden Globe Awards on Sunday January 24,1999, Lucas dropped a little bombshell that the 2nd theatrical trailer will be coming out sometime in March. His good friend Steven Spielberg is one of the few outside of the people who worked on it to have seen it and he repeated his response while onstage at the Golden Globes: "Oh my God!!!"

While it was always circulated that the original Star Wars (later re-released as Star Wars IV: A New Hope), The Empire Strikes Back (Star Wars V) and Return of the Jedi (Star Wars VI) comprised the middle trilogy of a 9-part epic, Lucas said he had only written the first three prequels and that the three sequels were only ideas running around his mind. Having recently turned 55 years old, Lucas says that he is not willing to devote a further 10 years or so of his life but he still plans to release Parts II and III in 2002 and 2005 respectively.

There are a number of reasons as to why Lucas took a 10 year hiatus from 1983 to 1993 from his Star Wars universe. First, he says he was exhausted from working straight through Parts IV, V and VI and he wanted to spend some time with his family. Second, he was less than completely satisfied with the relatively unsophisticated computer imaging technology available in the early 1980s and was determined to wait until the technology was better able to express his grand vision. Third, he was determined to make it his own way which meant that he wanted to finance it entirely by himself from money earned by the various companies that together comprise his magnificent entertainment technology empire based in Marin County, located north of San Francisco across the Golden Gate Bridge. These gems in the Lucas empire include such famous companies as Industrial Light & Magic, the THX Group, Skywalker Sound, LucasArts Entertainment and Lucas Learning.

This way, all the risk is his but then the consensus is that it is very low risk with a potentially high payoff. A perfect example of this is the news that 20th Century Fox will be paying for the entire S70 million US worldwide TV and print campaign in exchange for 10% of the profits. Under the terms of a very unusual contract negotiated by Lucas before the release of Star Wars in 1977, Fox only owns the theatrical rights to each movie while Wily George kept other rights such as video, etc. To give this piece of foresight a sense of scale, consider this: the video of James Cameron's "Titanic" was sold and rented to the tune of \$500 million US (with a record 58 million copies sold worldwide) and industry analysts are expecting "The Phantom Menace" to break the \$1 billion US barrier. This is not an unreasonable estimate given that it cost only \$15 million US to produce the digitally enhanced version of the Special 20th Anniversary release of Star Wars IV, V and VI, complete with new special effects, sound effects and scenes that Lucas had wanted included in the original theatrical releases in 1977, 1980 and 1983. Fox was only too cager to pay for this, a wise decision since the 20th Anniversary re-releases grossed \$475 million US worldwide.

The February 1999 issue of Vanity Fair has the only full interview given by George Lucas and features the work of famed photographer Annie Leibovitz who was the only authorized photographer permitted on the Tunisian set that doubles as the planet Tatooine back in the summer of 1997.

"The Phantom Menace" will star Liam Neeson as Qui-Gon Jinn, described as a maverick Jedi Knight and the mentor of Obi-Wan Kenobi: Ewen McGregor as the young Obi-Wan Kenobi; 9 year old Jake Lloyd as the young Anakin Skywalker; 17 year old Natalie Portman as Queen Amidala, the teen ruler of the Outer Rim planet Naboo and future mother of the twins who will grow up to be known as Princess Leia and Luke Skywalker; and Samuel L. Jackson as Jedi Master Mace Windu, who like Yoda, is a member of the Jedi Council. The main villain is the "phantom menace" of the title, a character named Darth Sidious, who is described as being the last of the Sith, an ancient race seduced and conquered by the powerful magic of the Dark Side of the Force. Unseen by the protagonists, we in the audience will get to see the real menace who threatens the status quo. One of the memorable fight scenes involves single combat between Obi-Wan Kenobi and Darth Maul, the apprentice of Darth Sidious. Darth Maul is a dark, mysterious and very menacing figure with a heavily tattooed face and wielding the double-sided light saber seen in the first theatrical trailer. Ray Park, a Martial Arts expert plays Darth Maul and he also helped coach Neeson and McGregor with their swordsmanship. Frank Oz returns as the voice of Yoda and we meet a computer-generated lizard-like sidekick to Qui-Gon Jinn, a Gungan named Jar Jar Binks, voiced by Ahmed Best. We also see Ian McDiarmid in much less makeup reprising his role as Palpatine, who at this time is not the evil Emperor who seduces Anakin Skywalker to the Dark Side of the Force where Anakin becomes Darth Vader. The Palpatine we see in The Phantom Menace is a politician representing Naboo in the Galactic Senate and has not yet become the ultimate evil we know he will become 35 years later.

The scope of the merchandising tie-ins that came from a corporate memo and other inside sources is absolutely breathtaking as companies like Pepsi, Nintendo, Hasbro, Galoob, etc. jump on the gravy train. If these sources can be believed, then the following is part of this promotional campaign:

Pepsi: -will produce a staggering 8 billion cans of Pepsi featuring 12 characters from the Star Wars universe, to be distributed across North America. There will be limited edition Yoda figures randomly distributed in cases for instant prizes.

Kentucky Fried Chicken, Pizza Hut and Taco Bell (all spun off from Pepsi to form Tricon) -their outlets will be decorated to resemble the planets of Coruscant, Naboo and Tatooine where customers can order from an array of what they refer to as theme foods and collectible toys.

Frito-Lay Snacks (another Pepsi subsidiary) -will produce 100 million cards for a Star Sars game with a top prize of \$1 million US.

Hasbro and Galoob -these two toy companies will produce a staggering 250 Star Wars toys that industry analysts expect to sell to the tune of over \$1 billion US. The two companies plan to spend \$40 million US for the largest ever televised ad campaign.

Nintendo -they plan a \$10 million US ad campaign to promote their new video games including one for play with the N-64 system. They expect to sell more than 5 million units retailing for about \$80 US each

Legos International -this spring will see the opening of their first American theme park and has a Star Wars theme.

Del Rey Publishing -the novelization of the screenplay is being written by award winning fantasy author Terry Brooks and Del Rey will also release a series of spinoff books.

Dark Horse Comics -will be printing a new series based on "The Phantom Menace"

Trivial Pursuit -possibly the thing needed to rejuvenate this game, there will be a Star Wars Special Edition expected to retail for \$30 US.

According to show creator J. Michael Straczynski, at this time there are no further Babylon 5 movies commissioned by TNT.

Also, the latest word on Babylon 5: Crusade is that it will begin airing on TNT after the end of the abbreviated NBA regular season and TNT's coverage of the early rounds of the NBA Playoffs, probably beginning on June 2.

JMS at Aussiecon 3

It has just been announced that J. Michael Straczynski has been named as a Special Guest for Aussiecon 3, an honour he received from Bucconeer last year. Unfortunately for everyone involved, just before Bucconeer, he came down with pneumonia and had to cancel rather than risk death if he travelled to Baltimore.

According to series creator Chris Carter, the show's fans should be getting many of their questions finally answered in the February episodes (just in time for the February Sweep's period) but he also promises us more new questions will be raised this season. A two parter airing on February 7 and 14 will see Mulder finally learning the truth about his sister Samantha's abduction as a child. Carter adds that he sees next season (Season 7) as the final one but he hopes to continue to make X-Files movies even though David Duchovny and Gillian Anderson have not yet agreed to return for a second theatrical release.

I guess Carter is trying to make sure he has work in the near future since Millennium is almost certain to be flushed by the Suits at Fox TV. Carter is currently developing "Harsh Realms", very loosely based on a comic book dealing with virtual reality.

The 1999 Golden Globes

The Return of E.T.

The most popular alien visitor to Earth in 1982 is making his return to television as the star of the new Buckle Up America safety campaign which has already begun airing teaser clips in selected markets. The goes nationwide in the US as the full length PSA (Public Service Announcement) airs before halftime at the Super Bowl on Jan.31. The campaign is sponsored by Universal Studios, Amblin Entertainment and Progressive Insurance and will also attack drinking & driving and the newest problem of Road Rage. If T can speak from his experience of bicycling dangerously and getting drunk on American beer and they should bring the Men in Black who chased him for the Road Rage part. In addition, E.T. will be rereleased in 2002 in time for its 20th anniversary.

Taco Bell Chihuahua vs. Furby

The Wild, Wild West

While not nearly as popular as in its heyday in the 1950s and 1960s, the Western genre is making a cautious comeback on a limited basis. The highest profile newcomer for 1999 is Director Barry Sonnenfeld's silver screen version of the classic 1960s TV series of the same name which starred Robert Conrad as James West and the late Ross Martin as Artemus Gordon. The movie reunites Sonnenfeld with his star from "Men in Black", Will Smith who plays West and partners him with Kevin Kline as Gordon. Kenneth Branagh stars as an evil genius out to assassinate President Grant and take over the world.

Sonnenfeld describes the movie as being "more SeiFi than Western, a retro Jules Verne, a James Bond of the 1860s." Fans of the show can expect the usual humour, lovely ladies and fantastic gadgets such as the tarantula which is described as a lethal weapon transport that moves spiderlike across the plains (shades of Dr. Miguelito Loveless). Agent West's special train is no less astounding than the original and has features reminiscent of James Bond's Aston Martin of the 1960s.

Capitalizing on the huge success of Will Smith over the Independence Day Weekend (Independence Day (1996) and Men in Black (1997)), the studio is releasing it on July 2, which is 6 weeks after the release of The Phantom Menace and far enough away from its shadow to do very well at the Box Office.

Terminator 3 ???

If all the details can be worked out, there will be a "Terminator 3" and it will be written and produced by James Cameron, who unlike with the first two movies, will not direct the third. Arnold Schwarzenegger says he will return only if Cameron returns and Cameron says he will only make T3 at 20th Century Fox whom he made Titanic for.

Even if deals can be reached with all the parties involved, it still remains up in the air as to when Terminator 3 might be made. Schwarzenegger is busy filming "End of Days" and the costs of producing another Terminator film might make Fos think twice, though why Fos would hesitate after all the money that poured into the studio after Titanic is beyond me. Norman Jewison to Receive Thalberg Award

Canadian Norman Jewison, producer/director/writer extraordinaire, will receive the Irving G. Thalberg Memorial Award at this year's Oscar ceremony on March 21. The Thalberg Award is a special award given to producers whose work "reflects a consistently high quality of motion picture production". Jewison was producer/director for "Fiddler on the Roof" and "Moonstruck" as well as producing "The Russians Are Coming! The Russians Are Coming!' and "A Soldier's Story". Jewison's short story "Rollerball" was made into a movie starring James Caan and was a social commentary on how multinational corporations ran the world and countries no longer mattered in the grand scheme of things. All I want to know is "How many companies are using this as a blueprint for their business plans?"

The Return of David Lynch

Dear Editor Joel,
