I was at the BOOK NOOK on Sunday (1983 April 10), picking up my monthly load of comics. Steve Leaf asked me to change the standing calendar piece on the ATLANTA COMICS CONVENTION to add a request for items for an auction. The proceeds of this auction are going directly to the American Cancer Society in Lamar Blaylock's name. That part caught me by surprise. Steve assumed that I Lamar Blaylock's name. That part caught me by surprise. Steve assumed that I knew that Lamar had died of cancer in January of this year; I did not know.

Back in the Dark Ages of the 1950's, Jerry Page, Hank Reinhardt, Jerry Burge and others had been in a group called ASFO (Atlanta Science Fiction Organization). The first ASFO had published a book on the history of fandom by Sam Moskowitz entitled "The Immortal Storm" as its monument before it faded.

In the later 1960's and early 1970's Atlanta fandom was starting to bloom again. A new incarnation under the name "ASFO II" was born. Glen Brock, John Ulrich, Allen Greenfield, Steve Hughes, myself and others were responsible for the return of organized SF fandom. At the same time, comics fandom was also a part of ASFO II. Gordon Flagg, Lamar Blaylock, Dee Sharp, Steve Leaf, Mark Podlin, John Wilson and myself were in that sub-group.

As time went on, the comics people wanted more of a "flea market" for trading and selling and different programming, so the Atlanta Comics Group was formed out of ASFO II. Lamar was one of the founders of the group and served as president.

Looking back on it, those days were fun. We used to have to scramble for all kinds of meeting space. We got the Junior Achievement building in West End, In those days the West End section had over half the murders in Atlanta. which was just down the street from CANTRELL'S USED BOOK STORE, where Glen Brock worked. This bookstore was the mecca for comics people in those days. I have so many good CANTRELL stories (some of which I cannot print for a mixed readership). It was the typical old used bookstore. Piles and piles of everything, sitting everywhere with the smell of old books soaked into the woodwork over the years. Exactly what an old book store should be.

Later the group was able to find

Later the group was able to find space in the suburbs mostly at bank community rooms. It was a great way to spend a Saturday afternoon. People would drive up from Columbus, GA or come in from the small towns around Atlanta to swap and talk.

We did fanzines, too. We had just discovered quick copy printing and the


New Marvel Age of Comics! Steve Fritz was publishing Jack Kirby swipes under the company name of "Amazing Masters". Gordon Flagg, the Great Letter Hacker, was drawing short satire strips. Lamar Blaylock had an indian strip under the name "Uncas, the Fox". I was printing advisor to fandom and writer of horrible SF one-shots, such as "Vomit - the Magazine of Bubbly Regurgitation".

When Phil Seuling started selling comics direct via the US Mails, I bought the shipment for the Atlanta Comics Group. Glenn Brock and I were partners in a bookstore business by then. (Here is where I have some really good stories to tell, under the title "What Did You Do in the Porno Wars, Daddy?"). I would fill my collection, sell to the group and give the leftover to the store for our retail sales.

All this was ten years or more ago. Now, I'm a research scientist at Georgia Tech; Gordon Flagg is now working for a library newsletter, with his Masters degree in library science; Mark Podlin is a corporate lawyer with J.C. Penney's; John Wilson died of cancer several years ago.

I was a few years older than most of the early comics people in Atlanta, so it gives me a funny uncomfortable feeling to outlive "that old gang of mine" on several levels. Human Nature is to see yourself as some immutable enternal center of the universe, never really changing or growing older. That is a lie, of course. And some days Mother Nature has a strong way of reminding Human Nature of its fallacy.

# Con Report

the 1983 BaltiCon was held, as is traditional, on Easter weekend. Its Con hotel was the same as the main hotel for the 1983 WorldCon, the Hyatt-regency in downtown Baltimore. This is a rather nice, pretty hotel (as are most Hyatt-Regencies) with an excellent location for any SF convention. It is right across the street from the Baltimore Inter Harbor Shoppes. The Inter Harbor is like a downtown, indoor/outdoor shopping mall with one entire building devoted mostly to eating establishments. Everything from normal fast food places to full price, excellent quality seafood restaurants are located within the mall, making Baltimore WorldCon (and BaltiCon for that matter) rather unique for a downtown convention. The only flaw with the Hyatt as a hotel is that they have an inane "no party" policy. It is not that they disallow parties completely, it is simply that they require that the hotel caters them... at prohibitively have heard this is because of some fascist union rule that the hotel staft have heard this is because of some fascist union rule that the hotel staff holds over the hotel, but I think that it is bad management by the people who first brought BaltiCon to this hotel. In a city the size of Baltimore, all the hotels downtown would the same problems hotels downtown would the same problems with their staff and should have the same policy involving catering. Most hotels can be convinced to look the other way, however. I would like to see or hear some justification as to why this particular Hyatt is so narrow—minded.

The convention itself is rather a lot of fun. This year they limited their offical attendance to 1500 and the chairman estimated that actually 1800 people were at the con, counting all of the people who were invited and were part of the work force. BaltiCon has been growing every year and they decided that they want to keep it a small regional convention, rather than reaching mammoth proportions of some of the wesmammoth proportions of some of the wes-

tern conventions.

As usual BaltiCon has its video program in one public room (i.e. no convention badge checking). This is a large room where people gather around to talk, register, and picking up flyers for upcoming conventions. I can see the prose and cons of putting the video enpros and cons of putting the video entertainment here, but I still think that is is too noisy to try to listen to the

television.

Some of the most unusal programming was the radio room, where you could hear some of the great SF shows from the golden and silver age of radio. Great programs like X mINUS ONE and DIMENSION X. which adapted stories by Sheckley, Clarke, Leiber and Shaara. Over twelve hours of radio programming was scheduled each day. duled each day.

Also unique was their continuing support of filk and folk singing as part of the convention schedule. They supplied memberships and facilities for some of the best singers and singing groups in Bos-Wash (Boston to Washington metroplex) fandom. Clam Chower, Linda Melnick and Carly & Alan Mackall were among those performing.

The pro guests of honor were L. Sprague and Catherine Crook de Camp. The fan guests were Jack Chalker and Eva Whitley Chalker. The artist guest of honor was Anne Trembley. A scheduled Andre Norton phone interview had to be cancelled due to Miss Norton's illness (she is better now).

The De Camps guests of honor speeches were mutual admirations. They detailed how a husband and wife writing

detailed how a husband and wife writing team can work from both the artistic and team can work from both the artistic and especially the business end. Jack Chalker decried the increasing number of media fans at SF conventions. He maintained that these scum-of-the-earth were lowering the average social level of all fandom. When pressed he admitted that it was really those fans who watch and idolize television and movies to the exclusion of books that really bother him.

Joe and Gay Haldeman were also there. Sue Brundige and I more-or-less had breakfast with them on Saturday and later in the convention Joe read from his latest book, WORLDS APART (due in October), which is the second of a trilogy that began with WORLDS.

One of the most interesting panels I attended was on alternate lifestyles in SF. The panel itself was almost an example of what they were talking about. Donald Kinsbury and Ms Sullivan (a professional anthropologist) were rather serious and academic in their discussion serious and academic in their discussion of the strange societies depicted SF works. Eva Chalker Whitley and Somtow Sucharitkul were trying to be completely off-the-wall in their speculations of the bizarre lifestyles of aliens and humans

The high point of the convention was the first dress rehersal of Alexis Gilliland's play 2001: A SPACE OPERA. This was the first performance of the play in ten yearsor more, and we were promised that the rough edges would be filed down by the time it is presented at WorldCon.



An Afternoon With Harlan Ellison

The afternoon with Ellison was the afternoon of April 6, 1983. This afternoon was in two parts. First, Ellison save a lecture {see Brad Linaweaver's report} which I was unable to attend, thanks to dear old DeKalb county's policy of unexcused abscentee prosecution, but I did make it to what had been billed as a "writer's workshop" with a limited enrollment.

Ellison began by pointing out that there was no way to really have a writer's workshop in two hours, and also that we wouldn't have liked him at all if he really was giving a workshop. However, he did teach those people who attended about manuscript formats {I thought that it was rather strange that only about four or five of the people who admitted that they wrote knew what a manuscript format was. What do these people write with, a quill pen?}.

After explaining his manuscript format, Ellison talked about his work, reading from two of his short stories {"Croatoan" and "All the Birds Come Home to Roost"}, and told anecdotes of his basic training at Fort Benning, taking time out to harass two gen-yoo-ine southern reducek girls, and a senior faculty member ("Excuse me, but who are you? Not FBI, the shoes are wrong").

Around four o'clock, the presentation became a sort of conversation between the sf fans in the audience and Ellison, trading gripes about editors (Ellison feels that there are not any good editors these days, and is especially displeased with George Scithers (ex-editor of Asimov's SF Mag and the current editor of Amazing). At this point, Ellison and Linaweaver were discussing the market for short stories, and Linaweaver complimented Ellison on being extremely literate. Ellison came over to Brad, sat down in front of him, and jokingly asked "Would you marry me?" (but that would have made five divorces, Harlan).

I even sot an Ellison anecdote of my own out of this afternoon. I had a few books by Ellison that I had brought to set autographed, and at the start of his talk I put them on the table in front of me. Ellison walked over to me, picked up my copy of Doomsman {the Belomont Double with some Lin Carter monstrosity on the flip side} and asked:

"Do you want to sell this?"

"Well, I'd prefer to trade it for a copy of Web of the City."

"The Ace edition?"

"Sure. "

"OK, write your name and adress and the title of the book on a piece of paper, and I'll mail you a copy." Then he took the book up to his podium and ripped it up. "There, only ten thousand copies to so! Oh, do you have a plastic bas?" I save him one. "You may be wondering why I'm taking the pieces with me. Well, at a convention a few years ago. I tore about five or six of these up and threw them in a garbage can. A dealer fished them out and was selling them at \$35 each later that day."

Finally, all I can say is that the only place that I thought Harlan would be less likely to give a talk than Clarkston, Georgia would have been at a Ku Klux Klan rally.

The other nice thing will be the speed of using a polaroid, versus waiting for a blueprint house to complete their work.


