

I think one of the most obvious causes for apathy is the lack of published TAFF Reports during the past few years. In case you're not familiar with that situation, here's the list:

Title: "A Fake Fan in London." 1958: Bennett: serialized in various zines and finally collected into one volume: COLONIAL EXCURSION. 1959: published in two volumes: TAFF BAEDEKER. 1960: Bentcliffe: published in one volume: EPITAFF. 1961: serialized in SHAGGY; now collected (1968) in Ellik: one volume: THE SQUIRREL'S TALE * 1962: published in one volume, 1963: THE LINDSAY Lindsay: REPORT. 1963: Weber: never published. 1964: published in one volume, 1967: ATOM ABROAD, Thomson: published by Ethel Lindsay. 1965: Carr: never published

That's a pretty poor showing for US reports! *(Ron's report, as of today -- 12 April 68 -- is finished except for a cover, a final page, and 2 pages of introduction and preface. Tom Gilbert has done the publishing and I have done the printing; the volume will be ready by the end of April, or sooner. FANTASY AMATEUR 122 (Evans family, mostly) Slight correction: Ron Ellik was the third member of FAPA lost through death, not the second. Besides Vernon McCain, there was John Champion, who died in an auto accident

back in 1962. And unfortunately, Lee Jacobs is a fourth.

The automatic reaction to having a number of fans die in a short time -besides Ron and Lee, two other LASFSians died in the six week period from mid-Jan. to the end of February: Dale Hart, probably of cancer, and Barbara Pollard (wife of Dave Pollard, previously of New York) of virus pneumonia -- is "I hope to hell it stops here!" But if the average age of fandom keeps increasing, as it has seemed to be doing, we are going to be in for more of the same, even without the help of accidents. The teenagers who took up science fiction and science fiction fandom in their earliest stages have now reached middle age, and although gafia has winnowed the ranks, enough of them are still active that fandom is going to notice their loss in increasing numbers as the years pass.

We had a panel at a recent LASFS meeting -- the 1600th, as a matter of fact -- to air opinions on what fandom would be like in the future. (We had dealt with the fandom of the past at the huge 1500th meeting a couple years ago.) As might be expected, nothing of real import was decided, but once again the fact came up that fandom must, in order to survive, get more new members -- young members. It must get a lot of them, too, because the attrition among neofans is something fierce, and only one out of every three, or even one of every five, will remain in fandom longer than a year. (It appears that, if a fan survives his first year, he will stay around for at least five or more. It used to be that we had more of the three-year cicada types, who whooped it up for a couple of years, spent one year of decline, and dropped out completely.)

Most of this, of course, is irrelevant to FAPA. FAPA members have been in fandom at least five years, because it took them that long to climb up the waiting list and become a member. But maybe those of you who are active in local clubs can see the picture. How many new members are your clubs getting these days? Buz -- what about the Nameless Ones? Bill or Bob -- how about WSFA? What gives with New York? Chicago? Detroit? Philadelphia? Baltimore? There is one definite spot of vastly increased nec activity, and that's St. Louis. There are also rumblings of rejuvenstion coming from New Orleans. The Midwest Shall Rise Again??

Mr. Sec-Treas, if you're wondering about the WLer calling himself Lord Triffid III, I can vouch for the fact that it isn't anyone also known in fandom under another name. His real name is Chuck McMillan (spelling of last name uncertain.)

SERCON'S BANE 35 (F.M. Busby)I like that idea of installing a timing device on such speakers as Moskowitz. The one you suggest would be excellent -- the one that rings a bell after ten minutes, then, if he doesn't sit down and shut up in 30 seconds, cuts his balls off. He attends LASFS meetings (infrequently) and conventions. Buz will probably attest to Jerry being a fan -- to a limited degree, anyway -- as he used to be in the Seattle area.

GRANDFATHER STORIES (Howard Devore) Isn't this supposed to be a postmailing, Howard?

I'm sure there's a tradition (or something simi-

lar) to that effect, and this actually being in the mailing is somewhat strange.... Regarding your idea that some qualification would be desirable for Worldcon Site Voting, so that "casual attendees cannot control the vote," there have been two such plans suggested: Limit the vote to those who are attending at least their second convention, or Limit the vote to those willing to buy advance memberships in the next convention. I am personally in favor of the latter plan, since the former would make for some damn difficult bookkeeping and checking. The latter plan would operate by having the current Worldcon sell memberships in the next one, at standard rates, giving receipts which include ballot stubs set up on the Australian Ballot system, which gives an automatic run-off in the case of three or more voters. These memberships would be sold when you registered, and for the first couple days of the con, with a Ballot Box kept in the lobby, and a deadline scheduled for the end of the seco second day of the con. Sometime during those first two days, the Business Meeting would be held, and the different sites would have a chance to present their platforms and other such speeches before the deadline for ballots. This would eliminate from the vote those "casual attendees" who have no interest in the next convention because they have no intention of going to it, and could care less where it is held. I would really like to see this plan put into operation, and will probably drop another idea -- the selection of a site two years ahead of the con instead of just one -- in order to push the membership-vote idea.

I had to have a new impression roller on my Gestetner in 1966, three years after I bought it at DisCon. It was developing actual holes -- chunks of the roller

being gouged out -- for some strange reason I never did figure out.

MOONSHINE 34 (Len Moffatt) I would like to agree loudly with your admonition to non-Los Angeles fans not to lump all of L.A. Fandom in one group. Every time someone does it, I get very bugged, and start considering possible ways to lump them. Several times. By now, some 33 years after the formation of the LASFS, people ought to know that a unanymity of opinion or action just does not exist in Los Angeles, and that complaining about L.A. Fandom as a result of something that the PanPacificon Committee (for example) has reputedly done is as unfair as complaining about the Lunarians as a result of something Ted White (for example) has reputedly done. Hell -- half of L.A. Fandom was supporting a bid other than PanPacificon until Seattle dropped out of the race and the BArea got the Westercon. Then, for those of us who want two conventions, it became necessary to support PanPacificon for the Worldcon. When that fell through -- and the non-combatants in L.A. soon realized that the bid had been goofed, not stolen -- the two-conventions crowd was left with the only alternative being to put on a sort of one-shot convention over Fourth of July weekend. Hence, the FUNCon, which is being put on by a committee which had nothing whatsoever to do with the PanPacificon bid, and dislikes it intensely when someone (like Chalker in SAPS) labels it as a "Westercon put on by the losers." The creebing I have done at BayCon Committee has been for HOW WE WON and subsequent actions I considered ill-advised, not for the bid take-over. (See comments on their 2nd. PR in GLAMDRING 6.)

It should also be pointed out that there are so damn many fans in L.A., if they all worked toward the same ends it would be a hell of a lot of momentum. And the easiest way to unite factions is to have an outside force pick on all of them....

INTRODUCTION TO Glambring

Late last year, in a small and probably not too viable APA called STOBCLER, I got onto the subject of checklists of fanzines produced each year. It seemed to me that the easiest way to index them would be to keep track, month by month, of what came clunking into the mailbox of a few fans. These few fans would have to be (you should excuse the expression) focal points of general fanzine fandom -- Buck Coulson, for instance -- who would, among them, get just about every fanzine that was published. I myself was -- and still am, to a great extent -- rather out of a good part of fanzine fandom, though I still got a fair number of genzines as well as all sorts of APA mailings.

I knew perfectly well that this was just so much talk as far as it was likely to get someone to keep track of and publish a list of incoming fanzines. Fans are all busy with their own projects, and hardly have time for everything they want to get done, let alone finding time for something someone else w's trying to palm off on them. There was only one person I could possibly con into doing such a job: me.

So when January 1968 rolled around, I started keeping a list of the zines that arrived -- including APA mailings, APA postmailings, subzines, tradezines, and everything else that could be called a fanzine. I dragged out of retirement a zine title I had used for three issues of a fanzine-review zine back in 1960, and when the January list was completed, GLAMDRING 4 was put together. It ran six pages, including a cover and a list of addresses of the editors/publishers of the listed zines. Numbers 5 and 6, covering, respectively, February and March, duly appeared. They each ran six pages including a cover and address-list, too. Hopefully, by the time you read this, the April issue will be finished. Assuming I can keep it up, a reasonably comprehensive listing will be available at the end of the year. And perhaps, if it does come out regularly, the percentage of zines I don't get will decrease...

I discovered, after the first two issues, that it is easier to keep all the zines themselves together in a stack during the month, rather than try to extract pertinent information from them, and put the scribbled list in order when it comes time to stencil an issue. The zine is quite easy to compose in the stick, giving, as it does, just basic information -- and maybe an opinion or two, in the case of genzines. Just as long as I remember to note the date of arrival.

A sample copy of GLAMDRING accompanies this issue of ANKUS, so you can get some idea of what I'm talking about. The information provided is: Title and issue number, editor/publisher, date, date of arrival, and statistics: number of printed pages, number of blank pages, means of reproduction, and size. Also, APA circulation (if any). Special features or oddities, especially bibliographic ones, are noted.

Copies of GLAMDRING are sent to all fanzine editors who have sent me zines I would not get through APA or club membership, plus a couple archive copies. As the zine is of value only to a collector, and there don't seem to be too many collectors of fanzines these days, I have only had a few requests for copies so far. But several LASFSians buy copies each month, and the few comments I have received were encouraging. (Except for Coulson, who doesn't want YANDRO advertised.)

Anyone wanting copies of GLAMDRING can get them by trading, or 2/25¢. Suggestions for additions or improvement are welcomed, but no guarantee is made about following them. And don't worry about a few items not being listed under an APA even though they appeared in the mailing. Firstly, I don't count flyers and ballots at all -- only actual fanzines, which have titles, editors, etc. And zines are only listed once for each issue; an item going through the Jan. SAPS mailing and the Feb. FAPA mailing will only show up on the Jan. list, though mention of FAPA distribution will be made in the notes. (Case in point: THE BALLARD CHRONICLES #5.)
