I am also trying to picture flying from our summer to their winter next August. l am finding it a bit difficult although the practical part of me went shopping tonight and bought three long-sleeved turtle-neck sweaters that were on sale. Lesleigh Luttrell who is DUFF administrator and who has been to Australia has written, "it doesn't get half as cold there as it does in the northern USA, but it will be cold, expecially to North American fans flying over after several months of summer here. The temperature will be in the 40s and maybe 50s during the day in Meibourne and slightly warmer in Sydney. So it is a good idea to take warmer clothes and a coat. I would suggest the sort of clothes you would wear during the fall in cooler parts of the USA. The beaches are beautiful at any time of year, but don't take your swim suit and expect to be able to go bathing in the ocean. And remember that Australia is really beautiful in the winter."



# FLIGHT NEWS

As expected, the air fares to Australia have increased. AND I have been warned that they will probably increase again next May or June. I suggest that you plan on a ten per cent increase. The following are the new, current fares.

For people who want to read up about Australia, may I recommend Arthur C. Clarke's "The Coast of Coral:" also "The Lucky Country," by Donald Horne, which in my edition is an Australian Penguin book published in 1964. There are also the "Profile of Australia" by Craig McGregor, Penguin Books #2767, 1968, and "A Short History of Australia" by Manning Clark, Mentor Books 1963.

I'd further recommend that prospective travelers get a good Geographic Society map of Australia -- not those schlock types published by the Hammond Company -and study it until they can get around in the more populated regions (as 1, unfortunately, because I won't be going, can) with ease.

Clarke's "Dolphin Island," while juvenile and not really very good, does have some background on the Australia of today mixed in with the fiction.

The first Clarke book mentioned above will give the reader a close feel for the Gold Coast region, which we can roughly equate with Miami Beach and the Gulf Coast as far as climate. Of course, the Australian consulates and embassy will have loads of material which you might be able to liberate quanities of, for inclusion in mailings to charter members. The brochures published by the individual towns aren't much help, but the brochures published by the individual states are excellent. Pan Am also has (had?) excellent map of the Sydney region.

Champion papers published a fantastic graphic trip about Australia which is now unavailable; it won about a dozen awards for graphic design and general excellence (it was a showcase for their papers and printing methods, with inserts and maps and photos and posters about the past, present and future of the country).

Australians do talk funny, as the article you put in the newsletter indicates, and they do have an accent, as the fans who met the Australians at the last two worldcons should know, but I'd like to point out that I never had the slightest bit of difficulty understanding the fans. They don't use as much Australian slang as do some other Australian residents (they use more fannish slang, I think), and I found the variety of accents at the Syncon perfectly delightful.

L think the best place to get information about what to see and do in Australia is from travel folders. I must have read hundreds of the things before I went. That's the only way you can really decide what you want to see. And they also help give you some idea of what it will cost to see Alice Springs or the Great Barrier Reef, or whatever. Personally, I think that everything in Australia is interesting, and even if the fans don't get out of Sydney and Melbourne, they still should be satisfied with their trip to Australia (although I would highly recommend getting to Adelaide, which is a beautiful little city.) One thing I found was that travel in Australia was fairly cheap. The inter-city flights really aren't that expensive, and I've heard that the trains are very comfortable and cheap. Of course, a trip to Perth could be quite expensive.

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# LATE NEWS

For those who have asked about the use of credit cards in Australia, you should have no problem with American Express, Diner's Club, or Carte Blanche. Do not plan to use Mastercharge or BankAmericard as few places honor them.

We will probably travel on Air New Zealand which leaves Los Angeles at 9:15 in the evening. Don't forget that we loose a day, crossing the International Date Line so we will arrive in Sydney on Monday. Air New Zealand flies DC-10s to Australia.

Several people have written to say that they plan to go to Australia before our group or by other means but want to know if they can return with our group. We will be most happy to make arrangements for these people to return on the same flight as our group. However, regular fares will apply as the G.I.T. fare is a round-trip fare only. Also, it is not officially possible to split a G.I.T. fare with one person using it one way and another person using it the other way. We are required to give individual names and these are checked against passports.

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For your planning convenience, here is a calendar for our summer (Australian winter) months, 1975. The dates for Aussiecon are August 14 thru August 17.

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
