





of last year. Farnsworth Fright built up a circle of dependable renders during his term of office or editor- and they never let him down. He also built up a group of writers such as Rebert Elech -Thorn McClusky - Henry Kutiner - Hobert &. Howard and others. Of late the covers have improved, and the ertist has confined the painting to strictly weird and fantastic subjects - such as Virgil Finlays' covers for August and Mayorber 1939. Mention might also be made here of a now artist the merazine has recently acquired . Bok - his covers for the December 1939 and Warch 1940 show that he has an entirely different conception of any subject to Finlay. P. erman & DeLoy. His drawings in the December issue show a consmicuous lack of dotail, while those in the March issue show that he has remedied this fault. Summing up WEIRD TALES it can be safely said that it appeals first and foromost to the weird fan and next to the common-or-garden science fiction fan, who reads it as a matter of course.

The only simplish publication devoted entirely to science fiction is Talab of 30 Maxis, which features abstly reprints the covere of this magazine are as different from those of the American magazines as sugar is from selt. They appeal to the science-fiction fan and the regular reader, and also to the person going or a holiday who gets a magazine at the last minute before boarding the train, to read while away. 
