

EBONY BOOKS ANNOUNCE NEW ANTHOLOGY

EBONY BOOKS (that is, Jenny and Russell Blackford) are publishing an anthology of Oz sf later this year. It is guaranteed emu and kangaroo free. What's more, Ayers Rock will not turn out to be an alien artifact in any of the stories. They are planning, they added, to launch the book during Aussiecon Two in August.

The anthology, URBAN FANTASIES (a term Lee Harding invented to describe his award winning novel, DISPLACED PERSON) will concentrate on life as most Australians know it. It has been edited jointly by Russell Blackford and David King, the editor of Norstrilia Press's very wellrecieved anthology DREAMWORKS.

Some perceptive readers will have noticed that in the about-the-author section of Ebony's first book, TRANSMITTERS by Damien Broderick, there is mentioned a story about 'a man who gives birth to a lobster who is really his mother'. Those intrigued by this description should be happy to find it in URBAN FANTASIES. Other highlights include John Baxter's first sf short story for many years, and George Turner's version of St Kilda after the greenhouse effect.

LEE HARDING -BOOKS AND BABIES

LEE HARDING reports that his novel DISPLACED PERSON has gone back to press for its fifth printing in Penguin and WAITING FOR THE END OF THE WORLD went into its second printing as soon as it was released as a Puffin Plus: the new edition will be as a Penguin. A little confusing, but Peguins are doing this with books that have adult as well as juvenile appeal. THE WEB OF TIME, is now due to be published in Puffin in April or May, depending on the arrival of stock from overseas. PAUL COLLINS has sold a story, SELECT FEW, to Ebony Books for inclusion in their anthology, URBAN FANTASIES. He has also sold a story, THE HOUSE THAT LIKED PEOPLE, to Oxford University Press for a children's anthology, due out this year. Paul intended to publish nis own novel SHERRA this year, but as he has not received a grant from the Literature Board, the publication of SHERRA and other books planned, is gravely in doubt.

In association with American Agent Cherry Weiner, Paul Collins has sold three of WYNNE WHITEFORD's books to Berkley: BREATHING SPACE ONLY, SAPPHIRE ROAD and THOR'S HAMMER. BREATHING SPACE ONLY was also published in France last year and if anybody would like a copy in French, write to Paul Collins.

BEASTS OF HEAVEN by VICTOR KELLEHER is an sf novel, which has just been published by the University of Queensland Press and distributed by Penguin Books. Kelleher won the Children's Book Award in 1983 for his fantasy novel, MASTER OF THE GROVE.

JACK WODHAMS has sold his novel FUTURE WAR, to the European publisher Novelles Editions Opta. Wodhams agents handled the deal with the publishers, who will include it in their Galaxie-Bis series. Cory and Collins originally published the book in 1982.

DORIS LESSING In Australia



The acclaimed author DORIS LESSING, was in Australia during February and March, primarily to attend the National Word Festival in Canberra. She stopped in other cities for brief periods and while in Melbourne, Space Age Books had the great pleasure of introducing her to George Turner at a dinner held at the Florentino Restaurant. Mrs Lessing is a very charming and interesting person. She found quite a few items of mutual interest during her conversation with George Turner, and with Merv Binns and Maureen Walsh, from Space Age Books. At a gathering held in Sydney, heard on the ABC by our correspondent, under very poor conditions, Mrs Lessing replied to various questions from an audience. In so doing she made some very interesting remarks about science fiction. She said that it should not be regarded in an way other than another branch of literature, that writers have been using for centuries. She said that she found it a convenient way of carrying her ideas and was rather shocked at the reactions she got from her readers, with the publication of SHIKASTA and the following books. She defines science fiction as a literature of ideas written by scientists, but "space-fiction" is something else again. This does not mean that she is especially critical of "spacefiction" and enjoys reading much of it.

Mrs Lessing caused something of a sensation in the publishing world last year, when it was revealed that she had written two books under the pseudonym of Jane Somers. Her publisher Jonathan Cape knocked them back, but they were finally picked up, rather ironically, by her old publisher, Michael Joseph. The secret finally got out, but not before the point had been made that unknown authors, no matter how good their writing may be, can find it very hard to get published.

People & Publishing

Following their teaching stint at M.I.T., JOE and GAY HALDEMAN having been enjoying themselves galavanting throughout the USA, Britain and the Bahamas. They will be attending AUSSIECON TWO, which they are eagerly looking forward to. Joe put off the writing of the third book in the "Worlds" trilogy late last year to write a new novel TOOL OF THE TRADE.

KATHERINE KURTZ has sold a collection of Deryni stories to Del Rey. / MICHAEL MOORCOCK has finished rewriting THE CITY OF THE AUTUMN STARS for Pocket. He was recently working on LETTERS FROM HOLLYWOOD and a sequel to PHOENIX IN OBSIDIAN, while convalescing after a case of double pneumonia. / PHILIP JOSE FARMER's new novel DAYWORLD, has been optioned for filming by Embassy Pictures. Farmer has also signed to do the novelization of FANTASTIC VOYAGE 2. The original movie novel was supposedly written by Isaac Asimov, but he is reported to have ignored it when referring to his over 300 book titles. Farmer's book is written from a treatment by Jerome Bixby and will be published even if the movie does not get to the screen.

ROBERT SILVERBERG's next two sf novels have been purchased by Donald Fine Inc. for hard cover and Warner for paperback. The advance was reported to be more that \$600,000. Silverberg's fortunes have changed dramatically since his attendance of AUSSIECON I in 1975, when he was on the verge of giving sf writing up as a bad job.

JACK VANCE has completed the second book in his "Lyonesse Cycle", a concept he has been working on most of his life./ The issue of LOCUS due out last November almost didn't make it, becasue their printer refused to print it. They claimed that a photograph of a topless mermaid, taken at the World Convention masquerade last year, was pornographic. LOCUS returned to their old printer . who were not so prudish. / HAMLYN paperback publishers in the UK have started a new SF series, edited by Rog Peyton and Rod Milner. VENTURE Science Fiction will start off with WE ALL DIED AT BREAKWAY STATION by Richard C. Meridith, COME, HUNT AN EARTHMAN by Philip E. High, HAMMER'S SLAMMERS by David Drake, INTERSTELLAR EMPIRE by John Brunner.

and STAR WOLF by Edmond Hamilton. Not a bad selection, but it is a pity there are no original titles.

DAVID HARTWELL is now the director of SF at Arbor House publishers. He is still carrying on with his other editing commitments. ROBERT SILVERBERG was released from his contract with Arbor and is now associated with Donald I. Fine publishers. An obvious development to those who have been following this U.S publishing saga./ J.G. BALLARD'S latest non-sf novel, EMPIRE OF THE SUN, has received a lot of publicity, despite it missing out on the coveted Booker Prize. It has been criticised by many readers who were in Asia during the war with Japan, which is the setting for the book, saying that it is nothing like the real situation. As ANSIBLE points out this is no surprise to sf readers, as Ballard has always written about alternate worlds.

ANNE McCAFFREY saved Western ReCon II, held last October '84, from disaster when the hotel, the Airport Hilton demanded payment in advance for the banquet. She offered them the use of her gold Amex card which did the trick. Conventions do have their problems with hotel managements at times. / Three fantasy encyclopedias have been announced for future release : THE ENCYCLOPEDIA OF HORROR AND THE SUPERNATURAL edited by Jack Sullivan (Promised Land/Viking), THE ENCYCLOPEDIA OF FANTASY AND HORROR edited by Maxim Jakubowski (Allen & Unwin), and THE ENCYCLOPEDIA OF FANTASY edited by Peter Nichols and John Clute (Granada). We will have to wait and see which is the best. / HARLAN ELLISON has been signed as creative consultant on a new THE TWILIGHT ZONE TV series. He is to see that stories are innovative and original and to more or less protect authors rights. Ellison claimed that the film TERMINATOR, was very similar in plot to two of his OUTER LIMITS episodes, "Soldier" and "Demon With A Glass Hand". The film company apparently accepted Ellison's claim and paid him over \$60,000.

PHILIP K.DICK died around three years ago, but new books are still being published that were not published, (most likely because nobody wanted them), when he was alive. The most recent titles not seen mentioned by us before, include I HOPE I SHALL ARRIVE SOON from Doubleday in the US and Gollancz in the U.K and PUTTERING ABOUT IN A SMALL LAND from Academy Chicago publishers. / MARION ZIMMER BRADLEY has sold her historical novel THE FIREBRAND, about women during the Trojan war, to Del Rey and Knopf./ MICHAEL MOORCOCK and LINDA STEELE were married last year.

STEPHEN KING has admitted that a number of his books have been published under the psuedonym of RICHARD BACHMAN. His publisher said that he only wanted to publish two King books a year and King said there was just too much stuff about with his name on it. The first editions of the Bachman titles are: RAGE (Signet 1977), THE LONG WALK (Signet 1979), ROAD WORK (Signet 1981), RUNNING MAN (Signet 1982) and THINNER (NAL 1984).

POUL ANDERSON'S has completed THE GAME OF EMPIRE, which will be issued as a novel and a computer game. / GEORGE R. STEWART, the author of EARTH ABIDES and who died in 1980, recently had a mountain named after him in the U.S.A. He is credited with starting the practice of giving hurricanes the names of women./ NORMAN SPINRAD recently completed a novel set in the same universe as THE VOID CAPTAIN'S TABLE, but otherwise unconnected, called CHILD OF THE FUTURE.

THE DONNING COMPANY has cancelled most of it's Starblaze fisf and remaindered most of the back list apart from "Elfquest" and the "Myth" books. They blamed poor distribution and low sales. We have mentioned before the frustrating experience of dealing with Donning/Starblaze, so we are not surprised that they have reached this situation.

BANTAM BOOKS are to launch a new sf imprint in Jume, SPECTRA BOOKS. Six titles per month will be published, including hard covers and paperbacks. Most will be original titles./ Berkley and Ace are forming a seperate publishing "house within a house", just to handle publication of all their figst titles. The new seperate mini-publisher will have its own budget, director, etc.

The ex-publisher of AMAZING and FANTASTIC, Arthur Bernhard, was in Australia last November '84 and took the time to ring and thank us for sending him the NEWS. He is still in publishing, but not in the sf field at present.

WILLIAM ROTSLER has sold a 3rd book in his "Zandra" series to Doubleday. He will also be doing books on the third MAD MAX film and the next STAR TREK film.

ARTHUR C. CLARKE UPDATE

Following a report in our last issue, we received the following letter from Arthur Clarke:

COLOMBO 7, SRI LANKA

6th January, 1985

Dear Merv,

Correction to your corrections (who is feeding you all this duff gen?!)

Not only have I not been deleted from the movie, but I appear twice. (If you blink, you'll miss the second time...)

I don't have a company called 'Modern Technologies', but the government has sponsored 'The Arthur C. Clarke Centre for Modern Technologies', and I've donated my Marconi Award to it.

Happy to say that my Russian editor hasn't suffered much, judging by the number of times he has appeared on Moscow TV...But some of my Russian friends are still annoyed with me...

The information included in the last issue was gathered mainly from LOCUS, so we apologise if we have screwed it up a bit. Clarke's first appearance in the film is very early and quite obvious, but the second one is more "one dimensional" and he appears with an old friend. You can have fun now looking for him when you see the film.

During 1985 ARTHUR C.CLARKE will be resuming work on a new novel, THE SONGS OF DISTANT EARTH. He will also be involved in pre-production work on a movie of THE FOUNTAINS OF PARADISE. The new novel is not due to be completed until December 1968. Work on 20,001: THE FINAL ODYSSEY will not start until 1988, following the Galileo Spaceprobe's survey of Jupiter's moons.

The movie of 2010 was nominated for five Academy Awards, including special effects, best costume design and others, but it unfortunately did not win any. INDIANA JONES AND THE TEMPLE OF DOOM got sfx.

Films nominated for Oscars this year in the f§sf category include 2010, GREYSTOKE, GHOSTBUSTERS, and INDIANA JONES, plus DUNE and INDIANA JONES AND THE TEMPLE OF DOOM. It was a big year for f§sf films and some other films might have been mentioned amongst the Oscars, but in our estimations there are really no surprise ommissions. STAR TREK III, STARMAN, SPLASH, CONAN - THE DESTROYER, GREMLINS, THE LAST STARFIGHTER, FIRE-STARTER, and THE TERMINATOR were some that missed out.

THE STARS MY DESTINATION, based on the Alfred Bester novel, was due to go into production at Elstree Studios in England last September./ Posters for the film THE COMPANY OF WOLVES, based on Angela Carter's retelling of the Little Red Riding Hood story, with a werewolf slant, were banned on London railway stations and buses. They depicted a wolf leaping out of a man's mouth and were subsequently altered.

GEORGE LUCAS' next project is a film called LABRYNTH, which will include along with a human cast, a family of creatures created by Muppets creator, Jim Henson. Disneyland is creating a new section in its Tomorrowland area based on "Star Wars" and "Indiana Jones". Disney Studios intend to make more mainstream films, but will continue with f&sf films, one of which will be THE NAVIGATOR, directed by John Avildsen. The novel KINDRED SPIRITS by Alan Brennert, has been optioned for a movie by MGM/UA. The deal includes a screen play by Brennert.

A start on the making of STAR TREK IV was delayed when William Shatner asked for \$2 million and 10% of the film's profits. New leadership at Paramount has got work on the film going again, and negotiations with Shatner are under way. Leonard Nimoy will be directing again, from a story he and producer Harve Bennent have developed./ Michael Douglas and Kathleen Turner, stars of ROMANCING THE STONE, will be reunited in a new similar film, JEWEL OF THE NILE. The Douglas production company is filming for 20th Century-Fox. Another GHOSTBUSTERS film and an ALIEN II are still being talked about. Word is

just out that Australian media magnate Rupert Murdoch, has bought 50% of Fox, but that should not directly effect any projects the company has at present.

STEPHEN KING is still popular with movie makers and his story CAT'S EYE is to be produced by Dino Laurentiis International Film Corporation, while Stephen Spielberg has optioned THE TALISMAN. / A movie based on L. Ron Hubbard's BATTLEFIELD EARTH was due to start filming in Colorado early this year. / Dino De Laurentiis is planning to make more f&sf films, following DUNE. First off the block will be RED SONJA, with Brigette Nielsen in the title role and Arnold Schwarzenegger in a cameo role as Conan. Filming is due to begin in March in Rome on the Philip K.Dick based movie TOTAL RECALL. Adapted by Dan O'Bannion and Ron Shusett and directed by David Cronenberg. SILVER BULLET, based on Stephen King's book CYCLE OF THE WEREWOLF, is also due for production.



The BBC recently announced that it was suspending production of the long running TV series DR WHO. Fans all over the world were very upset at the news and started taking up petitions and writing letters to the BBC, to put DR WHO back on again. We do not know what effect that had if any, but the BBC announced mid-March that production would start again late '85. They said that they thought the series needed a "holiday" and that the break would lead to a better DR WHO series in the future.

The BBC-TV production based on John Christopher's THE TRIPODS series, is reported to be very well done. It is to be hoped that we see it here soon. The BBC screened two programmes on possible disasters last year. The first, THREADS, was based on a limited nuclear attack and the second was ON THE 8TH DAY, a documentary on a possible ice age or nuclear winter, that may follow a war. We had the privilege of seeing the film sequel to 2001: A SPACE ODYSSEY, early this year. Based on Arthur Clarke's novel 2010:ODYSSEY TWO and produced and directed by Peter Hyams, it is a fitting sequel to the famous Kubrick classic. Some of the mystery has gone, but a new mystery has been added. The visual aspects of the film are superb and Hyams, in co-operation with Clarke, has written a screen play which leaves out a lot of the extraneous material in the book and adds a few new things, which help to make the movie a clear and concise adaption of the story.

The people in the story played by leading actors including Roy Scheider, John Lithgow and Helen Mirren and others, are much more real and important to the story than those in 2001. The special effects in 2010 are superb, but they do not overshadow the story, however they do make you realise how far 2001 was ahead of its time. Everybody who regards 2001 as the best sf film we feel will appreciate 2010 and no doubt we will see a third film when Clarke completes the book in a few years.

The recent crop of fisf films made for some entertaining film going over the last few months. DUNE was a nice adjunct to the book, with some great scenes and costumes and such, but if you had not read the book, it was quite hard to follow. Many cuts had obviously been made on the original film length also, which did not help to explain what was going on. A great film in many ways, but on close analysis very disappointing. THE NEVER ENDING STORY is a beautifully produced fantasy for all ages. Don't miss it! GHOSTBUSTERS is the most over-rated film I have seen recently. It appears to be a series of unrelated incidents, with a not very well defined and unconvincing background. It just left me cold apart from some very funny lines and some good scenes. The marshmallow giant seemed so completely irrelevant and unecessary to the story. The appearance of Sigourney Weaver was one of the few saving graces of the movie. THE LAST STARFIGHTER is an entertaining adventure, made particularly enjoyable by the performances of Robert Preston and Dan O'Herlihy as aliens. I would go so far as to say that O'Herlihy's performance is one of the most convincing portrayals of an alien seen on the screen.

SF on TV is represented only at present by the series V, which gets stupider and sillier, with every episode.



THE SCIENCE FICTION SOURCE BOOK Edited by David Wingrove; Longman; 320pp; \$25.00

A 'source book' is, in literary definition, a book from which later writers have taken plots, characters, ideas, etc; thus the Bible, The Decameron, The 1001 Nights are famous source books. But nobody will get any ideas from TSFSB because it consists only of recapitulation of what is mostly well known.

The standard of the work may be judged by the 200-page section on authors, where selected works are given gradings (as at an exam, from 1 star to 5 stars) for Readability, Characterisation, Literary Merit, etc. Since twelve compilers are involved, including many who should have known better, the results are hilarious, the more so as none of these qualities is open to quantitative assessment.

It is hard to imagine why the book was published, save perhaps to cash in on the current suckerbait popularity of SF reference works. The only general reference SF book worth having remains the Nicholls ENCYCLOPEDIA OF SCIENCE FICTION.

THE ENCHANTRESS

By Lin Yutang Bantam HC; 345pp; \$16.95

Despite its title this is not genre fantasy, yet it contains more genuine, rapturous enchantment with the strange and marvellous than a dozen sword 'n sorcery products. It begins and ends in eighteenth century Switzerland ('Frankenstein'territory!) but stretches its middle span across lost Ayuthia, the capital of old Thailand before it was sacked and razed. And the historical truth of Ayuthia leaves magical imagination boggling in its wake.

The story deals with twin brother and sister who share an occasional telepathic rapport. Bea has also some insights which smell of witchcraft while Colin is a marvellous artificer who manufactures clockwork figures simulating living people. Such figures, though fairly crude, were in fact popular upper class toys of the period; Han Suyin's fantasy only makes Colin's product superior to the point of being called androids.

These talents take the children across the world to grow up in Ayuthia in an atmosphere of court intrigue, East/West turmoil and one of the most peculiar wars ever fought. (At one point the hopelessly besieged king silences his guns when his senior wife complains of the noise!) They meet with love, treachery, devotion and death in gorgeous and terrible settings but never in quite the accepted form of fantasy or historical romance. The unusual ending should intrigue fanciers of both genres.

This surely will be one of the most charming and <u>different</u> romances of 1985. Highly recommended.

A RESUME OF BOOKS RECEIVED FROM PUBLISHERS FOR REVIEW

Books sent to us for review have stacked up a little with the long delay since our last issue. Most are titles distributed locally by the major wholesalers and they include some interesting originals and some worthwhile new editions.

CORGI have sent us two larger format paperbacks. QUEEN OF THE LIGHTNING by Kathleen Herbert is an historical fantasy, set in the 7th century and featuring a descendent of King Arthur. The other title from CORGI is not sf, but certainly of interest: ARE COMPUTERS ALIVE? by Geoff Simons, is subtitled The Evolution of Computers and Robots As New Life Forms. The former has a RRP of \$6.95 and the latter a RRP of \$7.95.

BANTAM USA are one of the few American publishers who regularly send us review copies and we thank them. Most of their titles are distributed in Australia by CORGI - BANTAM. VALENTINE PONITFEX by Robert Silverberg completes the saga which began with LORD VALENTINE'E CASTLE. This edition will not be distributed in Australia, but we expect it will be out from PAN soon. THE SEARCH FOR KA is the fifth title in The Gandalara Cycle, by



Randall Garrett & Vicki Ann Heydron, ARRP \$3.95. RAPHAEL by R.A.MacAvoy, the 1984 John W. Campbell Award Winner for Best New Writer, is the third in her medieval fantasy series, following DAMIANO and DAMIANO'S LUTE. DINOSAUR TALES by Ray Bradbury, with illustrations by various artists, was previously published in large format, but is now out in massmarket-size paperback. EMERGENCE by David R.Palmer was first published as two seprate novellas in ANALOG. An outstanding post-holocaust novel by an outstanding new writer.

The outstanding release from PAN recently was Douglas Adams fourth "Hitch-Hiker" book, SO LONG, AND THANKS FOR ALL THE FISH. Arthur Dent and his friends are at it again. PRINCE OMBRA by Roderick MacLeish, is a better than average fantasy adventure, that seems to combine the styles of Tolkien, Stephen Donaldson and Stephen King and deserves more attention than it has received.

The U.S. publisher BLUEJAY have done a tremendous job in the short time they have been in business. Their new titles and reprints, have all been very worthwhile. THE YEAR'S BEST SCIENCE FICTION, edited by Gardner Dozois, is the first in what is to be a regular annual publication. There will always be arguments about what is and what is not included in these annual collections, but in the long run the popularity of the collection or not will prove if the editors own idea of what is best agrees with the readers. For those who just want to read the best of the short fiction published, without wading through all the crud, here is yet another volume for you.

PENGUIN BOOKS periodically let their sf list go to pot, but every now and again they reprint some of their best old titles and they are currently reprinting some interesting original U.S. titles. No doubt to tie in with the tremendous popularity of their role-playing-game books, they are publishing Robert Asprin's "Thieve's World" anthologies. THIEVES WORLD at \$5,95 ARP and TALES FROM THE VULGAR UNICORN are the first two in the series and now on sale. A further title in Jack Chalker's series, TWILIGHT AT THE WELL OF SOULS at \$5.95 ARRP is also out, along with VOYAGE FROM YESTERYEAR by James P. Hogan and BLUESONG by Sydney Van Scyoc, is the continuing saga began with DARKCHILD, at \$4.95. Amongst recent new reprints are THE SPACE MERCHANTS by Fred Pohl and C.M.Kornbluth, and TIME OUT OF JOINT by Philip K. Dick.

FONTANA are getting in on the action that Penguin, Arrow, and various other publish-ers originated, in the Role-Playing-Game-Books. FIRE WOLF and THE CRYPTS OF TERROR are the first two titles in the "Sagas of Demonspawn" by J.H.Brennan, both at \$5.50 ARRP. GILDENFIRE by Stephen Donaldson, I regard as a little bit of indiscriminate publishing and judging by the sales at Space Age, they have come a cropper. This 94 page fragment was excised from "The Illearth War" in the "Chronicles of Thomas Covenant " series by the original publisher and picked up by Underwood/Miller and published in a limited hard cover edition. That is all it deserved. Expecting to sell thousands of copies in a mass market edition I books are distributed by William Collins in Australia.

With the release of the movie DUNE, the inevitable flood of associated material in the way of books and calendars have made their appearance. THE DUNE STORY-BOOK adapted by Joan D. Vinge from the screenplay by David Lynch, is published by SPHERE in paperback. It is illustrated with colour still from the movie. FEVRE DREAM by George R.R.Martin is a most unusual vampire story set mainly on a Mississippi riverboat. EYE OF CAT by Roger Zelazny is a typical Zelazny tale that will appeal to his many fans, featuring an old Navajo Indian tracker and his telepathic shapeshifting companion, Cat. ORION SHALL RISE by Poul Anderson is a combination of adventure and politics set on an Earth devastated by nuclear war. \$6.95 ARRP. LOST DORSAI by Gordon R.Dickson is a further episode in the Dorsai saga. \$5.95 ARRP. Sphere are

also continuing their range of titles in the 'Conan' series with CONAN AND THE SPIDER GOD by L.Sprague de Camp. \$4.95 ARP. Sphere books are distributed by William Collins.

One of METHUEN paperback's most popular authors has been Ben Bova and they have issued two new editions of THE WINDS OF ALTAIR and TEST OF FIRE. \$5.95 ARRP each. Bova has a unique style of science fiction adventure with strong elements of realism and these two are typical of his writing. MERCHANTER'S LUCK by C.J. Cherryh is set in the 'Downbelow Station' universe and continues Methuen's range of this Hugo winning author's books. THE ZEN GUN by Barrington J. Bayley is another very original novel from this author. SPECIAL DELIVERANCE by Clifford Simak is another good story from the old master, about a strange game on an even stranger planet. All of these paperbacks were sent to us by Associated Book Publishers in Britain and are, or will be distributed by Hodder & Stoughton in Australia. ABP also have sent us a new hard cover volume, NATFACT 7 by John Tully, which is a political thriller set in a near future. This title will be available from Methuen Australia.

J.M. DENT have published TOP SCIENCE FICTION, compiled and edited by Josh Pachter, which is a collection of sf stories chosen by the authors as their favourite or best story. One or two of the stories by major authors are well known, but most are titles that have not been done to death in other anthologies. J.M. Dent Pty Ltd Australia \$24.95 ARRP. Dent also distribute THE AURUM FILM ENCYCLOPEDIA Volume 2: SCIENCE FICTION by Phil Hardy, which at \$45.00 ARRP, is an excellent illustrated survey of the f§sf film field.

ALLEN & UNWIN have published a new edition of J.R.R.Tolkien's THE HOBBIT, with illustrations by Michael Hague. The illustrations are numerous and in their style reminiscent of the illustrators of years ago, such as Arthur Rackham, compliment the story very well. HC ARRP \$24.95. URSULA BLOOM, died October 29th 1984. She was best know as a romance author, but wrote two fantasy novels: THE JUDGE OF JERUSALEM (1926) and DAUGHTER OF THE DEVIL (1963), under the name of Lozania Prole.

FRANCOIS TRUFFAUT, the leading French film maker and critic, died October 21st 1984. He directed the film FAHRENHEIT 451, and appeared as a scientist in CLOSE ENCOUNTERS OF THE THIRD KIND. Some of his best known French films included THE 400 BLOWS, SHOOT THE PIANO PLAYER and JULES AND JIM.

OSKAR WERNER, the Austrian born actor, was one of the stars of Truffaut's films, FAHRENHEIT 451 and JULES AND JIM. He died of a heart attack on October 23rd last year.

Congratulations as usual on a fine SF News, especially the thoughful obit. for Bertram Chandler. What should also be mentioned was his hard work on behalf of writers in Australia, both for the Australian Society of Authors and International P.E.N. He was a loyal supporter of both and in spite of the demands on his time, wrote many valuable articles for his peers. The Australian literary community is the poorer for his passing. We'll all miss his cheerful presence at our get-togethers.

You asked for news of writing credits - I imagine you've noticed my article "Star Trek Jokes" in Best of Trek 7. I also have a short story, "Get out the Garamond (about the Second Coming) in an anthology, A Ream of Writers, published by the Society of Women Writers Australia.

Despite being almost a fulltime romance novelist these days, I still retain my enthusiasm for Star Trek and on a visit to my London publishers recently, caught the new ST movie. Susan Sackett tells me ST 111 made \$64 million in the first five weeks in the USA and they're lining up Star Trek 1V which means she and Gene Roddenberry will continue to be based at Paramount for the next couple of years at least - a prospect she's enthusiastic about it's sort of second home to her now. Gene was flying into England to speak at a Con in Newcastle-on-Tyne on August 24, just after I left so our paths didn't cross but he should have enjoyed a warm reception since reviews of ST 111 were universally favourable and the series is being re-run over there.

Finally, you speculated that the Australian SF movies, ALIEN HUNTER, which I scripted, might have run into problems. The only one I know about is the perennial one - money. The \$6 million budget is available from merchant banking sources but its release depends on an upfront distribution deal which is still being negotiated. Did you know that Superman 1 was in pre-production before Star Wars but took so long to develop that it came out afterwards and was dubbed an also-ran we know just how they felt! Hope all or some of this is useful to you Merv. I was thinking kindly of you as I browsed around the shelves of Forbidden Planets 1 and 2 - I still prefer Space Age for atmosphere. 
