I learned of the mysterious convergence called Dragon*Con from my stellar Huntsville friends, and I grew

intrigued. With my boyfriend footing the bill, and driving my car because he fears my awesome highway savvy, we set off for Atlanta. 5 hours later we escaped the Calhoun/Acworth timewarp and found our hotel already teeming with creatures with black tee exoskeletons. Maybe they heard black was slimming. *shrug* Our prepaid badges were drawn by the dude who drew Dragon's Lair TV series, and some of his cells were auctioned to benefit a Huntington's research foundation.

Art show was very interesting to me, especially seeing professionals and amateurs hung intermittently. Keegan is young man, and the girl with him must've been his model for the prints for sale. Gould had one icy work for sale, the rest went to the charity auction. While the anti-camera police were absent, I did not photograph any of the pieces (because Randy would decapitate me.) An interesting side trip was the African Influences art show, displayed in the Mariott's atrium. Jessica Hume, very complex artist with neon eyeball puzzles. Two thumbs up, John and Leana. The art show had a lot of mostly nude Hustler girl type illustrations, and if you've seen one dragon... Still, the works bested anything I could've done. Why can't Con artisans make jewelry without pentagrams and yin/yang symbols?

I pursued the Writing program track and envied while John chased Babylon 5 celebrities (very politely.) During Peter David's 90 minute program, The Harlan Ellison touched me, didn't spit on me and gave me a fan's self-published Huntsville anthology that he didn't want! I own a free copy of Southern Fried Sci-Fi and Jambalaya Genres. Harlan Ellison wears Nike. Harlan Ellison stands barely taller than me, so he's 5'6" or 7" with big disguising horn-rimmed glasses. Harlan learned from his buddy Peter David that his room, this year, was David's honeymoon suite. Harlan "made noises like a baby raptor, and the next morning told me he'd slept on the suite's couch." Peter David polished his glasses, then said, "I said, 'Ooooh, Harlan, the couch...the couch was a mistake." Peter David was hilarious and kept rubbing his Green Lantern T-shirt emblem with abandon. He defended his stint as Aquaman comic writer ("I didn't design the whole gladiator suit shit, don't look here!") and the Thing's psychological stories.

Robert Asprin will release a new, non-funny murder mystery series next year (set in his new hometown, the French Quarter,) and his next Fool novel is also finished. His talk was about overcoming a six year writer's block stemming from his father's stroke, the publisher refusing two non-funny novels, and marriage #2 breakdown. He retold the convention tale, where the entire Star Trek bridge crew appeared together for the first time. The necessary security for 17,000 fans meant assigning guards on the celebrities' elevator doors. President Ford was scheduled to stay at the hotel. When secret servicemen got off the elevator on the celebrities' floor, two big Klingons stopped them and demanded badges. The fuzz flipped open their badges, and the Klingons said, "Wrong badge. Back on the elevator!" President Ford slept in a different hotel.

His 'how I overcame rejection notices' story involved an earlier con. He wrote a story, what if a spaceship snatched all the greatest sci-fi and fantasy writers from a luxury cruise ship in the Bermuda Triangle? Ben Bova rejected it, saying it was too insular for general release. So for his next con, Asprin reworked the story and turned it into a slide show presentation, as though he were the alien captain reporting to his superiors. Fans roared with laughter, con after con. His work was nominated for a Hugo that year. Rejected, a Hugo.

I attended a writers' panel called i Pub, e Pub, we Pub. Kiernan was very informative. Nothing replaces hard copy publication, and not all e-zines are the same. The best process: write, edit, let three people who don't love you read, submit to reputable e-zine for some (if any) quick editorial comments/advice, rework, then submit to hard copy press. Also a website: www.writershood.com/htms/scifi/htm (with contests.)

Anime programming was tucked away in a 24/7 video room, no guest speakers, so I chose to wait for AWA (in two weeks!) Xena programming had lots of very independent women attendees and a studio Xena double. The dude who played Jockser signed autographs.

The Drum Circle performed all three nights, and the bagpipe dude. *Changelings* sounded OK for a declared Goth band, from outside the room. John & I danced at the 80's Wave con party; he confirms every other person's opinion that I'm rhythmically ass-backwards. But my bodystocking costume was cute.

The costumes were my favorite! Such talent on display! The hall costume list includes, not in order of opinion or preference: Sith Vixen, Star Wars everything, Exorcist priest with girl in white dress hovering (on a pole) above his head, VooDoo doctor in long tails, Gene Simmons, Jedis out the yin/yang, Gothic dark angels *yawn* and Sailor Moon, PowerPuff Girls with the Professor (Bubbles had a pole through her sleeves to operate the marionettes.) fire imp, a unicorn whose soft fuzzy ears I wanted to pet, the Mystery Men, X-men and other mutants from the comic series, role-playing cats, Johnny Depp from Fear & Loathing in Law Vegas, two Dr. Whos and a Dalek, Harlequin, a young girl whose costume was scotch tape painted in strategic areas with black marker, Tank Girl, tons of cross-dressing men, men in official kilts, men in Egyptian linen, vampires, bikini-toting barbarian woman, knight & his lady, and a most excellent Atlanta-based reenactment group in pristine, shiny Roman garb. The escalators exploded with madness.

John did excellent 'body guard' service for my naughty school girl outfit. *sad* Only two people ever took my picture; John's my boyfriend, so his shutterbug fancy was required. My costumes stank like used tissue. My leather mini skirt with white ruffled shirt didn't even get noticed. But next year..!

The dealer's room smelled bad and was my nose against the guy-preceding-me's spine, so I didn't visit too often. Several booths distributed flyers with their web address; they won't do cons anymore since rent's outrageous. The dealer's Exhibition room had games, dolls and expensive new toys. *yawn*

Alice Cooper canceled his autograph session once he received his award; he now carries a heavy negative karma load.

John & I caught two performances by the Atlanta Radio Theatre company. Entertaining, but hard to keep over 1K folks quiet. John Reyes-Davies (Sulla from Indiana Jones, professor on Sliders, dwarf in Tolkien movie) read his part well; such a beautiful voice. His panel was also very enjoyable. He reported the studio was considering another Indiana Jones movie, without Harrison Ford. After the boos lessened, he added, "I only hope they don't decide to get a new Sulla." He stepped carefully answering movie questions; he said playing a dwarf meant lots of lonely days against a blue screen, no camaraderie. His makeup took 3.5-5 hours every day. He never got into specifics, although he warned us repeatedly that not

everything in a book films well. Now you are warned, too.

John & I took our own snacks; I never want to see peanut butter again. Whenever I asked a question the answer was, "Because it's Dragon*Con."

John said Babylon 5 security chief Garibaldi had a high "f-word" count during his panel, but the topics were funny and entertaining. The actor's father was a policeman, so he drew from his childhood when creating Garibaldi. John really wanted a photo with him. The hotel was serving dinner, however, so John withdrew. I have a considerate man. The Babylon Five party spontaneously combusted, so we missed it. John had an entire Acme Weapons persona ready to go, too.

Scotty, from Star Trek, appeared at this con. John said James Doohan told fans he'd suffered two strokes. He wouldn't appear in any more movies because he couldn't memorize lines or read a teleprompter. He reminisced about participating in a ground-breaking television show, what pleasure it gave him to see what imagination the show launched in viewers.

This year's masquerade passed with military precision. (Other than the nursing Renaissance reenacting Mom who sat right beside me. Imagine the following events with a slurp-slurp soundtrack. Try.) The C3PO actor is a skinny British flamer, waaaay out, and a giant ham. He MCed the contest, and he autographed T-shirts by making men don them & bend over. "Thinking of you, yum!" was one signature.

The little children performed first, and I wanted the self-choreographed 7yr old dancing pirate skeleton with cutlass to beat Queen Amadama. No one ever listens to me. Had a kid knight, witch, primrose fairy and Anakin, too. Then the children left...

- 3) An male of advanced years covered his nudity with a battery-powered, glow-in-the-dark swiveling-dragon-head strap-on. C3PO cut the lights, and the contestant danced, danced, jiggled, swiveled, thrust and pirouetted.

John's fencing as historical self-defense group, Swordplay Alliance (swordplayalliance.com) performed Monday morning. They had a mini tournament (full contact strikes) and answered questions. John stabbed one opponent trying to repair his handguard. "That's how you win a bar fight," John told an appreciative audience. (Trivia time: did you know that women had to fight their own duels?) Gotta call Aunt Aliene, tell and swear her to secrecy. Whooohooo.


