
Further nominations can be made from the floor.

REVIEWS OF RECENT PAPERBACKS

THE OLD MEN AT THE ZOO by Angus Wilson, Panther 1979, £1.50, 345 pages. Reviewed by Chris Morgan.

While only marginally classifiable as SF, because it is set against the background of Britain involved in a European war of the 1970s, this is a splendid novel about the fortunes and eccentricities of the staff of the London Zoo. It is narrated by Simon Carter, the only professional administrator among a host of animal specialists who are every bit as odd as the animals themselves. Carter is the only senior man at the zoo under the age of forty. He despises his elderly colleagues yet is conceited and priggish himself --- a bit of an old woman. Inside the zoo there is tragedy, much manoeuvring for personal prestige, and attempts are made to alter the zoo's public image. Outside the zoo there are political confrontations and international disagreements, leading to war and the bombing of London -- which means the bombing of the zoo as well. This is an extremely entertaining book, witty and full of incident. It's a good read, even though the SF content is minute.

SPACEHOUNDS OF I.P.C. by B.E. "Doc "Smith, Panther 1979, 85 pence, 223 pages. Reviewed by Pauline E. Morgan.

The spaceliner Arcturus, on a regular flight to Mars, is attacked, cut into little pieces and towed away by Jovians. This is the story of how a man and a woman, trapped in one of those pieces, escape and build a radio transmitter from stone axes and bits of flint to tell their friends back home where they are, without once going to bed together. This tale originally appeared in Amazing Stories in 1931, which explains why the details of physics and planetary conditions are so wrong (and why there's no sex). Despite the various inaccuracies and impessibilities I found myself enjoying this. It's very fast moving, possibly "Doc"Smith's best book.

EARTH CULT by Trevor Hoyle, Panther 1979, 95 pence, 189 pages.

Frank Kersh, a science writer on a routine assignment, becomes involved with a series of Earth-shattering events. A research station at the bottom of a mile-deep mine shaft under a mountain, where the Sun's emission particles are being measured, becomes the focus of these events. The first two parts of the book are spoiled by an excess of technical data which will have meaning only to regular readers of New Scientist. The story, like the mountain, falls apart in the closing stages. Not very convincing.

These ten stories have been specially written for the volume by Irish authors. All are either set in Ireland or have very close links with the country. They have been carefully chosen to contrast markedly with each other, varying from "Brock" where a faithful sheepdog carries on with its job after death, to a vengeful ghost in "The Captain of the Pipes", to "Gaelgeist", which features a composite spirit of all that is foul in Irish history.
