Review

THE ISIS PEDLAR by Monica Hughes Published by Magnet Books price £1.25. 121 pages.

Anyone need an SF based book as a present for an older child? The 'Isis' books by Monica Hughes would certainly fill the bill. This latest in the series matches up to the earlier two, with striking characterisation. Indeed the anti-hero Michael Flynn is particularly obnoxious. Selfish, uncaring and greedy, he takes advantage of the naive hard-working colonists to further his get-rich-quick schemes - preferably with no exertion on his part. His daughter Moira tries to keep him in check, but, in his greed, he is willing to sacrifice her to his ambition. David N'Kumo is the only inhabitant of Isis to mistrust the stranger, and with the help of the Robot Guardian of the planet, reveals the imposter Flynn in his true colours.

Fast paced and exciting, the story can be read on its own, but also ties in neatly and naturally with the previous books -KEEPER OF THE ISIS LIGHT and GUARDIAN OF ISIS.


BRMB WALKATHON
