NEWS IN BRIEF...

After 18 years or so of NOT volunteering for things, it was obvious I'd learned my lesson, I was cured, I could live a normal life - or so I thought. Then, horror of horrors, at the AGM this year I found myself volunteering to edit the BSFG's Newsletter. A slight relapse the doctor called it. Hmmph! Fat lot he knows. If it was only a 'slight relapse', how come I came away from Eastercon finding myself on the committee for the 2003 Eastercon??? Yes, dear friends, it is so. The disease has kicked back in and I can only look forward to the next two years of pain and anxiety The British SF Award was presented at Paragon (2001 Eastercon) and the Best Novel category was won by ASH: A SECRET HISTORY by Mary Gentle (Gollancz pbk / 1112pgs! / £9.99). Best short story was won by "The Suspect Genome" (the final Greg Mandel story) by Peter Hamilton (from INTERZONE #156) and the winner of Best Artwork went to Dominic Harman for his "Hideaway" cover for INTERZONE #157. Congratulations to The hardcover everyone SF Masterworks mentioned here last month will be published at the wonderfully low price of £9.99! Though DAY OF THE TRIFFIDS, for some reason, has slipped pub-date - it's now coming out in August. not May And other cheap hardcovers coming out will be various H G Wells books (about 40, I believe) at £7.99 each!!! All the SF will be included in the matching series as well as his one and only fantasy. THE SEA LADY, which has never had a paperback edition in the US or the UK! Many fans I've spoken to had never even heard of this title. I remember reading a

copy from Birmingham Public Libraries shortly after I'd started reading SF - way back in 1958. I've only seen one copy since then which I immediately bought for my own collection. These hardcovers will be issued by new print-on-demand publisher HOUSE OF STRATUS That piece of information came to light when I contacted STRATUS re some Brian Aldiss titles I noticed listed on a major distributors' database. I discovered that they have published no less than 34 titles by our Honorary President - as far as I could make out, everything that is currently out of print elsewhere. From the ones I've seen, they make a very attractive matching set - all in B-format at £6.99 each except BURY MY HEART AT W H SMITH's (extended version, previously only available in the expensive de luxe limited edition) and TRILLION YEAR SPREE - his history of SF written with David Wingrove, which are both C-format at £7.99 and £9.99. So now is the time to fill in those gaps in your Aldiss collection - and can I heartily recommend THE BRIGHTFOUNT DIARIES? This often overlooked masterpiece is the collected articles/stories from THE BOOKSELLER about Brian's time working in a bookshop, and it's amazing how little has changed (in some ways) in nearly 50 years - particularly the 'types' of customer and would-be shoplifters! Find out a little of what it's like to work in a bookshop. Brian's observations on customers is uncanny - I recognised every one of them! They, or their offspring, still come into ANDROMEDA Our other Honorary President, Harry Harrison, has a new book coming out in June in the US called 50 IN 50. It's 50 short stories one for each of 50 years - a collection and celebration of Harry's illustrious career. A must for every Brum Group member! Our very own Pauline Morgan (who writes as 'Pauline Dungate') has a new short story in a new anthology from DAW books called VILLAINS VICTORIOUS edited by Martin H Greenberg and John Helfers. All stories feature villains who win China

THE SECRET OF LIFE by Paul McAuley Voyager / 391pgs / £16.99 / hcvr

Some authors will bludgeon the reader over the head with their superior knowledge, either because they have done a lot of research and don't want to waste any of it, or because it relates to their previous job. Paul McAuley is able to draw on his knowledge and paint a picture in deft strokes, as if he is gently letting you into a secret.

There are several related problems that form the main thrust of the novel. There is the search for life on Mars. The Chinese claim that they haven't discovered anything there, but are very secretive about their explorations. Then there are the slicks that have appeared in the Pacific Ocean that are killing marine life - although no-one will admit it. NASA intends to mount an expedition to discover what the Chinese have discovered, but their choice of personnel is influenced by money, in particular that provided by the Cytex organisation which is continuously looking for the profit margin in all of it.

Mariella Anders is a microbiologist whose work is highly acclaimed. However, she doesn't like the idea of selling her soul to a big corporation. She is altruistic, believing that knowledge should be shared, not parcelled out to the highest bidder. She is delighted to win a place on the next flight to Mars - but not by who she has to travel with.

This book is delightful to read, and thought provoking at the same time.

SERVANT OF THE DRAGON by David Drake Millennium / 612pgs / £6.99 / pbk Reviewed by Chris Chivers Rating * * * *

This third volume of the Lord of the Isles wraps up the story of Garric, Sharina, Ilna and the sorceress Tenoctris. Garric, now the power behind the throne and the real ruler of the Isles, faces his greatest challenge from the dark forces that sank the Isle of Yole. Woven into this background is the task of rebuilding a government and dealing with the shallow and vain characters from Barca's Hamlet who now seek to ride on Garric's rise to power. Add to this the court intrigues and other hangers on, and Garric has his work cut out. He has to rely on his old friends Sharina, Cashel, Ilna and Tenoctris to help him understand the dark forces that are gathering.

The appearance of a shimmering blue bridge across the river, on the site of an old kingdom bridge that had been destroyed many centuries earlier, is the start of the long drawn-out battle between the forces of Garric's kingdom and the wizards that have moved through time from the demise of the old kingdom. When Sharina is pulled through into another dimension she starts her long quest that will have surprising results for her friends. She does not realise that Cashel has also gone after her with a view to her rescue. The independent

journeys that both of them make add to the forces that Garric will have to call on to defeat the dark wizards that are arrayed against him.

This book keeps the pace going that Drake set in the previous volumes. The convoluted plot line has been somewhat straightened out and the main characters have lost a little of their colour. David Drake has produced three books that provide an entertaining fantasy story with plenty of twists and turns that will keep the reader happy for many hours.

PRIESTESS OF AVALON by Marion Zimmer Bradley and Diana L. Paxson

This volume was published after Bradley's death, with the aid of Diana Paxson. It is a collaboration, although Paxson had to finish it. It is a pity she does not get a credit on the book's cover. This book is part of the Avalon series of which THE MISTS OF AVALON was the first published volume. That involved the women associated with King Arthur's court. PRIESTESS OF AVALON is set at an earlier time, during the Roman Empire. The principal character is Helena who was the mother of the Emperor, Constantine the Great. Like many women of the time, relatively little is known about her, but she was canonised and some sources credit her with the discovery of fragments of the True Cross. It is certain that she travelled to the Holy Land and lived to an old age. In PRIESTESS OF AVALON, Helena is one of the priestesses that lives on the mystic Isle of Avalon until she meets Constantius. Except for this element, historical facts are kept to wherever possible.

This is a relatively short book to encompass the whole of a long life and

perforce touches it only at intervals. More than a quarter of the book is taken up with Helena's life on Avalon, before she leaves with Constantius, so that their relationship and characters, and the intricacies behind the events that follow are only sketched in. The book disappoints because it is neither a fantasy novel or a historical one, but tries to be both and they do not mesh - it is almost two separate stories as very little of the mysticism bleeds into the known history. It will probably satisfy neither readers of fantasy or historical fiction. *PM*
