SFF Writers Sign International Petition Against War On Iraq

Writers from around the world have signed their names to a petition against a US war on Iraq. Signers of the petition include science fiction and fantasy authors Ellen Datlow, Karen Joy Fowler, Lisa Goldstein, John Kessel, Kelly Link, and Michael Moorcock.

"Science Fiction writers have a special interest in the future and the US policy on Iraq is putting our future at risk. It's no wonder that so many fine writers in the genre are coming out in opposition to Bush and his war," said Douglas Lain, the Portland man who co-wrote the petition via email with New Zealand author Tim Jones.

"We are calling for a diplomatic solution. The United States should allow the return of UN weapons inspectors without a resolution on the use of force, and then the UN should lift the sanctions which have caused so much misery in Iraq," Tim Jones explained.

The petition states that writers and artists have a special responsibility to combat deceit and distortion, and suggests that the public is not being told the truth about the heavy civilian and military casualties a conflict with Iraq would cause.

THE GLASS MOUNTAIN

Having helped to defeat the evil Zahn Sarl, Annat has returned to her schooling. As she grows into a young woman, she begins to understand some of the more personal aspects of the Shamen. When a disturbing letter is

received from her brother, Malchik, Annat and her aunt Yuste travel to his university to make sure he is OK. When they arrive they find nothing but an empty room.

Meeting up again with Cluny Sorel d'Ademar they enlist the help of a detective to discover what has happened to Annat's brother. Soon they find that there is a much more malign reason for Malchik's disappearance than first suspected. Annat, her aunt, father and friends must again battle with the once dead Zahn Sarl to save Malchik and prevent Sarl from becoming all-powerful.

GLASS MOUNTAIN is the sequel to the novel CHILDREN OF THE SHAMAN and it picks up quite smoothly where the first book left off.

Annat, Yuda and Yuste are again pitted against the evil Zahn Sarl who has returned from the dead. Now, this 'resurrection' could have been done in a predictable manner but in THE GLASS MOUNTAIN the reanimation of Zahn Sarl is carried off in a slick, convincing manner.

At the start of the story we enter the world of Annat, back at school and trying not to be expelled. As introduced in the first book, Shamen are, to a great extent, bisexual and there is a well written section concerning Annat's first experiencing the nature of her sexuality and her confusion regarding her true feelings.

Yet again this is a well-written and fluid fantasy story that grips the reader until the very end. The characters and their relationships have developed over the intervening time and we learn more about the early lives of Yuda and Yuste.

A wonderful sequel and, hopefully, there will be more to come.

THE STRAW MEN

This is a little bit different from Michael Marshall (Smith)'s previous works, which I'd imagine is why he's dropped the Smith from the author name so we know this is a new move in his career. And in this novel the author has moved away from his SF/Fantasy roots and produced a dark crime thriller.

There are many strands to this book. The story opens in Palmerston on a Wednesday lunchtime in 1991. Two men enter a McDonald's restaurant and open fire killing many of the diners and staff. At the end of their killing frenzy the elder of the two killers shoots the younger and uses his blood to write 'The Straw Men' on the restaurant wall. We then move forward 11 years and the narrative picks up at the funeral of ex-CIA agent Ward Hopkins' parents, killed in a car crash. Following the funeral Ward discovers a note from his parents inside a book hidden in the cushions of his father's chair, a note telling him they are not dead. This prompts him to search their house, leading him to discover a single video cassette showing scenes from his parents lives including what appears to be a mysterious sibling of his. When he analyses this video cassette he hears the

same phrase 'The Straw Men' and so he starts trying to uncover the truth.

Meanwhile in Santa Monica. California a 14 year old girl called Sarah Becker is kidnapped from a busy shopping Promenade without anyone noticing who took her. The FBI detective investigating the case. approaches an ex-colleague named John Zandt who worked on previous cases of kidnap without matching methods to help her track the girl down in time to save her. In doing so she is taking a big risk as Zandy burned out on the case when his own daughter was kidnapped.

This is a little bit of a convoluted novel as it involves the gradual bringing together of three seemingly unconnected storylines. Added to this is the fact that the Ward Hopkins section of the tale is told in the first person from Ward's point of view, whilst the other sections are in third person, with the frequent changes coming across as forced and a little off-putting at times. I was reading this initially late at night, and had to re-read a couple of chapters as my sleep-deprived brain did not make total sense of it upon first reading.

That said there is a lot to be said for this book. Michael Marshall's prose style is very sharp with many witty quips along the way, with the best of these reserved for Ward Hopkins' inner commentary. But I found that these asides seemed at times a little out of place in the context of a story about serial killers. That however is a purely personal taste so you shouldn't let that put you off.

His characters are realistic. With just the minimum of description these people come alive, reminding you of people you know; they have definite presence in the novel. The darker more violent moments are handled well, without the need to resort to extremes of gore. The suspense is maintained well throughout, building you up towards the story's resolution. This is a tale that would probably transfer well to the big screen, although it might be difficult to fit all of the various strands in and still make the picture in under three hours.

It was a reasonably enjoyable read, although to my taste, of a lesser standard than his SE work. But that could be because I am an SF fan above all else and part of me is disappointed that this might mean the author will produce less SF in the Unfortunately. this seems to he becoming a trend. SM
