Committee posts that you can stand for are:-

<u>Chairman</u> - needs to be a strong personality to keep the committee meetings in order; has to introduce guest speakers at each meeting, so should be articulate; has to make sure that other members of the committee do the jobs asked of them and if they fail to do so, ask (with the rest of the committee's approval), for their resignation and appoint a new person to that post.

<u>Secretary</u> - needs to be able to take the minutes of all committee meetings and type up in a presentable manner, sending copies to all other committee members; write to guest speakers as required.

<u>Treasurer</u> - needs to be good with figures; be at every meeting to take entrance fees; keep check on all members whose membership lapses and write to them asking to renew; organise the monthly raffles and produce the annual accounts.

Newsletter Editor - has to produce a newsletter every month (without fail!). Including the preparation of masters, printing, distribution, etc. Ideally should have access to a computer, be able to spell (or know how and when to use a Spell Checker); be able to find and correlate any pieces of news; distribute review books and obtain reviews of those books for insertion in the newsletter.

Ordinary Committee Members - two required. These members have no <u>specific</u> duties but are there to help out when necessary. One of the members will be responsible for the Group's website so needs to have Internet access and a working knowledge of either HTML, a site design / management program, or both. Some skill with computer graphics and a reference to details of future guests would be an advantage.

Novacon Chairman - this final committee post is NOT one elected at the AGM. This post is approved by the 'current' committee each year for the following year's Novacon. This year Martin Tudor has volunteered to chair NOVACON 33 to be held in November 2003. The committee have already approved this post.

(Note: Anyone wishing to chair NOVACON 34 in two year's time should approach the committee before September 2003).

<u>In addition</u> - <u>all</u> committee members undertake to do the jobs they've volunteered for; be able to attend committee meetings throughout the year; to assist in ideas for programme and be willing to ensure that the Group runs smoothly and profitably throughout the year.

This may be only a hobby without any remuneration but by volunteering YOU are responsible to the whole membership. Failure to do the job you've volunteered for is letting down every single member of the Group. So unless you're committed to doing the job properly, please don't stand for election.

Anyone wishing to stand for election to any of the above posts should get a Group member to propose them and a another member to second that proposal. This may be done at the AGM itself.

It's Auction Time....

The formal part of the AGM will be followed (time allowing) by an AUCTION. So bring along any old books, magazines videos, cards, artwork, records (anything from shellac through to CDs!) etc., that you no longer require. SF/fantasy/horror items are preferred but if you've got any other items that you think we can have fun with, raise a few smiles (and, lawdy, we all need a few more of those!) and more importantly, raise some money for the Group funds.

REDEMPTION ARK by Alastair Reynolds

I have already written enthusiastically in these pages about Reynolds' two previous books REVELATION SPACE and CHASM CITY. This new novel is a direct sequel to the former.

One of the themes of REVELATION SPACE was the destruction some nine hundred thousand years previously of an advanced technological civilisation by a mysterious force from outside. Now in REDEMPTION ARK the same force is emerging again, this time with the apparent object of destroying humanity. It transpires that this mysterious agency — which becomes known to us as the Inhibitors — has been around since the dawn of time, ruthlessly eliminating any emergent intelligence before it becomes able to start colonising the Galaxy. Paradoxical though it may seem, the object of this programme is actually to ensure the indefinite continuation of intelligent life, three billion years into the future and beyond.

This is not made clear until close to the end of the book; meanwhile humans try to fight back and, once having discovered the threat, try either to protect themselves from, or escape altogether, the fate which the Inhibitors have in store for them. Unfortunately, rival human factions are already at war with each other and there is conflict about who is to do the protecting and who the escaping. One of the major factions in this conflict is carried over from the previous book, while others are developed from earlier work published in INTERZONE and elsewhere. In particular, this involves the Conjoiners, a group who use neural implants to meld themselves together into a single group mind and some of whom

are quite prepared to follow an agenda which excludes the rest of humanity. I feel that the author and his publisher owe us yet another book collecting and/or developing that previous work to flesh out the history of his universe.

Superbly written and full of invention, this is yet another great book by an important author. Interestingly, however, it ends with important issues unresolved – the Inhibitors have not been stopped and are still out there and, so possibly are the Conjoiners. There is room in Reynolds' universe for lots more books and I hope they will all be as good as this one.

PHASE SPACE by Stephen Baxter

In 2001 Stephen Baxter completed his *Manifold* series, a collection of linked novels exploring some of the advanced scientific ideas he described in his non-fiction book DEEP FUTURE. Between 1997 and 2001 he had also published a number of short stories and these are collected here.

The phase space of the title refers to the space containing all the conceivable states of the Universe and one of the stories, featuring characters from the *Manifold* novels, describes how a failed experiment opens the Earth to Phase Space. Within this space we find included stories based on alternate histories – stories of what might have happened if this or that had gone wrong with the Apollo Programme for example – and stories linked in some degree to the *Manifold* novels, although not necessarily part of them.

As befits their previous independent publication, each story is able to stand alone, although they are now linked within a very loose framework based on the failed experiment story I have just mentioned which opens the Earth to the myriad possibilities of the Manifold where anything that can happen, will. Each is a gem in its own right, superbly crafted and polished. There are strange ideas aplenty here, emotion, pathos and flashes of a rare beauty which makes one want to reach out and touch the Universe, to be a part of it.

Like most of this author's work it deserves not to be missed.

FIRING THE CATHEDRAL by Michael Moorcock

This is not the easiest book to read. It is told in very short chapters in an almost stochastic fashion with random seeming events drawing the familiar entourage of Jerry Cornelius stories together.

Jerry Cornelius has been brought up to date somewhat and now fits a little easier into the world of the 21st Century. He is still a Jesuit priest, now Monsignor Cornelius and just appointed by the secretary of the U.N. to be the first Catholic governer of Kashmir. He is still a sexual creature, that aspect of his character not suppressed for these AIDS-ridden times, but he is now portrayed as a more sober sombre-looking man. He wears a sensible business suit and has a short cut hairstyle.

The world he inhabits is a sarcastic, anarchic version of ours, with events and trends taken to extremes. London has grown ever larger and extends as far south as the Sussex coast, Scotland is now a rogue state, and the United States seems to have imploded, fracturing into a myriad group of warring factions. Indeed, war and violence seems very much to be the entire backdrop to this novella. There are many military characters popping up throughout - Major Nye, General 'Wrong-Way' Lindbergh, Captain 'Four-Eyes' Ewell and Captain Heemish 'Flash' Gordon - as well as the plot visiting many places associated with violence and war in recent years, from the WTC Memorial Hall, through Burundi to Kashmir. There are references to various ethnic groups and their clashes, and each chapter is preceded by quotations from the Economist, the all Street Journal, various other sources referring to the Arab-Israeli conflict as well as the September 11th terrorist attacks.

This is by no means a straightforward story. The plot seems to proceed at random with linked vignettes setting moods and establishing ideas rather than continuing the narrative flow. To long time Michael Moorcock fans and readers of the previous Jerry Cornelius stories this is not likely to cause problems - there are mough familiar references and characters included here to make you feel at home. We meet Una Persson, Bishop Beesley, Mo Collier (who in a wonderful aside reflects on how he hates to buy dope from the clergy), and Trixie Brunner, daughter of the Baroness, amongst an enormous cast of supporting characters for so short a work.

But is this a book that would serve to introduce new readers to the world of Jerry Cornelius and the wider worlds of Michael Moorcock? Probably not. There's simply too much that needs to be known to get full value out of this. It's a book that will almost certainly appeal to anyone who's read and enjoyed the Cornelius Quartet but if you haven't read them, start there first - then you'll be in a position to get the most form this book.
