Unfortunately, the first pieces of news to come in during December were bad ones. The science fiction world lost two of it's very popular members... The following piece appeared on the net on Friday 9th December...

ROBERT SHECKLEY 1928-2005

SF writer Robert Sheckley died 9th December in Poughkeepsie, New York, at the age of 77. One of the field's great humorists, Sheckley was a prolific short story writer beginning in 1952 with titles including "Specialist", "Pilgrimage to Earth", "Warm", "The Prize of Peril", and "Seventh Victim", collected in volumes from UNTOUCHED BY HUMAN HANDS (1954) to IS THAT WHAT PEOPLE DO? (1984) and a five-volume set of COLLECTED STORIES (1991). His first novel, IMMORTALITY, INC. (1958), was followed by THE STATUS CIVILIZATION (1960), JOURNEY BEYOND TOMORROW (1962), MINDSWAP (1966), and several others. Sheckley served as fiction editor for Omni magazine from January 1980 through September 1981. In 2001, he was named Author Emeritus by the SFWA. He was awarded the Jupiter Award for "A Suppliant in Space" in 1974 and the Gallun Award in 1991. Sheckley was hospitalized earlier this year in Ukraine, then recovered sufficiently to return to the US, though he was unable to attend the World SF Convention in Glasgow where he'd been scheduled to be Guest of Honour.

H KENNETH BULMER 1921-2005

Another man down. I just recently got an email from Mark Plummer forwarding a note from Erik Arthur, relaying the news that Ken Bulmer is dead.

Hardly surprising, as he's been in a nursing home for several years, and there never was any chance he'd be back on his feet, but its still a bad thing anyway. HKB was definitely a Right Guy, as a fan and a writer; not the greatest SF writer on the planet as he'd be the first to have said himself, but he did produce some work of genuine charm that was actually memorable, which is damned sight more than can be said of very many other authors.

He was a fan too, back in the days when it was a Proud and Lonely Thing, with a small but entertaining and readable bundle of fanwriting and fanzines to

his name, even unto including a real issue of NIRVANA in 1949, a fanzine that had become the stuff of legend even before a stencil was cut. He never did much fanwriting after the 1950s, but he did from time to time show up in such as ZENITH/SPECULATION, where he often had something to say that was quite outside what might have been expected from a self-confessed hack-writer. He may have written to order and by the length, but he actually knew a lot about what makes fiction work.

I'm slightly surprised, thinking about him now, about how much of his stuff sticks in my mind, especially from my earlier days of SF reading. Some of it just 'memorable' because it was new to me - like the space war stories in NEW WORLDS of the early Sixties, but there's also really good stuff that's worth going back to - some fine little pieces in SCIENCE FANTASY, for example, including a real favourite in the map country (S-F February 1961). Also in the frame for me is THE DEMONS, one of the first SF novels I ever read, way back in about 1965, which is memorable for more than just the bizarrely rodent-like photo of Ken on the back cover of the Compact edition.

And then there's the almost forgotten (except by me and Rog Peyton) short novel THE GOLDEN AGE, published under the pseudonym 'Rupert Clinton' in NEW WORLDS in 1961 - a really effective alternate worlds story that certainly deserved the book publication it never ever got.

It's a real shame that Ken sort of became the forgotten man of British SF and fandom - he really was a good all-rounder - not fantastically brilliant at any or everything, but a lot better than most. That sounds like damning with faint praise, but I'd be bloody happy if someone were to say that about me, and I think Ken, a realistic kind of guy, would have been delighted by the idea.

He was also, beyond all the above, a thoroughly decent fellow, and I wish I had had more sense and time to get to know him better when I had the chance. Too young and stupid though. GP

A TALE OF CAUTION...

<<www.d-be authors beware! We've warned about vanity presses in the past. If you still think you can send a manuscript to an 'unknown' publisher or agent who wants YOU to pay their costs...read on... - RGP>>

On Monday, December 5, 2005, Martha Ivery, aka Kelly O'Donnell, dba Press-Tige Publishing, pleaded guilty to 15 counts of mail fraud and acts against the United States as a principal in a conspiracy; one count of improper use of an electronic access device (legalese for 'credit-card fraud not involving the mails'); and one count of false sworn testimony in a bankruptcy proceeding. Sentencing has been set for April 28, 2006.

A copy of the indictment is here. As usual with indictments of this sort, only a fraction of Ivery's fraud is included: just sixteen of her nearly 300 victims, \$55,000 of her 'take' of more than half a million dollars, and one of nine documentable instances of false sworn testimony before the bankruptcy trustee. Even so, it's worth reading, for a concise window into the way literary scams work.

The US Attorney's Office has issued a news release.

Between 1998 and 2003, Writer Beware received scores of complaints about Martha Ivery, a.k.a. Kelly O'Donnell. Ivery ran several fee-charging literary agencies (Kelly O'Donnell Literary Agency, Inc., O'Donnell Literary Services, Inc., Writers Information USAgency), as well as two vanity publishing operations (Press-Tige Publishing and New Millennium Publishing).

It was a soup-to-nuts operation: writers came in through one of the agencies (which charged 'marketing' fees and pressured clients to accept paid editing services) and were then passed on to one of the publishing companies (which charged several thousand dollars). The connection between the agencies and the publishers wasn't revealed; to further the deception, clients were encouraged to believe that the Kelly O'Donnell who ran the agencies and the Martha Ivery who ran the publishers were two different people.

Writers who paid fees to Ivery - whether for agenting, book doctoring, or publishing - frequently didn't receive the promised services. Manuscripts submitted for agenting were never sent to publishers, or were placed with vanity publishers (including the fraudulent Commonwealth Publishing, which paid kickbacks to agents who persuaded their clients to accept expensive vanity contracts). Promised editing was never completed or was poorly done. Books contracted for publication were never produced, or if produced, weren't marketed. In addition to whatever fees had been agreed upon, Ivery bombarded authors with demands for even more money for nonexistent services: publicity, warehousing, even a Press-Tige cruise (not surprisingly, the cruise was canceled and authors never got refunds).

Ivery was notable for her attempts to intimidate dissatisfied clients and people who attempted to expose her activities. Authors were told that she would 'blacklist' them so that publishers wouldn't look at their manuscripts. Writer Beware staff received death threats. She was also adept at fabricating outlandish excuses to explain her habitual nonperformance. For instance, in the aftermath of 9/11 she variously claimed to have been 'seriously burned' in the disaster, or to be in mourning for relatives who'd been killed. She had numerous heart attacks. She frequently got cancer. As both Martha and Kelly, she died several times. Of course, with so much to remember, once in a while she got her lies mixed up. One pesky author, shocked to learn of Martha's sudden and tragic death, was later somewhat taken aback to receive a call from her.

As a result of numerous author complaints (and lobbying by Writer Beware), a criminal investigation into Ivery's activities was launched by the FBI in 2001. Writer Beware assisted the case agent in the investigation, sharing documentation and contacting victims. Ultimately, more than 300 victims were identified. The take from Ivery's various activities approached half a million dollars.

Under pressure from the investigation and dogged by increasing public knowledge of her scammery, Ivery decided to fold the business. At her first bankruptcy hearing on July 26, 2002, Ivery testified under oath that all the authors listed on Schedule F of her bankruptcy petition had cancelled their contracts with Press-Tige. This was a lie; additionally, many authors' names were left off the creditors' list. She also admitted that her other publishing venture, New Millennium Publishing, had obtained contracts from Press-Tige, and that she was New Millennium's sole employee. 'Craig Roussan', supposedly editor-inchief of New Millennium, was yet another manifestation of her mania for aliases. Ivery claimed she'd met the real Craig Roussan on the Internet, and paid him \$200 in cash for the right to use his name.

Ivery didn't provide any of the documentation that she was directed in writing to bring to the hearing. Ordered to present it at the second hearing, on August 20, 2002, she again failed to bring the material, and again perjured herself on a number of issues. She also admitted that much of the testimony she'd offered at the previous hearing was perjury - including the story about Craig Roussan, which, it turns out, was complete fabrication. The name was Ivery's own invention.

Meanwhile, the criminal investigation continued. On September 26, 2002, a federal search warrant was served on Ivery and the offices of Press-Tige. Many boxes of material were removed from the premises, though no arrest was made.

On December 18, 2003, the judge in the bankruptcy case signed an order to close administration of the estate, to abandon all property, and to return all authors' rights to them. All Press-Tige authors are fully released from any and all contracts, and may freely resubmit their work elsewhere.

Even after her bankruptcy declaration, Ivery continued to be active, sending release forms to Press-Tige authors, contacting authors to harass them and demand money, and soliciting business under a number of aliases, including O'Donnell Literary Services (Kelly O'Donnell), Creek Lane Literary Agency (Sheryl Montanye), and Joseph Wilson Associates.

NEWS IN BRIEF . . .

Williamson, who also wrote as **Julian Shock**, was the editor of the MASQUES series of horror anthologies as well as the author of numerous novels and short stories. Williamson won the Balrog Award in 1985 for his editorial work on MASQUES and received a Bram Stoker Award for Lifetime Achievement in 2003 **Harlan Ellison** is the 23rd SFWA Grand Master **Philip K Dick**'s last unpublished mainstream novel, VOICES FROM THE STREET has been bought by Tor in the USA Congratulations to **Vernon & Pat Brown** who celebrate their 25th wedding anniversary this month **Kevin J Anderson** will complete SLAN HUNTER, **A E van Vogt**'s unfinished sequel to the classic SLAN and will also write a new sequel to the *Null-A* books **Ray Bradbury**'s THE MARTIAN CHRONICLES: THE DEFINITIVE EDITION has sold to

Hill House. This 1000+ page book will include the author's preferred text of THE MARTIAN CHRONICLES plus 23 other Martian stories and fragments, and two unpublished screenplays of THE MARTIAN CHRONICLES by Bradbury The American Film Institute has announced its choice of the ten best films and television shows for 2005. In the film category, **Peter Jackson's KING KONG** was the only genre work represented. In the television category, BATTLESTAR GALACTICA, LOST and VERONICA MARS were selected Although many have long recognized C S Lewis's Chronicles of Narnia as a Christian allegory, Lewis's stepson, Douglas Gresham, recently stated "Churches in Britain and America are promoting the film as a Christian film, but it's not . . . and the Namia books aren't Christian novels." However, a letter Lewis wrote to a fan in 1961 has offered the most direct indication of the series' allegorical basis. The winner will be announced at the New School in Manhattan on January 25, 2006 Winners of the Grand Prix de l'Imaginaire, announced at the Utopiales Festival international de Science-Fiction in Nantes, France, include Christopher Priest's THE SEPARATION as best translated novel, Jeffrey Ford's "Exo-Skeleton Town" as best translated story and Cornelia Funke's INKHEART as best young adult novel With wildfires raging in parts of Texas, the town of Cross Plains, Texas, a community of about 1,000 people, lost fifty houses to the fire. FIFTY DEGREES BELOW by Kim Stanley Robinson HarperCollins / 520pgs / HarperCollins / £18.99 hardcver Reviewed by Pauline Morgan Star Rating: ****

FORTY SIGNS OF RAIN was the start of a trilogy revolving around the implications of global warning. Robinson is researching at the cutting edge of knowledge and making uncanny predictions. For those of us that believe in global warming, we know that one of the symptoms is unusual weather patterns. Some of these generate storms. Storms can cause flooding. In FORTY SIGNS OF RAIN unusually severe storms hit the Eastern seaboard of America. Washington

is flooded. Robinson may have got the city wrong, but the chaos that he describes for Washington was mirrored this summer by scenes in New Orleans.

FIFTY DEGREES BELOW takes the situation a stage further. Due to the melting of the Arctic ice, the Gulf Stream has stalled. This is a vital part of our weather system. It carries warm water from the tropics northwards across the Atlantic, providing Britain with its temperate climate. Normally, when warm water meets cold Arctic water, the heavier warm water sinks, carrying the colder water with it and then moves south, forming a vast convection current. The melt water is less dense and floats on salt water. The increasing amount of it being produced forms a fresh water cap on the ocean preventing the warm current carrying it downwards. The convection current is stopped. Without the warm water moving north, the criteria for abrupt climate changes are met. Signs of abrupt climate changes have been found in geological records so it is not an impossible theory. It could take as little as three years. What this will mean is very cold winters in the Northern Hemisphere.

In the real world, the Gulf Stream is slowing down, and this winter has been predicted to be much colder than those we have seen in the last decade. In this novel, it happens. Washington is still the focus of disaster, though the rising sea levels are not forgotten. One project organised by the National Science Foundation is to try and restart the Gulf Stream by dumping an awful lot of salt into the sea at the point where it should be sinking.

The human characters are small, set against the power of the weather. Back in Washington, Frank Vanderval, an NSF worker, is homeless. The people he had been renting from have returned to reclaim their apartment. To begin with, he is not worried. He constructs a tree house in Rock Creek Park. In the beginning, this lifestyle is fun. Then winter sets in and the snows come. Frank is still content until the night the temperature drops to fifty degrees (Fahrenheit) below freezing and people start dying. Washington, though hard hit, does not suffer as badly as some places in Europe.

At the end of the book, you are left with the unsettling feeling that the conditions described are just around the corner; that if we do not act now, Robinson's predictions will become inevitable. If you have any doubts about the truth of global warming, read these books and ask yourself the question, do you want to run the risk of this future? Then, go and lobby your government. It may not be too late.
