THE STARRY MESSENGER: VISIONS OF THE UNIVERSE (7 July - 10 September 2006) by Robert Day

Compton Verney (near Wellesbourne, Warwickshire) is a Grade-1 listed mansion house designed by Robert Adam in the 1760s. It is set in more than 120 acres of classical parkland landscaped by Lancelot 'Capability' Brown.

When the Peter Moores Foundation bought Compton Verney in 1993, the house and grounds were in a state of decay after decades of neglect. The Compton Verney House Trust was established to transform the mansion into a gallery of international standard where visitors can enjoy art in a welcoming, accessible environment. It opened to the public in March 2004 after a £64 million restoration project. Compton Verney can be found on the B4086 between Wellesbourne and Kineton.

'The Starry Messenger' explores man's ultimate quest in understanding the solar system. It examines visual representations by artists, scientists and thinkers throughout the ages, and how they have used various means in order to attempt to understand the incomprehensible mysteries of the universe and man's place in it. The exhibition includes a vast and diverse selection of both historical and contemporary work.

Themes within the exhibition include the visionary imaginings of William Blake and the Surrealists; science fiction; time travel; moon landings, and paintings and drawings dating back to Galileo's invention of the telescope in 1610.

NEWS IN BRIFF . . .

.... Fantasy writer **Lisa A. Barnett** died Tuesday, May 2, 2006 at her home in Portsmouth, New Hampshire, from a brain tumor. Her collaboration with Melissa Scott produced three novels: POINT OF HOPES and POINT OF DREAMS (Lambda Literary Award winner, 2002), both set in the fantasy city of Astreiant, and THE ARMOR OF LIGHT, set in an alternate Elizabethan England Writer/Director Val Guest (b.1911) died on May 10 in Palm Springs. Guest directed and wrote the *Quatermass* films and THE DAY THE EARTH CAUGHT FIRE, as well as writing CASINO ROYALE. His career began as an actor in 1932 and lasted until 1986 Author and mathematician Arthur Porges (b.1915) died on May 12th. Porges began publishing science fiction in 1952 with "The Fly," and continued to publish until at least 1970. Over that period, he sold more than seventy stories, some of them co-written with his brother, Irwin Porges Multiple award-winning SF author **Spider Robinson** told SCI FI Wire that he recently completed VARIABLE STAR, a novel based on a detailed outline created by the late legendary SF author Robert A. **Heinlein** in 1955. "VARIABLE STAR is the story of a young man so unlucky in love that it drove him clear out of the solar system, ... and then that turned out to be the good news," Robinson said in an interview. "Most of it takes place in a starship on an 85-light-year journey." The trustees of the Robert A. and Virginia Heinlein Prize Trust announced May 25, 2006 that the first-ever Heinlein Prize for contributions to the commercialisation of space will go to **Dr.** Peter H. Diamandis. Dr. Diamandis will be honoured at a dinner and award ceremony and receive \$500,000, a gold Heinlein Medallion, the Lady Vivamus Sword (as described in Heinlein's book GLORY ROAD), and a Laureate's Diploma. Diamandis is a pioneer and leader in the commercial space arena. In the past 25 years he started more than a dozen leading non-profit and for-profit space organizations. Diamandis is best known as Founder and Chairman of the X PRIZE Foundation, whose \$10 million Ansari X PRIZE sparked the birth of the personal spaceflight industry Christie's, the New York auction house, will sell more than 1,000 props, costumes, weapons, set dressings and spaceship models from the original **Star Trek** series and its spinoffs Oct. 5-7. The auction of items drawn from the archives of CBS Paramount Television commemorates the 40th anniversary of the original series, which aired on NBC from 1966-'69, and its spinoff series and movies The auction includes items from every incarnation of Trek, from the original series to the last movie, STAR TREK: NEMESIS, Christie's announced. The auction items will be on view at various

conventions and Christie's sites around the world, beginning this week Director **Ion Favreau** (ZATHURA) told SCI FI Wire that Paramount has put the long-gestating film adaptation of Edgar Rice Burroughs' John Carter of Mars on hold, pending the success of his next directing project, IRON MAN, and the upcoming 11th Star Trek film. The 11 volumes of Burroughs' classic adventure series center around a Civil War veteran who takes shelter in a cave when pursued by a group of Apache Indians. Once inside, he suddenly finds himself transported to Mars, where he's taken prisoner by 12-foot-tall green men BBC News reported that the cult 1960s TV series THE PRISONER will be remade into a six-part series for the UK's Sky One network, with former Doctor Who star **Christopher Eccleston** linked to the title role originally played by Patrick McGoohan Director Christopher Nolan (BATMAN BEGINS) told SCI FI Wire that he's well into development on his next project, a supernatural period movie called THE PRESTIGE. "It's a film about two magicians in turn-of-the-century London," Nolan said in an interview at the Saturn Awards in Universal City, Calif., on May 2. "And they enter into a deadly rivalry. And it's the story of how the two of them essentially try and sabotage each other's careers over the years." THE PRESTIGE is based on the book of the same name by **Christopher Priest** and features Nolan's *Batman* star **Christian** Bale and X-MEN's Hugh Jackman as the competing magicians, whose escalating conflict eventually leads to murder. Bale's Batman co-star Michael Caine also stars, as well as KING KONG's Andy Serkis and THE ISLAND's **Scarlett Iohansson**. SF/fantasy author **Storm Constantine**, whose Wraeththu Histories series concludes in June with THE GHOSTS OF BLOOD AND INNOCENCE, told SCI FI Wire that the androgynous beings known as Wraeththu first came to her as an idea many years ago. "I'd been reading up about the magical meaning of the hermaphrodite, and I became fascinated with the idea of what it would be like if there was only one gender in the world," Constantine said in an interview. "The magical, or alchemical, androgyne is regarded as the perfect manifestation of male and female attributes, but in creating the Wraeththu, an androgynous species, I wanted to explore the possibilities of them possessing some of the worst traits of both genders, too." The BBC reported that the children's TV channel Jetix Europe is developing a show spun off of the hit Doctor Who series, centered on K9, the Doctor's trusty robot dog. K-9 Adventures will feature an updated version of K9 and will mix live action and computer animation Will Smith will star in I AM LEGEND, the long-gestating Warner Brothers adaptation of Richard **Matheson**'s classic SF novel Variety reported. Matheson's book was the basis of previous movie adaptations, including the **Vincent Price** movie THE LAST MAN ON EARTH and the Charlton Heston vehicle THE OMEGA MAN RGP

THE QUEEN OF SINISTER by Mark Chadbourn

These two books comprise the second and third volumes of *The Dark Age* series which in turn is a continuation of *The Age of Misrule* trilogy. In the first series, life in Britain radically changed overnight when all the myths became real and the countryside was overrun by the monsters of nightmare. Five people, the Brothers and Sisters of Dragons, were chosen by a higher power to fight for humankind. Although they triumphed in that the world was not completely destroyed, mythical creatures are still around and normality has not been restored. To counter the next threat, five more Brothers and Sisters of Dragons are chosen.

At the start of THE QUEEN OF SINISTER a plague has taken hold of the country. It resembles the Black Death but is actually supernatural in origin. Dr Caitlin Shepherd is supremely efficient until the plague takes her husband and son. This event drives her over the edge and colours all her actions in the rest of the novel. At this time, the lament-brood, an army of the undead, begins to stalk the countryside. Some of them seem to be searching for Caitlin. Also arriving on the scene is the mysterious Crowther. He persuades Caitlin that the cure to the plague lies in the Otherworld where all the monsters have come from and that she has a chance of getting her son and husband back if she goes there. He also tells her she is a Sister of Dragons. Several others join them in their journey. At the end of it, Caitlin has to make a decision. She is not given all the information to make an informed choice, and her emotions get in the way of clear thinking.

In THE HOUNDS OF AVALON, we are introduced to a Brother and another Sister of Dragons, Mallory and Sophie. It is possible that volume one of this trilogy revolve around them as they seem to be well formed characters with a developed relationship. Caitlin is by now no longer a Sister of Dragons but desperately wants to get her status back. Much of the action revolves around Oxford where the remnants of government have retreated. Here we meet Hunter, a military assassin. He discovers he is also a Brother of Dragons. To stand any chance of defeating the forces that are rapidly approaching in the midst

of an unusual July winter there must be five. It may be up to Hal, Hunter's quiet, unassuming and bookish friend, to discover the answers.

Both these books are good, fast paced adventures and can be read together as a pair if the first is unavailable. It is probably better not to dwell too much on issues that are ignored. For example, we are told that Britain is isolated from the rest of the world, yet there are still helicopters and, in Oxford at least, electricity and a semblance of normality. Is the rest of the world in a similar turmoil or has Britain disappeared from the view of the Continent? Are they trying to break through? No mention is made of Ireland which shares the Celtic mythology that is overwhelming the island. And why only the Celtic mythos? Unless, in India chaos has resulted from the return of the demons and such gods as Kali and Shiva. Is China ravaged by real dragons? Perhaps there are stories yet to be told about the return of the gods and demons of other cultures. *PM*
