When I attended my first con in 1964, Ron was the organiser of the Saturday night brag/poker sessions and over the 40 years that I knew him we got together more often as the years went by. In recent years we had dinner together at least once at every convention – at Worldcon in Glasgow last year, we dined out together every night. Little did I realise it was to be the last time we would meet.

Both of us were book dealers, both of us sold through ebay. I wish I had kept all the emails from him telling me of his hilarious ebay experiences. With his dry wit he reported the 'idiots' he encountered and many times had me creased up with laughter. I will certainly miss him. A good friend – gone.

THE LETTER COLUMN OF 'BRUM GROUP NEWS'

From member Robert Day — "A comment on Vicky's reviews in the last Newsletter... Re. CHARLIE AND THE CHOCOLATE FACTORY; there was much in this to enjoy. The first half-hour or so is a stunning neo-Marxist critique of globalisation and the evils of unbridled capitalism as Willy Wonka fires all his workers to replace them with immigrant slave labour. Then, when Charlie wins the competition, the film changes completely as we see Johnny Depp's masterful portrayal of Michael Jackson... - no, that's surely wrong - I think....

"The vile kids and their equally vile parents get exactly what they deserve, and it always teeters on the verge of something truly horrific - well, this is a Tim Burton film, after all. The ending of the film is a great improvement on the 1970s film with Gene Wilder, as the happy ending isn't saccharine in any way.

"Criticisms? Well, there's a couple of places where the CGI is less than flawless (a couple of very obvious back projections which look about as well done as they were in the 1950s, rather than invisible as they should be in the 21st century). The actual setting, whilst it is supposed to be Anytown in Anyland, comes out wrong because the scene looks, to British eyes, almost but not quite like the industrial North of England. The houses have the wrong proportions, and details of the setting jar. And it is an appalling act of cultural imperialism to have all these fine British actors mouthing alien words like 'candy'. (In the same way that V FOR VENDETTA stumbled badly when, right at the end, a British detective told Natalie Portman to "Let go of that levver."

"But on the other hand, the chocolate factory is a glorious piece of 1930s Art Deco megalomania straight out of Alexander Korda's THINGS TO COME, and the Oopma-Loompa - just the one, digitally multiplied - started out as a surprise and ended up challenging Depp for the star role! The songs were also a pleasant surprise - not a cringe in any one of them.

"In my book, probably the most enjoyable film I've seen in the past year in terms of pure entertainment!"

NEWS IN BRIEF . . .

.... **Nigel Kneale** (b 1922) died October 29th. He was primarily known as the creator of the *Quatermass* serials on BBC TV, filmed for the big screen by Hammer Films, but was also responsible for the BBC's adaptation in the 1950s of Orwell's NINETEEN EIGHTY-FOUR and his 60s play YEAR OF THE SEX OLYMPICS. http://www.hammerfilms.com/features/tributes/nigel kneale.html Author **Nelson S. Bond** (b.1908) died on November 4. He died following complications from heart valve problems. He began publishing science fiction in 1937 with the story "Down the Dimensions" in Astounding, His first novel, EXILES OF TIME. appeared in 1949 Grand Master and past Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America President, Jack Williamson (b.1908) died on November 10. Born in 1908 in Arizona, Jack Williamson's family brought him to New Mexico by covered wagon in 1915. Williamson's first published short story, "The Metal Men" was published in Amazing in 1928, and he has published stories or novels in every decade since then, with his most recent novel being THE STONEHENGE GATE in 2005. His writing runs the gamut of the field, including such seminal works as the LEGION OF SPACE, DARKER THAN YOU THINK, THE HUMANOIDS, and several collaborations with Frederik Pohl. Co-author of the *Illuminatus* books, **Robert Anton Wilson**, is dving from post-polio syndrome. In October it was revealed that his finances were low and he would not be able to pay his rent for more than another month. Within a few days, Wilson received over \$68,000 in donations, enough to let him live out his remaining days in comfort. Now, that's the kind of action that makes me proud to be part of the SF community!Orson Scott Card's new novel, EMPIRE, is published in the USA on November 28th, and is a disturbing look at a second Civil War A 250,000 word collection of short stories by **Connie** Willis has been sold to Subterranean Press William Gibson has delivered SPOOK COUNTRY to Viking Penguin in the USA Alastair Reynolds has delivered his new Revellation Space novel THE PREFECT to Gollancz Mike Ashley has turned in GATEWAYS TO FOREVER, the third volume in his History of the SF Magazines to Liverpool University Press. As the 70s were so complicated, a 4th volume, THE ETERNAL CHRONICLES, is now planned Terry Gilliam has optioned GOOD OMENS from Terry Pratchett and **Neil Gaiman** for one groat (the agents will be paid in farthings) Veteran author **E C 'Ted' Tubb** has sold a new novel, DEAD WEIGHT plus reprints of DEATH IS A DREAM and MOON BASE, through agent Phil Harbottle, to publisher F A Thorpe Harbottle has also sold THE MASTER MUST DIE and THE LONELY ASTRONOMER by - ee gad! - John Russell Fearn to the same publisher. Er? Now if the publisher's third name started with an N, we'd have F A N Thorpe. Lionel, please don't tell us you've gone back into publishing after your *very* successful BLACK LINO???? I tell you, this world gets stranger and stranger Christie's New York STAR TREK memorabilia auction, expected to raise \$3 million, finally totalled \$7.1 million, with a replica of the Enterprise-D from NEXT GENERATION selling for \$576,000, a model of Enterprise-E for \$120,000 and a model of a Borg cube ship went for \$96,000. Over 20 years ago, I said that STAR TREK fans had more money than sense. These prices put that statement into a whole new ballgame. They're f**kin' NUTS!" RGP

RESPLENDENT by Stephen Baxter
(Destiny's Children Book Four)

Baxter's fourth short story collection is announced as the latest *Destiny's Children* volume, thus concluding another massive four-part trilogy. More than that, it continues the process of tying the series to previous books including TIMELIKE INFINITY and VACUUM DIAGRAMS in a million-year history of mankind's war for supremacy over the alien Xeelee – a war which ends with defeat snatched from the jaws of victory. Not, however, a complete history – it would surely require dozens, if not hundreds, of volumes to cover such an immense span of time. Instead, a series of snapshots is provided, briefly illuminating various events some of which seem more significant or important than others. The stories range from straightforward action to weird metaphysics and cover a wide range of themes such as contact with alien lifeforms, super-tech, epic space war, genetics, virtual reality and immortality - all subject to typical human weaknesses and failings.

However, the people involved seem for the most part to be lost, submerged beneath the technical requirements of the situations in which they find themselves. There is a sketchy framework of comments to link the stories together, ostensibly provided by one Luru Parz, an immortal who appears in the first and last stories but scarcely at all elsewhere, and it is hinted that she has guided the progress of human history throughout. Apart from her, however, there are hardly any memorable characters to stand out or to be recalled as the architects of great events. In fact, reading between the lines, it becomes apparent that in the far future individuality has had to be ruthlessly suppressed, human beings becoming little more than a resource to be used as required to promulgate the millennia-long wars which have to be won if humankind is to achieve anything resembling survival. And for what?

Taken as a whole, this *Destiny's Children* series seems bitty and disjointed. In part, this may be due to the fact that such an enormous span of time cannot be covered other than by viewing little fragments here and there, but even so it lacks a sense of cohesion – there is no single continuous thread which one can readily follow from beginning to end. This lack of structure is also apparent in this volume: with the exception of the last story in the book, written to complete the

collection, these stories were variously published over a six-year period and although they have been revised for this publication it still shows.

This is, nonetheless, quite an impressive collection, hard technical SF at its best, and I have no hesitation in recommending it.
