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

# HARRY HARRISON named 2009 DAMON KNIGHT GRAND MASTER



Brum Group President Harry Harrison was somewhat surprised to learn that he is to be

honoured by being made the 2009 Damon Knight Grand Master by the Science Fiction Writers of America.

"Harrison's selection was announced by SFWA President Russell Davis

after consulting with the Board of Directors and participating past presidents. The Nebula Awards Weekend will be held April 24-26 in Los Angeles with the awards presentation banquet to be held on the UCLA campus to tie in with the Los Angeles Times Festival of Books. Past SFWA President and Grand Master (2004) Robert Silverberg will be presenting.

"There are few moments in life that can be taken out and savoured in memory. One happened today," Harrison said. "A phone call from our President Russell Davis with the startling news that I was to be the 2009 Grand Master nearly led to the collapse of a stout writer!

"It's still soaking in," he said. "But may I express my fervent thanks to all involved for this signal honour."

Already an established illustrator and freelance non-fiction writer, Harrison published his first science fiction story, "Rock Diver", in the August 1951 issue of WORLDS BEYOND. From that point he went on to produce more than 62 novels, eight short fiction collections, six non-fiction books and countless short stories. He also found the time to edit 35 anthologies over the span of his career.

His active involvement in the science fiction community throughout the 1950s led to his becoming a charter member of SFWA.

"Why, I can recall with a tear in one rheumy eye, when SFWA was a just a wild idea put forward by Damon Knight," Harrison said. "A few of us nodded and agreed with him and thus, with great hope and no money, this organization was born. I won't dwell on the fact that this was over 50 years ago...

"Enough! Let's look to the future not the past as we go from strength to strength and march, banners flapping, into the SF future," he said."

Harry is the 26th writer recognized by SFWA as a Grand Master. He joins Robert A Heinlein (1974), Jack Williamson (1975), Clifford D Simak (1976), L Sprague de Camp (1978), Fritz Leiber (1981), Andre Norton (1983), Arthur C Clarke (1985), Isaac Asimov (1986), Alfred Bester (1987), Ray Bradbury (1988), Lester del Rey (1990), Frederik Pohl (1992), Damon Knight (1994), A E van Vogt (1995), Jack Vance (1996), Poul Anderson (1997), Hal Clement (1998), Brian Aldiss (1999), Philip Jose Farmer (2000), Ursula K LeGuin (2003), Robert Silverberg (2004), Anne McCaffrey (2005), Harlan Ellison (2006), James Gunn (2007) and Michael Moorcock (2008).

### **NEWS IN BRIEF...**



.... SF author, critic, and poet **Thomas M. Disch**, born 1940, committed suyicide July 4, 2008. Disch had been depressed for several years, especially by the death of long-time partner **Charles Naylor**, and worries of eviction from his rent-controlled apartment. He was the author of several novels including THE GENOCIDES (1965), the classic CAMP CONCENTRATION (1968) and 334 (1974). The 1993 ENCYCLOPEDIA OF SCIENCE

FICTION wrote "Because of his intellectual audacity, the chillingly distanced mannerism of his narrative art, the austerity of the pleasures he affords, and the fine cruelty of his wit, Disch has been perhaps the most respected, least trusted, most envied and least read of all modern first-rank SF writers." .... The winners of the Prometheus Award for Libertarian science fiction have been announced. - (tie): THE GLADIATOR by **Harry Turtledove**, and HA'PENNY by **Jo Walton** The Hall of Fame Award went to A CLOCKWORK ORANGE by **Anthony Burgess** .... The Cordwainer Smith Award was presented at Readercon to **Stanley G Weinbaum**, whose career only lasted two years, but

included several notable stories, including "A Martian Odyssey". .... **Patrick Nielsen Hayden** - senior editor and manager of science fiction at Tor Books has announced the July 20 launch of Tor's new SF/fantasy site. Tor.com will feature original fiction, a group blog, lightweight social networking features and an extensive art gallery .... The long-lost original cut of **Fritz Lang**'s 1927 silent film **METROPOLIS** was discovered in the archives of the Museum of Cinema in Buenos Aires earlier this year. The museum's Paula Felix-Didier said it was the only copy of the complete film. Soon after its initial release at the height of

Germany's Weimar Republic, distributors cut Lang's three-and-a-half-hour masterpiece into the shorter version since viewed by millions worldwide. But a private collector carried an original print to Argentina in 1928, where it has stayed. Around 20 to 25 minutes of footage that fleshes out secondary characters and sheds light on the plot would be added to the film pending restoration, Possmann said, but



around 5 minutes of the original was probably still missing .... The creators of ABC's upcoming time-shift series **LIFE ON MARS** told reporters on July 16 that they have moved the series' location to New York and changed character traits to adapt the hit British series for an American audience.... *RGP*


### THE STEEL REMAINS by Richard Morgan Gollancz / 416pgs / £12.99 / hardcover / ISBN: 978-07528-91507 Reviewed by Ian Allwyn

THE STEEL REMAINS takes place years after a war with the scaled folk, in which the novel's hero, Ringil Eskiath, played an important fighting role. The empire, divided between a barbaric rural north and a trading wealthy south, is slowly returning to normal. Trade links are opening up, slavery has been reintroduced and the merchant classes have begun to replenish their fortunes.

This fantasy debut features three distinct narratives; Ringil's being the most significant. In exile in the north, he is summoned back to the south by his mother to recover a cousin whose debts have sold her into slavery. The other stories feature what has happened to his previous fighting allies and how a new threat will lead to their paths crossing once again. Egar the Barbarian has returned to his tribe a hero and tribe leader although his exposure to the more civilised south puts this coveted role into question as others jockey for his job. The third story is that of Archeth, an advisor to the Emperor,

sent to the north to investigate the ransacking of a port by forces unknown which resulted

in only one, damaged survivor.



The Yhelteth Empire is a well-realised fantasy setting with plenty of potential for the novel to be the start of a series. Morgan's clear prose is evident and the supernatural darkness of various sections in the story indicates his potential as a horror writer, especially with the great opening chapter. However, as each chapter continues one of the three strands of story, it becomes frustrating to leave the other characters in the midst of either an action sequence or a plot-turning revelation. Whilst this is a common structural form within multi-plotted novels, for the longest part of this novel, it's not obvious as to how the three strands of story fit into one narrative and it ended up similar to trying to watch three different movies simultaneously by swapping from one to another after every scene.

THE STEEL REMAINS reads as a conscious attempt to try something different for Morgan although the novel read as a more traditional sword and sorcery style fantasy rather than one of his more groundbreaking science fiction novels.

### DEFINITELY DEAD by Charlaine Harris Gollancz / 324pgs / £6.99 / paperback Reviewed by Pauline Morgan

This novel is part of a continuing narrative as told by Sookie Stackhouse. Sookie is a telepath. She only knows one other person like her and he does not feature in this particular volume (though he gets mentioned). The book is set five years after vampires came out. Not everyone is happy to find that vampires have been in their midst for centuries and that they must now be considered as an ethnic minority. What humans do not realise is that there are also enclaves of weres (wolves, panthers, tigers) and fairies. Sookie is a barmaid in the Louisiana town of Bon Temps. The bar in which she works is

frequented by supes (the supernatural races).



The main thrust of the story is Sookie's visit to New Orleans to sort out her cousin's effects. Hadley was a vampire and the lover of Louisiana's vampire queen. The queen has recently married the king of the Arkansas vampires. Unfortunately, Hadley stole a bracelet, a wedding gift, from the queen, in a fit of pique. The queen needs it back and hopes Sookie will find it amongst Hadley's possessions. This is not Sookie's only problem as a family of werewolves have unfinished business with her about the death of their daughter. As a result of their vendetta, Sookie and her new boyfriend, a weretiger, find themselves pursued through the Louisiana swamps.

The big problem with this novel is that it doesn't get on with the real story until about half way through. It is light, a little frothy and reads more

like a diary with the dates taken out and includes a lot of things that do not add to the thrust of the action, even though they might seem important to Sookie as a person. This book will while away an hour or so on a long train journey.
