## SCIENCE FICTION BANNED!

Excerpted from Daily Telegraph July 22nd

A short story competition to celebrate the life of H G Wells failed to attract a single entry after organisers banned science fiction writing. The contest, organised by Reg Turnill the former BBC aerospace correspondent, challenged fans of the author, considered by many as the father of science fiction, to write stories about contemporary life in his home county of Kent rather than aliens or time travel. Another condition was that the story had to be handwritten rather than typed in an effort to challenge the modern over-reliance on computers. The contest offered a  $\pounds$ 1000 prize for the winner but failed to attract entrants



Ray Potter, 54, a Kent resident said: "People who

love sci-fi want to write about alien invasions. Writing about Kent life in 2010 would be the most boring thing in the world for them."

## Joe Haldeman's FOREVER WAR movie

Joe Haldeman has posted this over on LiveJournal:

Got some 'sort-of' news about the FOREVER WAR movie, in that Ridley Scott did mention it while he was talking to a bunch of film buffs at an action movie convention. Kind of rambling, but at least the movie is still on his mind -

"[Haldeman] thought instead of writing the book about Vietnam, he'd write a book about a future idea of this perpetual war that seemed to be perpetual if you were a soldier serving in Vietnam. Why on earth were we there? What were we doing? What's the ultimate target? How do we get out? In a word, that reflects the whole tenor of the book. So it's philosophical and, in a funny kind of way, romantic. Romantic in the sense of I think 2001 was romantic and STAR WARS is romantic, the first *Star Wars*, George Lucas', by far the best of the *Star Wars*, the one he directed, I think. That's the kind of romantic view. Romantic, I don't mean love story. I mean there's a vision there which elevates the idea."

To me that's pretty good news. I've been hoping against hope that the movie wouldn't be just another skiffy big-explosions, big-boobs, big-but-stupid-ideas sort of thing. The main story is really about love and time. – Joe

## NEWS IN BRIEF . . .

.... Author **James P. Hogan** (b. 1941) was found dead on July 12 according to his literary agent. Hogan, who won three Seiun Awards and 2 Prometheus Awards, wrote the *Giants* series, beginning with his debut novel, INHERIT THE STARS, as well as THRICE UPON A TIME and THE PROTEUS OPERATION among others .... Author **F. Gwynplaine MacIntyre** (b.1948) died on June 25, an apparent suicide. MacIntyre was the author of THE WOMAN BETWEEN THE WORLDS and MacINTYRE'S IMPROBABLE BESTIARY, the latter made up of his columns for *Asimov's*. A body identified as MacIntyre's was found in his burned apartment a day after

he was taken to Coney Island Hospital for observation after police had received word that he might be suicidal .... **Samuel R. Delany** and **Harlan Ellison** have been announced as recipients of the Eaton Award for Lifetime Achievement by the University of California-Riverside. Delany is the 2010 honoree and Ellison is the honoree for 2011 .... **Neil Gaiman** quits his vampire novel because of the TWILIGHT effect! According to an interview in *The Independent*, Gaiman, whose GRAVEYARD BOOK recently became the first children's book to win the Carnegie Award, has decided there are far too many bloodsuckers out there. In fact, he compared the growth of vampires in books, TV and movies to a cockroach infestation .... the winners of the **2009 Prometheus Awards** have been announced by the Libertarian Futurist Society. The Prometheus Awards are given to honor excellence in libertarian science fiction. Best Novel - THE UNINCORPORATED MAN by Dani & Eytan Kollin and the Hall of Fame Award -"No Truce for Kings" by Poul Anderson .... Jean M Auel has handed in the final book in the Earth's Children series, THE LAND OF PAINTED CAVES - only 30 years after book 1. CLAN OF THE CAVE BEAR .... the winner of the **2010 Cordwainer Smith** Rediscovery Award was announced at Readercon. The award seeks to recognize and draw attention to lesser-known fantasy or science fiction authors. This year's award went to Mark Clifton, perhaps best known for co-authoring the second novel to win the Hugo Award, THEY'D RATHER BE RIGHT (a.k.a. THE FOREVER MACHINE), strangely enough the ONLY Hugo winner never published in the UK! .... CRYOBURN, a new Vorkosigan novel by Lois McMaster Bujold is due in hardcover from Baen in November .... the winners of the John W Campbell Award and the Theodore Sturgeon Award have been announced. The Campbell being presented to THE WINDUP GIRL by Paolo Bacigalupi for the Best SF Novel and the Sturgeon to "Shambling Towards Hiroshima" by James Morrow for Best Short Story .... Filmmaker George Pál (1908-1980) and nineteenth century author Percy Greg (1836-1889) have had craters named for them on Mars. Both craters are located east of Hellas Planitia basin. Pál Crater is about 79 km wide near 110°E, 30°S and Greg is about 68 km wide near 112°E, 38°S. This also marks the first time the IAU has use **John Clute** and Peter Nichols' THE ENCYCLOPEDIA OF SCIENCE FICTION on the list of references cited in planetary nomenclature .... BSFG members **Pauline Morgan** and Dave Hardy have just returned from a trip taking in Tahiti to watch a total eclipse and then travelled a further 6000 miles to visit Easter Island! Don't forget to ask them about the trip when you see them .... Twelve years after she converted to Christianity from atheism, bestselling author Anne Rice has 'quit being a Christian' because of the religion's attitude to birth control, homosexuality and science. In a message posted on her Facebook page Rice said she was 'out'. "In the name of Christ, I refuse to be anti-gay. I refuse to be anti-feminist. I refuse to be anti-artificial birth control. I refuse to be anti-Democrat. I refuse to be anti-secular humanism. I refuse to be anti-science. I refuse to be anti-life. In the name of Christ, I quit Christianity and being Christian. Amen," the author wrote. An atheist for decades, Rice returned to her childhood faith of Catholicism in 1998. - wasn't it just my luck that when she signed books at Andromeds she 'desecrated' the visitors' book by writing in it "Thank you for the Signing - you do the Lord's work!". We all nearly threw up!

### **BY MIDNIGHT by Mia James** Gollancz / 453pgs / hardcover £11.99 ISBN: 978-0575095526 Reviewed by Pauline Morgan

This is one of Gollancz's Young Adult novels and the first of a supernatural series. April Dunne is a sixteen-year-old uprooted from Edinburgh to a house opposite Highgate Cemetery because her father has a new job. She is sent to Ravenwood, a private school for high fliers. While most of the other sixth-form pupils seem either rich or geeky, she pals up with Caro who is, amongst other things, a conspiracy theorist, and Simon, Caro's gay childhood friend.



While her father researches the Highgate vampire and April is becoming intrigued by Gabriel, a fellow pupil, two murders take place. One is of Alix Graves a pop star who lives nearby, the other April almost stumbles over on her way home. Then April's father is murdered. Caro is convinced that the deaths are linked. She also becomes convinced that the school is being run by vampires.

Told from the perspective of a teenager, this is a fine portrayal of teenage angst, full of the usual arguments with parents, the on-off relationship with Gabriel, the urgings of her mother to make friends with Davina, daughter of one of the school's richest patrons. Her loyalties are torn and she has not only her grief to contend with but also her mother's decline. Then, just when she thinks things cannot get worse, she discovers that not only is Gabriel a vampire but she is a Fury. She can kill vampires – not with a stake but by kissing them. She is falling in love with a boy


that she will kill if he kisses her.

Do these characters sound familiar? Imagine this as Buffy the Vampire Slayer with Highgate taking the place of Sunnydale. If you are a Buffy fan, you should enjoy this.

By the way, I forgot to mention the teacher who... never mind. Read the book and find out. Regardless of this, BY MIDNIGHT is a good example of teenage fiction that can also be appreciated by older readers. *PM* 

#### ELVES ONCE WALKED WITH GODS by James Barclay Gollancz / 366pgs / hardcover £18.99 ISBN: 978-0575085015 / trade paperback £12.99/ ISBN: 978-0575085022 Reviewed by Jim Pearce

ELVES ONCE WALKED WITH GODS is the first of a trilogy by this prolific author. The many species of Elves (called Threads) have lived in an unnatural harmony for over a thousand years on both their original home world and Calius where this story is set. About 10 years before the present date they are forced to flee their home world to escape from the demonic Garonin leaving about 100,000 behind to be slaughtered. Takaar, the elf who created the harmony and lead the resistance to the Garonin, is blamed for the loss and has fled into the jungles of Calius.




Malcontents are working to destroy the harmony established by Takaar. On its formal repudiation, Elven society immediately and violently fractures with each Thread

taking revenge for perceived slights and inequalities. Human mercenaries have been brought in to help re-establish the pre-harmony ruling Thread but, using magic, brutally take over and establish their own rule. In desperation, controversial steps are taken to recall Takaar from his exile; but will he be of help or a hindrance as in the 10 years since he was last seen he has gone mad?

As was to be expected of this author the book is competently written and moves along at a high pace with its many narrative strands being seamlessly woven together. That said the plot did not grip nor the characters engage. I did not become interested in what was happening to the elves, either as a race or as individuals, until the end of the book when the story started to grow on me. Do I want to read the next part of the story, perhaps? Would I buy a copy? No. JTP

### THE DEAD-TOSSED WAVES by Carrie Ryan Gollancz / 402pgs / £9.99 hardcover ISBN: 978-0575090897 Reviewed by Pauline Morgan



It is very difficult to make zombies sexy. Instead of trying to, Carrie Ryan concentrates on the burgeoning emotions of her human characters. Since this is written for the young adult market, do not expect steamy sex scenes. Compared with some of the offerings in the bookshops, this is very chaste.

This is a post apocalyptic novel. The event that changed the world was The Return when the dead, known as Mudo, started walking. They are dormant until they smell living flesh. Then all they want to do is infect the living with their condition. Bites are invariably fatal.

Gabry is an adolescent who lives in an enclave of the living with her mother. One night, she and a group of friends defy the rules to venture outside the barrier to a derelict fairground. She is encouraged by her best friend Cira and Cira's brother, Catcher. Just as Catcher is about to give Gabry her first kiss, they are attacked one of the Mudo, the returned dead. Two of the teenagers

are killed, Catcher is bitten. Gabry escapes back inside the barrier but the others are rounded up and sentenced to join the Recruiters whose job is to hunt down Mudo. Gabry is torn between wanting to stay safe and owning up to being with her friends. Hormones take over and she decides to brave the outside again to find Catcher, expecting him to be dying. Instead, she discovers that he is a very rare person, an Immune. The bite did not kill him and now the Mudo cannot sense him. Rescuing Cira, they venture into the Forest of Hands and Teeth. During the flight, Gabry learns about her own origins which are not what she thought.

The tensions and anxieties of living in a world like this are well drawn and the obsessions of adolescents are well handled. There is, however, a bit too much of the teenage angst about who she fancies most – Catcher or Elias – perhaps a bit too much even for the readership the book is aimed at, as Gabry never really gets beyond the tentative kissing stage. PM
