NEWS IN BRIEF

British literary agent Dot Lumley (nee Houghton) has passed away. She started her career in publishing before becoming an agent. Her clients included many science fiction, fantasy and horror novelists Mercury astronaut Scott Carpenter died on October 10th. In 1962 he was the fourth American in space and the second to orbit the Earth. His death means that John Glenn is now the only surviving member of the seven Mercury astronauts Author Richard Kearns has passed away. He published mainly short stories, of which the most well-known was "The Power of the Press". His story "Grave Angels" was nominated for the Sturgeon Award. He was editor of the SFWA Bulletin for a short time in the 1970's Film critic Stanley Kauffmann has died. He was also an acquisitions editor for Ballantine Books and in 1953 he purchased FAHRENHEIT 451 from Ray Bradbury. He also bought DEATH OF A SALESMAN before moving into a full time role as a film critic Science fiction writer John Boyd died in October. His first novel in 1968 was THE LAST STARSHIP and he produced several more SF novels including THE DOOMSDAY GENE and BARNARD'S PLANET. Using his real name. Boyd Upchurch he also published historical novels and a non-fiction book which examined the McCarthy era witch hunts Harper Voyager is to publish a new fantasy series by Robin Hobb. The first novel, FOOL'S ASSASSIN will be published to coincide with the author's appearance as Guest of Honour at WorldCon in 2014 Raymond Feist is to publish a new fantasy series, The War of Five Crowns. The first in the series is expected to be published in May 2014 Helsinki has announced a bid for Worldcon 2017 after finishing second in the 2015 race. Japan and Montreal are also in contention for 2017 In the 50th Anniversary year of **Dr Who**, nine lost episodes have been found in Nigeria. All from the

Patrick Troughton era, they include four of the five missing episodes from The Web of Fear (where the Yeti are in the London Underground) and five missing episodes from The Enemy of the World meaning that this serial is now complete Also regarding **Dr Who** a petition has been started to have the Empire State Building lit up in Tardis Blue colour The Jim Baen Memorial Writing Contest has been announced. It is jointly sponsored by Baen Books and the National Space Society. Stories need to "explore the promise of space exploration". Stories should be no more than 8000 words and set in a near future (no more than 60 years) and involve manned space exploration. Submission guidelines at www.williamledbetter.com/contest.htm. Closing date February 1st 2014 Reminiscent of the 1958 Fritz Leiber story "The Wanderer", astronomers have announced the discovery of a gas giant planet that does not orbit a star Lord Rees, the Astronomer Royal said in an address to the Wired 2013 conference that "It's better to read first rate science fiction than second rate science - it's a lot more fun, and no more likely to be wrong". He speculated on space exploration in the near future, including the likelihood that China would put a man on Mars and that private companies would be force flight. 

EARTH STAR by Janet Edwards

BSFG Member and regular attendee Janet Edwards is the author of the EARTH GIRL trilogy, science fiction for adult and young adult readers, set in a distant future where humanity portals between hundreds of colony worlds . . . except for the unfortunate few whose immune system can't handle living anywhere else but Earth.

In the first book, EARTH GIRL, Jarra was sent to Earth at birth to save her life and abandoned by her parents. She can't travel to other worlds, but she can watch their vids, and she knows all the jokes they make. She's an "ape," a "throwback," but this is one ape girl who won't give in.

Being an 'ape' Jarra is subject to continual discrimination despite being awarded the Artemis medal for her heroic actions in the first novel. The majority of norms have left earth to live on other colonized planets expanding into the universe. Jarra is isolated, trapped on planet Earth and unable to pursue the military career she so wants.

Edwards captures the essence of 18-year olds even creating her own future teen lingo/jargon, which resonates. The new academic term starts and Jarra's team are at Eden to begin an archaeological dig. Unable to leave the planet due to her immunity deficiency Jarra accepts that she can never enter the military. At least she does until she and her 'twoing' partner Fian are conscripted in an emergency to the military to help with what may be evidence of first contact. They are working for the Alien Contact Programme, which has been activated. Of course the worry sets in straight away, because Jarra will die if she goes offworld.

Edwards' SF elements are strong and speak of her knowledge of the genre, with portals between sectors and planets for transport, hover bags and food dispensers, which are common place and feel real. This novel is bursting with energy and it is refreshing to see a number of powerful, strong female characters particularly in the military. And Jarra is a great female representative too; although being an 'ape' she is the daughter of heroes and a Military Honour Child. A thoroughly enjoyable YA book that will appeal to adults too. *TD*



MARAUDER by Gary Gibson

MARAUDER is a worthy sequel to Gary Gibson's brilliant Shoal trilogy (STEALING LIGHT, NOVA WAR and EMPIRE OF LIGHT) being set approximately two hundred years after its conclusion. As in the *Shoal* trilogy the lead character is a strong feisty woman spacecraft pilot, Megan Jacinth, displays who many of the characteristics so strongly exhibited by Gibson's previous heroine, Dakota Merrick. As in his previous novels there is a strong cast of 'supporting' characters whose actions display both the best and worst of human nature all bound up in a smoothly depicted and gripping tale.

There are three strands to this



story which are effortlessly blended together in this gripping tale. The first follows Megan and the consequences of her attempt to rescue her friend Imtiaz Bashir (Bash) who she thought was dead. At the start of the story she has found out he is a captive in the hands of her once lover but now greatest enemy, Gregor Tarrant. The second strand takes place 12 years earlier when she and Bash are persuaded to steal a Nova drive ship, by Tarrant and his truly despicable colleague Sifra, and take it halfway across the galaxy to intercept an alien vessel known as the Wanderer/Marauder.

In the course of this trip she discovers the inhumane motives of her new colleagues and their employer, General Schelling and Bash loses his mind. This voyage ends in a disaster from which she barely escapes leaving her companions for dead. The final strand of MARAUDER covers the fate of a young woman, Gabrielle who is the Speaker Elect of the Domarchy, a state on the planet Redstone. She is expected to enter a semi-derelict Magi starship that is the source of the Demarchy's dominance of the planet after which she will swiftly rise to 'heaven'! She is rescued from this fate during a planet wide disaster by her bodyguard and lover Karl Petrova and as a consequence her, Megan's and the other characters' paths collide.

Readers of the *Shoal* Trilogy will recall that Magi starships are the remnant of a culture of starfaring peoples originating in the Large Magellanic Cloud about 2 million years ago. This civilization was destroyed as the result of the discovery of Maker caches containing faster than light nova drive technology and the consequent nova wars. One good consequence of this story is the discovery of the Maker's objectives and the possibility that there may be yet another book in this 'universe' resolving this problem. DARK EDEN by Chris Beckett

This novel was the winner of the 2013 Arthur C Clarke Award for SF published in the UK in the previous year. The story is set on a planet with no sunlight but which surprisingly has life. Small islands of light and warmth exist between cold, dark deserts. In these oases, fuelled by geothermal energy, plants and animals generate their own light. Warmth is provided by the tree-like plants. One hundred and sixty three years ago, five people with a damaged space-craft found this dark planet which they called Eden. Three chose to try and navigate the damaged vehicle back to Earth to mount a rescue whilst two, Tommy and Angela chose to remain.


Now the 500 descendants of their incestuous union huddle in one such haven, next to the remains of the ruined "Landing Veekle", waiting for rescue from Earth. They have no technology and some of them suffer from genetic defects ("batfaces" and "clawfeet"). Trapped by the need to remain where they can be found and the extreme cold and dark beyond the edge of the plant life, they are starting to exhaust their resources.

A schism forms between some of the younger members, led by John Redlantern, who want change and the majority who insist on remaining. The split leads to violence and changes to the social structure. John Redlantern's group are developing ways to explore the dark but are forced to leave early in a hunt for other areas of light in which to live.

I liked that the science in this story seemed plausible to me. Dark planets (either a long distance from or without a star) do exist and some of these would be large enough (or orbit a gas giant) to maintain volcanic

activity. Indeed only this month, astronomers have discovered a planet without a star. Also, the ecology of the world is convincing. There are microorganisms on Earth which derive energy from inorganic compounds rather than light, and which produce oxygen as a waste product. These are found round volcanic vents ("black smokers") deep in the ocean.

The plot is reasonably wellpaced and the characters for the most part seem convincing. For example, the "hero", John Redlantern is flawed and indeed is not the main factor in the breakaway group's achievements. A different character narrates the story in each chapter so we get to see the



point of view of both sides of the conflict. The story is easy to read and does come to a conclusion although there is plenty to still be explored and resolved. The author's ability to create a convincing alien world reminded me of Brian Aldiss (*Helliconia Trilogy*) or Hal Clement (THE NITROGEN FIX in particular). I believe a sequel is planned and I would definitely read it. *CG*

THE BLOODLINE FEUD by Charles Stross Tor / 564 pgs / £9.99 paperback / ISBN: 978-1-447237617 Reviewed by Pauline Morgan.

For those who do not look closely enough, buying this book could be a mistake especially for fans of Stross's writing. The reason? This is not a new book.


When Stross originally conceived the idea it was for this volume. The powers of publishing prevailed, said it was too long and cut it in two. If you have read THE FAMILY TRADE and THE HIDDEN FAMILY you have also read THE BLOODLINE FEUD. This is how Stross intended it. So if you already have, or have read the first two books in this series, you may skip the rest of this review.

THE BLOODLINE FEUD begins with investigative journalist Miriam Beckstein having a very bad day. She and her researcher Paulette have got what they think is the scoop of the decade, having the data to prove that a couple of high profile firms are laundering drugs money. When the editor in chief pulls the plug on the story and has both women escorted from the building she realises that the company that owns the newspaper must also be involved. This is also the day that her adoptive mother, Iris, decides to give her the newspaper cuttings and few items that belonged to her biological mother, an unnamed woman who was found dead. Amongst the items is a locket. Inside is a strange pattern. As she stares at it, Miriam suddenly finds herself in virgin woodland with a splitting headache. Initially excited about her discovery, Miriam's outlook changes when she first discovers a very poor village, and then is kidnapped from her bed.

As she quickly discovers, she is the long-believed-dead member of a feudal Clan in this parallel world and an heiress. At the time when her mother was found dead, there was a nasty internecine war going on. Currently, there is a truce but her reappearance as an adult triggers a

recommencement of hostilities, with Miriam the target of several assassination attempts. She finds it difficult to know who she should trust. She also finds out that the reason for the wealth of the Clans is drug smuggling.

This new world, the one she was actually born in, is very mediaeval in its attitudes, particularly towards women. That, Miriam is not going to accept. As a result, when she finds a different locket on one of her attackers and a way to a third world she decides she is going to set up an alternative trade, one that does not involve drugs and one that allows more autonomy to women.




A complaint often levelled at part works is that one volume often appears to end half-way through a sentence. This is more likely to be the publisher's decision than the author's. In THE BLOODLINE FEUD, Stross has had the opportunity to reunite the orphan volumes. The result is a far more satisfactory read and a wise decision. If you haven't read any of this series, this is the place to start. *PM (Review copy kindly donated by Pan Macmillan Tor)*

THE WALKING DEAD: FALL OF THE GOVERNOR PART ONE by Robert Kirkman and Jay Bonansinga Tor / 245 pgs / £7.99 paperback / ISBN 978-0330541381 Reviewed by Theresa Derwin

The third entry in the novelisation of the *Walking Dead* franchise and in particular the continuation of the story of the enigmatic Governor, FALL:

PART ONE is the strongest of the novels so far. For those who are not familiar with The Walking Dead, this started as a series of well-regarded graphic novels and was adapted into a successful TV series now in its fourth season. Set in the USA it tells the story of a group of survivors after an infection has decimated the population and turned many victims into shuffling zombies. It is strongly character-driven and although there are horrific setpieces the focus is more on how the must compromise characters and adapt to survive.

The novel starts with secondary characters to get the reader immersed into the world of Woodbury, where the Governor



reigns. The Governor has successfully organised the barricading and the defence of Woodbury to provide a haven from the outside. It is two years since the dead were first reanimated, and to keep the town of Woodbury in check, the Governor puts on regular 'gladiatorial' style shows in which residents fight each other in an arena filled with chained up zombies.

We first meet fighters Bruce and Gabe in the arena. The scenes here are brutally honest about death (its smell and the sight of it) and incredibly visceral. Lilly, who appears in the second book, has become disillusioned after a failed coup to overthrow the Governor in the last book. She is now *persona non gratis* yet is tolerated in the town. She is also very isolated and lonely given her outsider status and soon becomes involved with one of the young men in the town.

Lilly is warned by Nurse Alice to keep her doubts about the town to herself. The only reason Dr Stevens and Alice are allowed to stay in Woodbury, following their involvement in the failed coup, is the fact that they are the only medical staff in Woodbury and are needed.

The enjoyable aspect of this book, is the inclusion of iconic characters from the TV series and the graphic novels; Rick (who needs no introduction to WD fans) and a certain hooded warrior woman clasping a machete, which brings the excitement and tension to a whole new level.

This novel takes place roughly near mid-season three when Rick's group are holed up in the prison (a defensible refuge from the undead) and Rick and the Governor first meet. As a result, it left me wanting more and eager to grab the DVD series or the graphic novels to see what happens next.
