David Howe is a writer, journalist, publisher and media historian. He began writing non-fiction articles for fanzines in the 1980's. He progressed to writing in-depth analyses of *Doctor Who*. He has written over 30 titles on the production and history of the series. In

2000 he and Stephen Walker founded Telos Publishing. As well as his highly regarded *Dr Who* related publications it also publishes a wide range of non-fiction and fiction including horror, SF, Fantasy and crime/mysteries. Authors include Robert Rankin, Simon Clark (author of NIGHT OF THE TRIFFIDS and various horror fiction) and Sam Stone. As well as his many writing and editing credits with Telos he was also the reviews editor for horror film magazine *Shivers* (1994 to 2008) and the Contributing and Book reviews editor for Starburst magazine (1984 to 2001). Sam Stone writes gothic, horror and fantasy fiction and is also the commissioning editor of Telos Publishing imprint, Telos Moonrise. Her first novel GABRIELE CACCINI (2007) won a silver award as best horror novel from US magazine Fore Word. Her second novel FUTILE FLAME was shortlisted for the August Derleth Award for best novel in the British Fantasy Awards and her third DEMON DANCE won the 2011 August Derleth award although she publicly returned this rather than be associated with controversy over voting that year. She has also won Best Short Fiction for her short story "Fool's Gold". These three novels are part of her Vampire Gene series (subsequent titles include HATEFUL HEART and SILENT SAND). The first novel GABRIELE CACCINI was republished as KILLING KISS). She has also written The Kat Lightfoot Mysteries, a steampunk series (ZOMBIES AT TIFFANY'S, KAT ON A HOT TIN AIRSHIP). The first novel in a new series JINX TOWN will be published in September this year. She has also written and published screenplays and short stories. DAVID GEMMELL AWARDS - JUNE 13TH

If you wondered where some of the Brum Group regulars were last



meeting they were probably at The David Gemmell Awards for Heroic fantasy in Established in memory of the author David Gemmell, these awards are voted for online and thus reflect the taste of the reading public. The awards were attended by many from the fantasy field including writers, artists, publishers, agents and not forgetting fans and readers of fantasy fiction. The venue was the spectacular Magic Circle, a fascinating place with many and props from memorabilia magicians including Houdini's water cabinet and Tommy Cooper's fez.

The Awards themselves are substantial pieces of craftsmanship. In particular, the Legend Award is a metal axe (based on Snaga, the weapon of Gemmell's character, Druss). If the winner had to fly home they were going to have an interesting conversation at check-in! The Ravenheart Award is a new design this year (see photo) and is an 11" tall bust. The winner of that will need a substantially reinforced trophy shelf as it is rather heavy.

Following an excerpt from David Gemmell's WAYLANDER (the Pebble in the Moonlight) read by author James Barclay, there was an introduction by BSFG members and chairs of the Awards, Stan and Anne Nicholls. This was followed by an auction to raise funds. The DGLA is a Not-for-Profit organisation that relies on donations and sponsors. It is also helped by sales of the LEGENDS anthology (Newcon Press). The publication of a second LEGENDS anthology is scheduled for 2015. The formal part of the



evening concluded with the presentation of the individual awards.

URBAN FANTASY EVENING FEATURING AMANDA CARI SON AND BENEDICT JACKA.



On June 25th, Theresa Derwin and I were very fortunate to be among a small selected group invited to the offices of Little Brown (publishers of Orbit books) in London. The evening was to promote their Urban Fantasy range. I know this is not everyone in the group's cup of tea but many people (myself included) are fans of this subgenre where fantastical creatures and magic exist in an urban environment usually in a contemporary setting, although they can also be set in the past or future. There is also some overlap with steampunk. London in particular is very popular with UK authors (eg Ben Aaronovitch, Paul Cornell, Neil Gaiman etc).

The evening started with a look at

Orbit's Urban Fantasy catalogue which has a strong line-up including very well-known authors such as Jim Butcher and Charles Stross plus others of who I was less aware but who look very interesting based on the synopses

we were provided.

We then got the chance to meet two authors who write urban fantasy. These were UK author Benedict Jacka (whose Alex Verus series features a probability mage who lives in London) and visiting US author Amanda Carlson (her Jessica McClain series features a female werewolf). We had a reading from their first books (FATED by Benedict Jacka and FULL BLOODED by Amanda Carlson) and then had the chance to chat to them about their work and urban fantasy in general. In particular we identified that the sarcastic, humorous first person character was



particularly suited to this type of fiction and one of the main attractions to the reader.

We had an amazing evening and were treated extremely well. As well as meeting the authors we got to meet some younger fans who are blogging about their reading and it was interesting to get their different perspectives. At the end of the evening we were given a very generous collection of Orbit books, (including both fantasy and SF) which will be available for review at the next Brum Group meeting.

Author **Daniel Keyes** died on June 5th aged 86. He was most well-known for his poignant Hugo award-winning SF short story "Flowers for Algernon" - the diary of janitor Charlie Gordon whose IQ is raised artificially but later realises that the effect is not permanent. The story was later expanded into a novel, in which form it won the Nebula in 1967. It was later filmed as CHARLY starring Cliff Robertson. His subsequent novels concentrated more on psychiatric conditions including their role in criminal behaviour rather than SF STRANGE BODIES by Marcel Theroux has

won the John W Campbell Memorial Award for SF novel published in 2013. The winner of the Theodore Sturgeon Memorial Award for Short Fiction published in 2013 was "In Joy, Knowing the Abyss" by Sarah Pinsker The winner of the GUFF Award to allow SF fans to travel between Australia and Europe has been announced. The winner is Gillian Polack The 2014 inductees into the SF and Fantasy Hall of Fame are book cover and music album artist Frank Frazetta, writer, animator and film director Hayao Miyazaki and founder of Studio Ghibli, the "Queen of Space Opera" author Leigh Brackett, SF filmmaker and director Stanley Kubrick and SF legend Olaf Stapledon The late fantasy author Marion **Z** Bradley has been accused of child abuse by her daughter. Bradley's late husband had previously been jailed for child molestation Publishing company Angry Robot have announced that they are discontinuing their YA imprint Strange Chemistry The Edinburgh International Book Festival (9th to 25th August) will have George R Martin as one of its headline authors. 

FULL BLOODED (Jessica McClain 1) by Amanda Carlson Orbit / 322 pgs / £7.99 paperback / ISBN 978-0356501264 Reviewed by Theresa Derwin

Jessica McClain is the only female werewolf in an all-male werewolf race. Except that Jessica has never changed - it's not supposed to happen. Yet one night she wakes up in body wrenching pain to find her body going through the change, so she tries to grab the serum left for her to halt the process by knocking her unconscious, the serum she wasn't meant to need. Through mind-to-mind connection, Jessica is able to communicate with her twin brother, Tyler and her Dad, which is quite handy considering she wakes up naked and injured and unsure where she is after her first change.

Her new found status as a full-

the downfall of the Pack.



blooded wolf is about to rock the supernatural status quo with major ramifications, particularly as her father Callum is Pack Alpha. She wakes up again after passing out to find herself back at the Compound she had moved out of seven years before. In the real word she had built a life as Molly Hannon, working with Nick as part of a detective business. The Compound has a number of 'Essentials'; humans who know about the supernatural community but keep it quiet: doctors, nurses, lawyers and the like. It's up to Callum to protect his daughter and keep her change a secret from the Pack. According to the Cain Myth, Jessica's change would bring

Carlson's debut novel is a rollicking read, fast-paced and immense fun. Her authorial voice, especially as wolf and woman is very strong, the whole piece having been written in first person, or what C E Murphy has referred to as "first person snark"; an accurate description. Carlson mixes more supernatural stuff into the novel, with Jessica's business partner Nick being a werefox and their secretary Marcy being a talented witch. The case


she returns to work on also involves an imp that's a little too friendly with the local females.

As Jessica struggles with her new status she finds her appetite and senses increased as well as her interior wolf battling her for control. It all makes for an interesting supernatural novel fraught with tension and laced with plenty of humour. A nice addition to the werewolf sub-genre of modern Urban Fantasy.

ASTRA (The Gaia Chronicles 1) by Naomi Foyle Jo Fletcher Books / 379 pgs / £14.99 paperback / ISBN 978-1780876344 Reviewed by Carol Goodwin



ASTRA is a science fiction novel set in the near future. It is the story of a young girl growing up in what appears, at least initially, to be an ideal society. After a worldwide collapse of civilisation precipitated by a fuel crisis and flooding due to global warming, the society of Is-Land is formed by the remnants of various "hippy"/ "low impact" communes whose low reliance on conventional fossilfuel based technologies meant they were among the first to recover. Their new society is built on a worship of Gaia with minimal reliance on technology. It is clear though that they do possess sophisticated technology with the use of genetically

engineered plants and animals and computer "tablettes". The society structure is also complicated as everyone has three types of parent (although one person may be more than one). These categories are Birth, Code (the person who provided the DNA) and Shelter (the parent who raises the child). Astra is being raised jointly by adoptive "Shelter" parents, married couple Nimma and Klor who she lives with and Hokma, an emotionally remote scientist.

We first meet the eponymous Astra as a seven year old girl, with following sections when she is 11 and 17. The story throughout is told from her viewpoint but in third person. Naomi Foyle is very good at showing how Astra's perspective and understanding changes as she matures and I found the developing character of Astra very convincing. In particular her contrasting relationships with her difficult Shelter mother, Nimma and her

more accepting Shelter father, Klor work very well. Initially like most of her peers, Astra dreams of defending Is-Land from wicked Non-Landers who want to infiltrate and destroy their sanctuary. This cohort of children are to be given a Security Shot to help them be better defenders. In a decision which will drastically affect her future the young Astra is persuaded by Hokma to fake having her injection as it will limit her intellect and her chance to fulfil her other dream of becoming a famous scientist.

In later sections we see the consequences of this decision as she becomes less like her peers and must constantly hide her differences. As this balancing act becomes harder (especially as she matures through adolescence to adulthood) we gradually uncover more of the controlling totalitarian nature of Is-Land society and that the portrayal of the outsider Non-Landers is far from accurate. There are some uncomfortable sections as we discover how society deals with non-conformists. I found them particularly effective as they have an Orwellian feel where they are justified as for the good of the individual or society.


The story is not fast-paced but progressively reveals more of the "utopian" society as something quite unpleasant. This subtle approach is one I very much liked but may not suit everybody. This is excellent Science Fiction and I heartily recommend it for anyone who likes their fiction thought-provoking and challenging. Its slower pace may not suit everyone especially if you prefer space opera/technology-heavy SF – more reminiscent of LeGuin than hard SF authors. It should also be noted that the Is-Lander society is very open about nudity and sexuality with children encouraged to know their bodies from an early age. PARASITE by Mira Grant Orbit / 505pgs/ £8.99 paperback / ISBN 978-0356501925 Reviewed by Theresa Derwin

After a horrific car accident Sally Mitchell wakes up remembering nothing of who she was. Lucky to be alive, she has only survived because her Dad is high up on the SymboGen company ladder and arranged for her to have an Intestinal Bodyguard inserted before the accident; a tapeworm that enhances the human immune system and literally helped to save her life, but at the same time wiped away her old, previously spoilt personality. This has left her as a SymboGen guinea pig for six years, plagued by therapists and scientists prodding and poking her.

She's just starting to rebuild her life, gets on with her sister Joyce and has a cute boyfriend Nathan, who she loves. But just as she's coming to terms with her new life, people are starting to behave strangely. In the mall with her sister she spots a number of people randomly swarm towards each other with blank faces, victims of the apparent 'sleeping sickness'. And her parents seem to know something about this.

With all of that going on, and the stress of the investigations as well as relearning how to speak, read and react in a so called 'normal' way, Sally, now Sal, is having a hard time adjusting.



It's refreshing that in all of Mira/Seanan McGuire's books the regular protagonists reflect the multicultural and diverse world we live in. Mostly written in the first person, we experience the events through Sal's eyes, however, chapters are interspersed with medical texts and journals mapping the history of the tapeworm and the scientists involved. There's a shady government/conspiracy theory vibe to the novel and the science feels incredibly accurate and believable suggesting a thorough amount of research.

There are plenty of surprises throughout the novel and the writing is especially entertaining, the science made accessible to the reader. All in all a brilliant start to a brand new trilogy and one that has been nominated for a Hugo. If it wins, it will be well deserved. Simply a brilliant book. *TD*
