NEWS IN BRIEF



Author and Editor Frank M Robinson has died at the age of 87. He worked on various magazines starting as a copy boy at Amazing. He also wrote SF stories and novels. His first sale was the short story "The Maze" (Astounding 1951) and he then wrote a number of successful SF thrillers of which the most well-known is probably THE GLASS INFERNO which THE TOWERING was filmed as INFERNO. He was also a collector and expert on pulp magazines and won a Hugo

for SCIENCE FICTION OF THE TWENTIETH CENTURY:

AN ILLUSTRATED HISTORY (1999) and was a British Fantasy Award finalist for ART OF THE IMAGINATION in 2002. He was inducted into the First Fandom Hall of Fame in 2001 and was a recipient of the Special Honoree Award from the Science Fiction Writers of America (SFWA) in 2014. Outside of his SF work he was also a speechwriter for the San Francisco campaigner and politician Harvey Milk The winners of the World Fantasy Lifetime Achievement Awards are Chelsea Quinn Yarbro and Ellen Datlow Robert Jackson Bennett has won the Best Novel category with AMERICAN ELSEWHERE in the Shirley Jackson Awards for psychological horror suspense The hosts for the Hugo Awards ceremony at Loncon 3 will be Justin Robson and Geoff Ryman. The Retro Hugo Awards (for works from 1939) will be Mary Robinette Kowal and Robert Shearman The winners of the Prometheus Awards for libertarian SF have been announced and will be presented at Loncon 3. The best novel was tied between HOMELAND by Cory Doctorow and NEXUS by Ramez Naam. A Special Lifetime Achievement Award will be given to Vernor Vinge. categories Winners in other are available at http://lfs.org/releases.shtml Sir Terry Pratchett has announced that he will be unable to appear at the Discworld Convention in Manchester due to his Alzheimer's Disease or "The Embuggerance" as he calls it. He will still answer some fan questions via video link and his assistant will be bringing his Black Hat to represent him. He has also announced that his next novel will be the fifth to feature young witch, Tiffany Aching The **BSFA Lecture** at Loncon 3 will be entitled "Pygmalion's Statue and her Synthetic Sisters: The Perfect Woman on Screen" and will be given by Dr Paula James of the Open University It has just been announced that in 2012 the Earth was missed by a "Carrington Event" where an extreme solar storm caused an extremely fast plasma wave that would have caused major disruption to satellite communications and potentially disabled "anything that plugs into a wall socket". Interestingly, Janet Edwards' novel, EARTH GIRL) featured a Carrington event and its consequences. CG



FATED by Alex Jacka Orbit / 322 pgs / £7.99 paperback / ISBN 978-0356500249 Reviewed by Carol Goodwin

For well over a century many British authors from both the SF/Fantasy field and mainstream literature have found the setting of London provides lots of thought-provoking places and history to use

as a backdrop. Although I personally would like to see the mythology of other cities explored more, Benedict Jacka's FATED (the first in his *Alex Verus* series) proves to me that there is still plenty of scope for excellent storytelling based in London.

FATED is what is described as an urban fantasy (ie where fantasy elements co-exist in our modern world). Like many urban fantasy stories, it is told in the first person viewpoint; in this case that of the probability mage, Alex Verus. A probability mage (or a seer) can see a short distance into the future, or



rather the many possible futures. The exponential cascade of possibilities as he looks further ahead limit the usefulness of the information to hours rather than days. His abilities are rare and exceedingly useful to both Dark and Light mages which has had some nasty consequences for Alex in the past. He now owns a magic shop in Camden and tries to stay unnoticed and away from other magicians. However when an ancient statue stored at the British Museum is found to hide a powerful magic artefact, only Alex' abilities can divine the correct and <u>safe</u> way to unlock it. Suddenly wanted by various factions, many of whom will use violence and

coercion to get what they want, Alex must use his wits to protect his friends and himself and to prevent the artefact falling into the wrong hands.

I thoroughly enjoyed this book which shows a great deal of imagination. It avoids neatly the problem I have with many fantasy books that magic can be waved to solve any problem. The fact that Alex has no high-powered defensive/offensive magic of his own and must rely on preparation and his wits to survive against opponents who could easily kill or maim him makes it stimulating as you are kept guessing how he is going to escape from a bad situation. The characterisation is excellent. I like very much that Alex is a quieter more reflective character than the prototypical spell-slinging magician of much fantasy. His back story and its effect on him and some of the other characters is interesting and I look forward to further revelations in the subsequent books. The supporting characters are also good and fit well into the plot. I particularly liked his friend, Luna who is cursed to bring bad luck to anyone who gets emotionally close to her and the sometimes unexpected ways that affects the plot.

The book is well written and easy to read and has good pace with well-interspersed action and quieter scenes. In my opinion the author has succeeded in writing a book which has a unique voice and is clearly differentiated from others in a sometimes over-populated genre. I look forward to reading the following novels in the series. *CG (Review copy kindly donated by Orbit)*



It was with some trepidation that I started to read this book. As some of you know I am not the greatest fan of horror and the cover picture did not fill me with confidence. However I have read and enjoyed some of Sam Stone's other books so was willing to give this a try.

THE DARKNESS WITHIN is a short novel billed as a science fiction/horror mixture. Earth is dying and can only sustain human life for about 30 more years. A small fraction of the population are lucky enough to have been chosen to board the

Colony ships which are being despatched to a new habitable planet, New Earth. The action takes place on the second of these ships to depart. Although all the inhabitants have been selected for intelligence, skills and fertility they are divided socially into passengers and crew. The privileged passengers, mainly from rich families, enjoy every luxury whilst the crew (who are generally from a lower social class) do all the work and lead a more Spartan existence.

One year into the voyage one of the crew is contaminated by an alien organism on salvaged space debris. Initially the infected appear normal which allows them to spread the disease to others. With time most of the victims are consumed from within and appear rotten and decaying. As more people become infected it becomes



obvious something terrible is wrong. Desperately trying to identify who is still uninfected, the remaining passengers and crew must overcome their previous antipathies and work together to save themselves.

Despite my misgivings I actually found this novel relatively easy to read. It rattles along fairly easily and builds up tension well. The horror elements were not too disturbing for me and I did feel they fitted within the plot and were not just gratuitous. Perhaps it is that I am not a horror fan and so do not understand the genre but I actually enjoyed the first half of the novel

(where the danger is insidious and unrecognised) far more than the latter half (where the crisis is obvious and more visually horrific). This novel was initially written as an audio play which was later expanded into a short novel and I think the book would have benefited from more expansion. I liked the set up and there are lots of ideas in here that the length of the book does not allow to be fully explored. The author established some good characters and tensions that got me interested. In particular there were a couple of female characters that I particularly appreciated. However I wanted to know more about the various individuals and how the crew/passenger tensions had changed from departure until the start of the crisis. This would have helped me feel more empathy for their plight. If you like horror then you will probably enjoy this book as it feels that this rather than the sf element is its main focus. *CG (Review copy kindly donated by Sam Stone)*
