GOOD MEMORIES - by Vernon Brown

An old friend and long-time BSFG member died on 26th October after a long illness that left her house bound before she was confined to her bed for several years. Her funeral on 7th November was attended by a number of Group members.

Helen Eling was a vivacious friendly person, whose presence enlivened any meeting. I remember her being in the thick of things at Novacons and, on one occasion, being inveigled into a very smooth ballroom jive with her. I don't know where she obtained all the energy that she expended but I do know that Group meetings and conventions became a little quieter when she could no longer attend them. - *Vernon Brown*.

I first met Helen in 1971 when she joined the Brum Group, coming along with Stan for the social side as she was not an SF reader. But she got on with everyone and was soon coming to Novacons as well. She started helping out in every way she could – registrations, raffles, etc., and she became an integral part of the BSFG and Novacons being a committee member on several of the early Novacons. Arline and I became very good friends with Stan and Helen and we met up many times outside of fannish activities. Going to their house for a dinner party was always something to look forward to as she was an excellent cook and hostess.

And a great shock came at a Novacon disco when I found out she jived and it was the same jive that I knew!!! The first time I'd met anyone I could dance with properly since the days when I was first taught to jive.

An interesting story came to light at the funeral, which I'd never heard before. Stan & Helen met at a dance 2 days before Helen's 18th birthday (1955). The next day Stan was shipped out to Egypt as part of his national service in the army. They corresponded for about a month and when Stan came back for a 2-day leave, Helen met him at New Street Station and Stan proposed that weekend! Talk about a whirlwind romance!!!

Helen was lost to us and fandom when she became ill - we hadn't seen her for about 15 years - but I shall always remember her as the best dance partner I ever had. - *Rog Peyton*

My earliest memory of Helen was at the first Brum Group meeting at the Imperial Hotel that I attended when I came back to Birmingham (from Norfolk, so I missed its start) in 1973. She was sitting on the edge of a table, surrounded by members who were laughing at a story she was telling. I was impressed by how vivacious she seemed. Standing proudly by her side was a chap with a large mop of dark hair. I didn't know who either of them were at the time, of course, but was soon introduced to them as Helen and Stan. The last time I saw Helen must be 12 years ago, just as her illness began to take hold of her. - Dave Hardy

My lasting impressions of Helen from the mid-seventies when I first met her are of a gregarious, friendly and compassionate person. She was always so helpful and would make a point of befriending those who seemed alone or lonely. Helen was also an excellent dancer, I remember her partnering Vernon in an energetic yet beautifully controlled jive. - *Pat Brown*

NEWS IN BRIEF



As no doubt everyone is aware, after a 10 year flight the spacecraft **Rosetta** achieved orbit around Comet 67P (see illustration) and landed **Philae** on the surface on November 12th. Despite some hitches due to a harder than expected landing site (causing the lander to bounce three

times and end up in a shaded spot) a lot of data was recovered which is still being analysed. Although now hibernating there is still some hope it may revive with greater sunlight exposure nearer perihelion (closest approach to the Sun). Perihelion is calculated as 13th August 2015. In the meantime Rosetta continues in orbit around the comet and will send data and photos back as the comet circles the Sun. the **ESA** Regular updates are on Rosetta (http://blogs.esa.int/rosetta) Controversial TV producer Glen A **Larson** has died. He created many popular '70's and '80's shows including the original Battlestar Galactica, The Six Million Dollar Man and Knight rider. He was branded as "Glen Larceny" by Harlan Ellison as many of his shows "borrowed" and capitalised on big screen popular hits Special effects artist Michael Lennick died on November 7th. He worked on the famous SF films such as THE WAR OF THE WORLDS, THE FLY and THE DEAD ZONE. He also made documentaries about science and astronautics and considered himself a keen SF fan and reader Co-founder and Curator Emeritus of the important US J Lloyd Eaton Collection of


Science Fiction and Fantasy Literature, George Slusser has died. As well as his vital work in establishing and maintaining the archive, he wrote non-fiction analyses of the SF field including ROBERT A. STRANGER IN HIS OWN LAND. HEINLEIN: FARTHEST SHORES OF URSULA K. LE GUIN NURSERY REALMS: CHILDREN IN THE WORLDS OF SCIENCE FICTION, FANTASY AND HORROR. He was awarded the Pilgrim Award from the Science Fiction Research Association in 1986 Ursula K LeGuin accepted the National Book Foundation's Medal for Distinguished Contribution to American Letters where she was introduced by Neil Gaiman. Outspoken as ever she used her speech to attack publishers for the "profit motive often is in conflict with the aims of art." And that books are "not just commodities". She also praised fellow science fiction and fantasy authors, as "the writers who were excluded from literature for so long ... who for the last 50 years watched the beautiful rewards go to the so-called realists" and predicted that "hard times are coming when we will be wanting the voices of writers who can see alternatives to how we live now and can see through our fear-stricken society and its obsessive technologies to other ways of being, and even imagine some real grounds for hope". The speech is on YouTube at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Et9Nf-rsALk Publishers Harper Voyager UK and the British Film Institute held a joint online Virtual Sci-Fi Festival on the 15th - 16th November to tie in with the BFI Autumn Film Season "Days of Fear and Wonder". It featured Twitter, Blog, Facebook and Podcasts by many SF authors, publishers and filmmakers and fans. Authors featured included Margaret Atwood and Brian Aldiss amongst many. Each issue has a theme and a featured author and has had some excellent contributors to date including Emma Newman, Sarah Pinborough, Frances Hardinge and Stephanie Saulter. The website www.holdfastmagazine.com There has been some controversy over the damage and trolling activities of 2014 John W Campbell nominee Benjanun Sriduangkaew who has been revealed as troll and "rage-blogger" Requires Hate. A documented report of her activities by Laura J Mixon appears to show that most of her targets to have been women, people of colour and other minority groups despite her allegedly progressive views Arthur C Clarke's 3001: THE FINAL ODYSSEY is to be adapted into a mini-series by the SyFy Channel. 

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

EUROPE IN AUTUMN by Dave Hutchinson

Predicting future political trends is difficult. As Charles Stross has now found not everything turns out the way you want it. Several of his novels will now have to be regarded as alternative histories. Not that Stross will be particularly worried as there is a fine tradition in alternative histories. Extrapolating current trends into a relatively near future is an interesting exercise. Currently, there seems to be



a desire for ethnic groupings to desire autonomy. Whether or not


this is economically viable depends on the strengths of the group. Dave Hutchinson has taken this trend to extremes and postulated a Europe divided into ever decreasing blocs which may or may not have free movement across borders.

EUROPE IN AUTUMN is set largely in Central Europe and centres around Rudi, an Estonian cook working in a Polish restaurant. It's not an easy life but he's reasonably content. Max, the owner, pays protection to keep in business. It's an accepted part of the system in a Europe where the authorities think they have better things to do. Rudi is able to move more freely across borders than most Polish nationals and with less suspicion so he is asked to go to the small state of Hindenberg and bring back a message from Max's cousin. This is the start of a new career. While still working at the restaurant he is trained as a Coureur. Using a carefully constructed set of aliases, Coureurs smuggle documents and people across the borders faster than going through diplomatic channels.

This is a novel that starts off well. The seediness of the characters, settings and plot structure is reminiscent of a realistic spy thriller - far more gritty than the Bond novels. These are people that most would not notice as any good spy ought to be. Rudi's frustration at the tedium of his initial training is shot through with reality. The first third is well written, pacey and holds the attention, everything that a good thriller should be. These qualities don't diminish but as Rudi gets deeper into the role that has been elected into, the plot becomes more episodic. The result is something that could easily be turned into a many-part TV series. It has the same quality. There is a cast of regular characters who have developing roles and face changing dilemmas. There is the mysterious Zone. This is an area on either side of a railway line that crosses Europe and which steadily becomes the focus of Rudi's activities. This is the story arc which creeps into the episodes, unnoticed at first but heading towards the big denouement in the final episode. For this reason, it is a shame that Hutchinson has confined himself to a single novel. Some of the episodes feel as if they want to be expanded and made more complex. A trilogy would have been nice. A longer series would have made the readership sit up and take notice. PM

THE MARTIAN by Andy Weir Del Rey / 384 pgs / £7.99 paperback / ISBN 978-0091956141 Reviewed by Carol Goodwin.



This SF book has been hugely popular both inside and outside the SF field. It has been a Sunday Times bestseller, made the Richard and Judy list and is available readily on supermarket shelves, not the norm for most straight SF books. With all this attention I was somewhat worried whether the book could live up to all the hype. Well I need not have worried - this is a good old-fashioned SF book which is full of adventure, meticulous science research and a gripping page-turner.

The story is set in the near future. Shortly after landing on Mars, the six person crew of the third

manned mission to Mars (*Ares 3*) are forced to evacuate due to a massive storm threatening the living base. In the confusion, astronaut Mark Watney is injured, separated and left for dead when his monitors show no life signs. He awakens to find himself marooned on Mars with no way to communicate and the next mission isn't due for four years. Trapped on a planet where any mistake could kill him, this is a riveting story of his ingenious efforts to survive.

The story alternates between his "first person" log entries and the "third person" viewpoint of the Earth-based scientists and the homebound *Ares 3* crew. Mark Watney as a character is well-drawn and immensely likeable. His log entries feel like a real person's voice and his use of humour to keep himself going works very well. Importantly he is not perfect and he does make mistakes but his determination and perseverance get you involved and willing him to survive.

While the technical detail might put some people off, it does not feel heavy handed. In fact this is one of the major joys of this book to me. I love the puzzle of "How is he going to get out of this?"

and the logical, real solutions he finds. I am not a physics/engineering expert by any stretch of the imagination but the technical accuracy seems right to me. The problems and solutions used feel incredibly well-researched and detailed and the author has clearly spent a lot of time trying to get things correct.

The novel has been described as "Robinson Crusoe in Space" and this is a very good description. It reminds me of some of the early hard SF I read and loved and which first got me into the field, particularly Arthur C Clarke's A FALL OF MOONDUST or astronomer/writer Hugh Walter's children's *Chris Godfrey* series. If you like your SF with a good mixture of accurate science and adventure then this book is highly recommended. *CG* (*Review copy kindly donated by Del Rey*)
