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Professor WILLIAM CHAPLIN

November 16th

This month our guest speaker is Professor William Chaplin from the University of Birmingham. He will be talking to us about SOUNDING STARS

The talk will review recent exciting breakthroughs in our ability to study stars -- by detecting signatures of their natural resonances -- and to detect planets orbiting stars, thanks to a new generation of satellites

and telescopes that are providing data of unrivalled quality on unprecedented numbers of stars. In particular he will be highlighting results from the NASA Kepler Mission, and will touch briefly on the promise of the recently launched NASA TESS Mission.

Professor Chaplin is the co-author of over 150 research papers in the fields of solar and stellar physics. He leads the NASA Kepler mission studying the astero-seismic investigation of solar-type stars and manages and co-ordinates the work of over 170 international scientists. He is active in promoting solar/stellar research on both national and international media, including recent appearances on the BBC to discuss the results from the Kepler spacecraft. NEWS IN BRIEF

The Spanish comic book artist, Carlos Ezquerra has died at the age of 70. He will be best remembered as the co-creator of the iconic Judge Dredd for the 2000AD sci-fi magazine and also drew many of the classic Dredd stories. He also created another well-remembered character of Johnny Alpha in the Strontium Dog strip. He was regarded by many as one of the greatest comic book artists The winner of the Utopiales Best SF Novel Award (for a novel published in French) is L'ÂME DES HORLOGES (THE BONE CLOCKS) by David Mitchell The Bank of England is taking nominations for scientists to appear on the new £50 note. nominationsThe Chinese film THE WANDERING EARTH based upon a story by SF author, Cixin Liu (best known for THE THREE-BODY PROBLEM) is being discussed as China's first potential "breakout sci-fi blockbuster film" that looks likely to succeed in the US/European cinema market as well as domestically The BBC show Tomorrow's **World** will return as a one-off, 15 years after its last broadcast. It will be hosted by former presenters Maggie Philbin and Howard Stableford and will be shown on BBC Four on 22nd November NASA'S Dawn Mission to Vesta and Ceres has run out of fuel and lost contact with mission control. During a spectacular 11-year mission it sent back spectacular pictures including the mysterious glowing spots on the surface of Ceres. This was in the same week that NASA reported that the Kepler **Space Telescope** mission had also run out of fuel and come to an end A hard Brexit poses a significant threat to print-on-demand books. Many European authors/small press publishers have been using Lightning Source UK, part of Ingram Group. If the UK does not stay in the Customs Union, books printed in UK for export to EU may be subject to customs duties and formalities which could substantially impact costs and the resultant viability of many projects The European Space Agency/Airbus handed over a key part of the Orion capsule (the ESM section) to NASA at a ceremony in Bremen, Germany. The ESM will provide propulsion, electricity, heat, gases and water to the Orion capsule which is being developed to carry astronauts to the Moon and on to Mars. CG

ANAMERICAN STORY by Christopher Priest


This is my novel of the year, a grabbing, electrifying and chilling read. It's probably best categorised as a conspiracy thriller, with settings in the near past, the present and the near future.

Ben Matson tells the story. He's an English freelance science journalist, living in Scotland (a member of the EU) and looking back at events from an unspecified point in the 2020's. He has a firm and loving relationship with Jeanne, who is Scottish, and they have two young sons. But more than twenty years earlier he was in a relationship with Lily Viklund, a US publishing executive and expecting to stay with her for life,

despite the complication that she was still married to Martin Viklund, a senior White House advisor.

Then 9/11 happens. Ben is in a passenger aircraft over the US at the time, and Lily is meant to be in another passenger aircraft. He cannot find out what's happened to her and has to presume her death. He researches the details of 9/11 and discovers that while there are hundreds of crackpot theories about that infamous day in 2001 the official records are incomplete and deliberately false.

A couple of events in Ben's "now" cause him to look again at 9/11 and its repercussions. Priest has cleverly interlaced chapters and scenes from the different years (all carefully labelled) to maintain a trickle of information and to increase tension. It's impossible for the reader to know how much is fact and how much fiction. Priest has done his research with care, so that the small but significant changes in air travel and communication between 2001 and now are all in place. All through the novel are the insertions of Things That Don't Fit, which worry Ben as he tries to make sense of the "true story" of 9/11. Why are people lying to Ben?



Priest's smooth and clear writing style makes the reader care about his characters. A plethora of small details gradually come together to deliver a really satisfying novel. His novels mostly operate on the outskirts of SF and this is a great addition to his oeuvre.


THIN AIR by Richard Morgan Gollancz / 538 pgs /£14.99 paperback / ISBN 9780575088566 Reviewed by Jim Pearce

I'm a fan of Richard Morgan and when I saw that THIN AIR had been provided for review, I was very happy that I was lucky enough to acquire it. Many if not all of the Brum Group members will be aware of, if not have read, the author's *Takeshi Kovacs* novels. The first of these, ALTERED CARBON, is I believe currently available on Netflix. Like these books THIN AIR is a fast-moving tale full of blistering action and populated with well-defined both male and female characters in believable environments.

There is no padding in this tale and, as with many great books, there is a surprising but totally believable twist at the end as well as a satisfactory and somewhat happy ending. I'm really glad that I had the opportunity to read it.

The main protagonist, Hakan Veil is an ex-corporate enforcer modified in the womb to produce a gene-engineered killing machine. Before being stranded on Mars he was employed as an 'overrider'. Hidden somewhere on his employer's spacecraft he was the ultimate deterrent to mutiny, his remit, save the ship (at any cost). In recognition of this he is often referred to in the book as 'Black Hatch' as well as 'overrider'.

The action in THIN AIR takes place in the Valles Marineris which is made habitable by an atmosphere retention layer referred to as the 'Lamina' that interacts with the solar wind to produce brilliant aurora. In addition, the inhabitants' genomes are constantly tweaked using mosquito-like 'code-flies to frequently inject updates. This has resulted in a population that is described as 'hardscrabble to the bone, sandblasted from birth into conformity with the Valley's brutal expectations and predator norms. These men and women knew the Gash (part of Bradbury city) for what it was - an ocean of treacherous economic



weather and pitiless food chain dynamics just waiting to bite.' Consequently, local governmental corruption is rife. Oversight from earth is provided by the locally hated COLIN (Colony Initiative) organization.


After falling foul of the local city police (Bradbury PD) Hakan is forced to bodyguard Madison Madekwe, a member of an unexpected COLIN spot audit. Her role is to investigate the disappearance of the winner of a lottery prize, a trip back to earth. When Madison is kidnapped and he is nearly killed, Hakan's investigation overturns 'stones' that put both himself and various others at risk. As could be expected from the environment in which he is operating and Richard Morgan's previous books there is a great deal of violence and a high body count. Perhaps surprisingly Hakan turns out to have a powerful social conscience and sense of societal obligation.

THE ALCHEMY PRESS BOOK OF HORRORS edited by Peter Coleborn & Jan Edwards

At a time when too many anthologies are limited to a theme, here's an unthemed one containing twenty-five brilliant and far-ranging horror stories. I searched assiduously on your behalf for a dud amongst them but couldn't find one. This is largely due to the fact that over 400 stories were submitted. That's a huge, perhaps unprecedented response to a small press anthology.



I'm not going to tell you about every story, just about the sharper, stronger, more surprising ones that have stayed with me.

It's easy to take Ramsey Campbell for granted as "Britain's most respected living horror writer". He's been producing top quality horror stories for over fifty years and "Some Kind of a Laugh" is one of his best. A bistro waiter is the look-alike of a famous comedian; he's pushed into using the comedian's familiar catch-phrases to increase custom at the bistro. It's all perfectly credible - and still surprising.

There's a completely different type of story from Stan Nicholls, about a changing landscape: credible, very bleak,

and not an Orc in sight. Credibility of setting and characters are important aspects of horror fiction and are common to almost all of the stories here. Debbie Bennett's "The Fairest of them All" has Caitlin, in her mid-teens, with boyfriend trouble. James Brogden's "The Trade-up" shows us a travelling salesman down on his luck. There are foreign settings. John Grant's "Too Late" is a warning against Spanish holidays with one's spouse. Madhvi Ramani sets her story in a small German town reminiscent of "Hotel California". In "Along the Backroads" Jenny Barber portrays a dangerous landscape (I was reminded of Harry Harrison's DEATHWORLD). Ray Cluley's "Bluey" is set in an all too plausible English school of today, where Shaun is trying to control a class of 15-year-olds.

In the anthology you can find some quiet, atmospheric stories such as Storm Constantine's "La Ténébreuse" and some extraordinary horrors,

in particular "Peelers" by Ralph Robert Moore. So if you're of a nervous disposition, stick with Mills & Boon romances, where a happy ending is guaranteed.

I must mention the illustrations. Renowned horror artist Jim Pitts has contributed a small headpiece for each story, terrifying and appropriate, the modern equivalent of Thomas Bewick's engravings.


So this is a beautifully produced anthology of fine, satisfying horror stories. You may remember the editors, who spoke to the group in March 2015. If you buy a copy you won't be disappointed and it may well become an annual series.

SNAPSHOT by Brandon Sanderson Gollancz / 125 pgs / £10.99 hardback / ISBN 978-1473224995 Reviewed by Iim Pearce

SNAPSHOT is all about the discovery of If a crime has been dark secrets. committed and there is not enough evidence for a conviction or there is doubt about the facts of the case, detectives Anthony Davis and his partner Chaz are sent into a Snapshot by the city police. But what is a Snapshot? Under the vast city of New Clipperton the American government first built then abandoned an installation that can recreate in minute detail the whole city, including its inhabitants, on a specific day. On the day in question, Davis and Chaz have two assigned tasks. The only problem for them is boredom as there are many hours between the two events and switching off



the Snapshot and going home is not possible. To fill in the time Davis decides that they should, off their own bat, investigate a mystery that is bothering him.

SNAPSHOT follows our two protagonists through their day to a surprising conclusion. There is an unexpected twist right at the end. However, looking back as with all good mystery/detective yarns there were clues for the alert reader!

All in all this was a quietly satisfying story which I am glad that I had the opportunity to read. The characters had heft and if we accept that

the Snapshot technology exists we have a believable tale set in a world in which readers will feel at home. The only problem, if it is a problem which I had, is the date in which the story is set and that Snapshot technology is too advanced for the rest of the environmental technology. Reading the postscript the author and his editors are fully aware of this potential hangup and decided that it did not detract from the interactions that he was exploring. I must say that I agree with their conclusions as it did not interfere with my enjoyment of the book, I wholeheartedly recommend this novella to potential readers.


